Dear Brothers,

On Saturday, April 27, 1991, the fraternity's 226th and newest collegiate chapter was installed as Mu Pi Chapter at Pennsylvania State University - Behrend College in Erie, Pennsylvania. On that date, collegiate and alumni Brothers from chapters in the Northern Province joined Grand President William R. Kinsella, Past Grand President Richard J. Parnitzke, Vice President for Alumni Benefits and Services Marc A. Robbins, Northern Provincial Vice President Samuel F. Shaheen, Huron Regional Director Frederick C. Lipsey, Eastern Regional Director Richard A. Steinkrauss, District Director Richard M. Garber, and Director of Chapter Services C. Dean Ferguson to assist with the installation of the chapter. Joining them were members of Alpha Kappa Chapter at the State University of New York - Buffalo, Beta Pi Chapter at Kent State University, Delta Omega Chap-

ter at West Liberty State College, Kappa Lambda Chapter at the State University of New York - Binghamton, and the Buffalo Alumni Chapter.

Initial interest in establishing a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi at Pennsylvania State University - Behrend College was generated by students William Poad and Lee Sloan in September of 1989. Upon receiving information from The Central Office of Delta Sigma Pi, these Brothers consulted with Director of Chapter Services C. Dean Ferguson and decided to continue with the chartering project in the spring semester of 1990.

In January of 1990, Past Grand President Richard J. Parnitzke and 12 members of Alpha Kappa Chapter at the State University of New York - Buffalo went to Pennsylvania State University - Behrend College to make an informational presentation to a group of potential colony members. In February, Pi Sigma Beta Colony

held its first meeting and its bylaws were approved and officers elected. Later that month, a letter of intent was received at The Central Office expressing desires to charter a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi.

Chapter Consultant Steven R. Whalen visited the colony in April of 1990 to review each individual officer's responsibilities and encourage the colony to participate in all aspects of the fraternity. Brother Whalen also met with the Director of the School of Business, Dr. John M. Magenau III, an initiate of the Gamma Theta Chapter of Delta Sigma Pi at Wayne State and also attended a colony business meeting. A calendar of activities and full roster of members were developed in October of 1990. Chapter Consultant Y. Lynnette Servaes visited the colony in November of 1990. She had individual meetings with the Faculty Advisor and many members of the Executive Committee. The Petition for a Chapter Charter

was received by Pi Sigma Beta Colony on February 4, 1991.

Members of the colony attended an area conference in Pennsylvania in February of 1990, and also attended the Mid-eastern Regional Conference in November of 1990. Guidance and support were received from frequent visits by Past Grand President Richard J. Parnitzke and Brothers of Alpha Kappa Chapter during the entire 1990 academic term. A pledging ceremony was conducted for the members of Pi Sigma Beta Colony in February of 1990 and the pledge program was successfully completed by members of the colony. On the morning of Saturday, April 27, 1991, representatives from collegiate chapters in the Northern Province gathered along with national officers for the installation ceremonies which resulted in the initiation of 48 charter members who formed Mu Pi Chapter.

Grand President William R. Kinsella served as Headmaster for the Ritual Team. Other members of the installation team included Past Grand President Richard J. Parnitzke, Vice President for Alumni Benefits and Services Marc A. Robbins, Northern Provincial Vice President Samuel F. Shaheen, Huron Regional Director Frederick C. Lipsey, Eastern Regional Director Richard A. Steinkrauss, District Director Richard M. Garber, and Director of Chapter Services C. Dean Ferguson.

Following the installation of the chapter, which took place at the Behrend Science Building, was the installation banquet. The banquet was held at Mugs Restaurant in Erie, Pennsylvania. Northern Provincial Vice President Samuel F. Shaheen served as Toastmaster for the ceremony. The Invocation was given by the Historian of Mu Pi Chapter, Robert L. Dechert, and greetings were extended from the university by Mu Pi Chapter Advisor Robert D. Patterson. A history of the School of Business was also presented by Chapter Advisor Robert D. Patterson. William J. Poad, Senior Vice President of Mu Pi Chapter, presented the history of Pi Sigma Beta Colony which became Mu Pi Chapter.

Following this presentation, Grand President William R. Kinsella presented the charge and Charter of Mu Pi Chapter to Chapter President Lee Sloan. Following the presentations, Director of Chapter Services C. Dean Ferguson presented Fraternal Greetings from chapters and members across the country welcoming Mu Pi Chapter. Mu Pi Chapter now represents Delta Sigma Pi at Pennsylvania State University - Behrend College in Erie, Pennsylvania.

Pennsylvania University - Behrend College is located on a 500-acre tract which provides a small college environment within the context of a major university. The college's scenic campus overlooks vineyards and Presque Isle State Park, a peninsula on Lake Erie. The college's campus was donated to the university in 1948 by Mary Behrend in memory of her husband, Ernest. Students attended classes in original buildings from the Glenhill Farm Estate and in the more recently constructed academic buildings, including the award winning Hammermill and Zurn Buildings completed in 1985.

In 1948, 152 students enrolled at what was known as "the Behrend Center". Only their freshman year could be completed at the center. When Pennsylvania State University reorganized in 1959, the Commonwealth Campus System was established and the Behrend Center became the Behrend Campus of Pennsylvania State University. The campus grew throughout the 1960's, and by 1971 over 1,200 students were enrolled. Today, over 2,800 students attend the college.

On January 20, 1973, the Pennsylvania State Board of Trustees granted 4-year college and graduate status to Pennsylvania State University - Behrend. Behrend is the only 4-year college within the Pennsylvania State University system not lo-

cated at the University Park Campus.

The college offers 27 Baccalaureate and Associate Degrees in Business, Engineering, Humanities, Social Sciences, Science and Technology, as well as the Pennsylvania State Masters of Business Administration and Master of Education Programs. An undergraduate program in Plastics Engineering Technology is also offered.

Behrend College began offering 4-year majors in business in the mid 1970's. In 1985, a Masters program was started, and in 1986 the Pennsylvania State Board of Trustees established the School of Business within Behrend College. The school offers a 4-year Bachelor of Arts Degree Program in Economics and a 7-year Bachelor of Science Degree program in Accounting, Business and Behavioral Sciences, Business Economics, Economics, General Business, and Management Information Systems. Minors are available in Economics and Management Information Systems. Approximately 630 students are enrolled in the School of Business.

Delta Sigma Pi welcomes the 48 charter members of the Mu Pi Chapter. It is the 10th chapter founded in the state of Pennsylvania and continues to proudly represent Delta Sigma Pi at Pennsylvania State University - Behrend College.

Charting Our Future

Delta Sigma Pi Engages its Long Range Plan

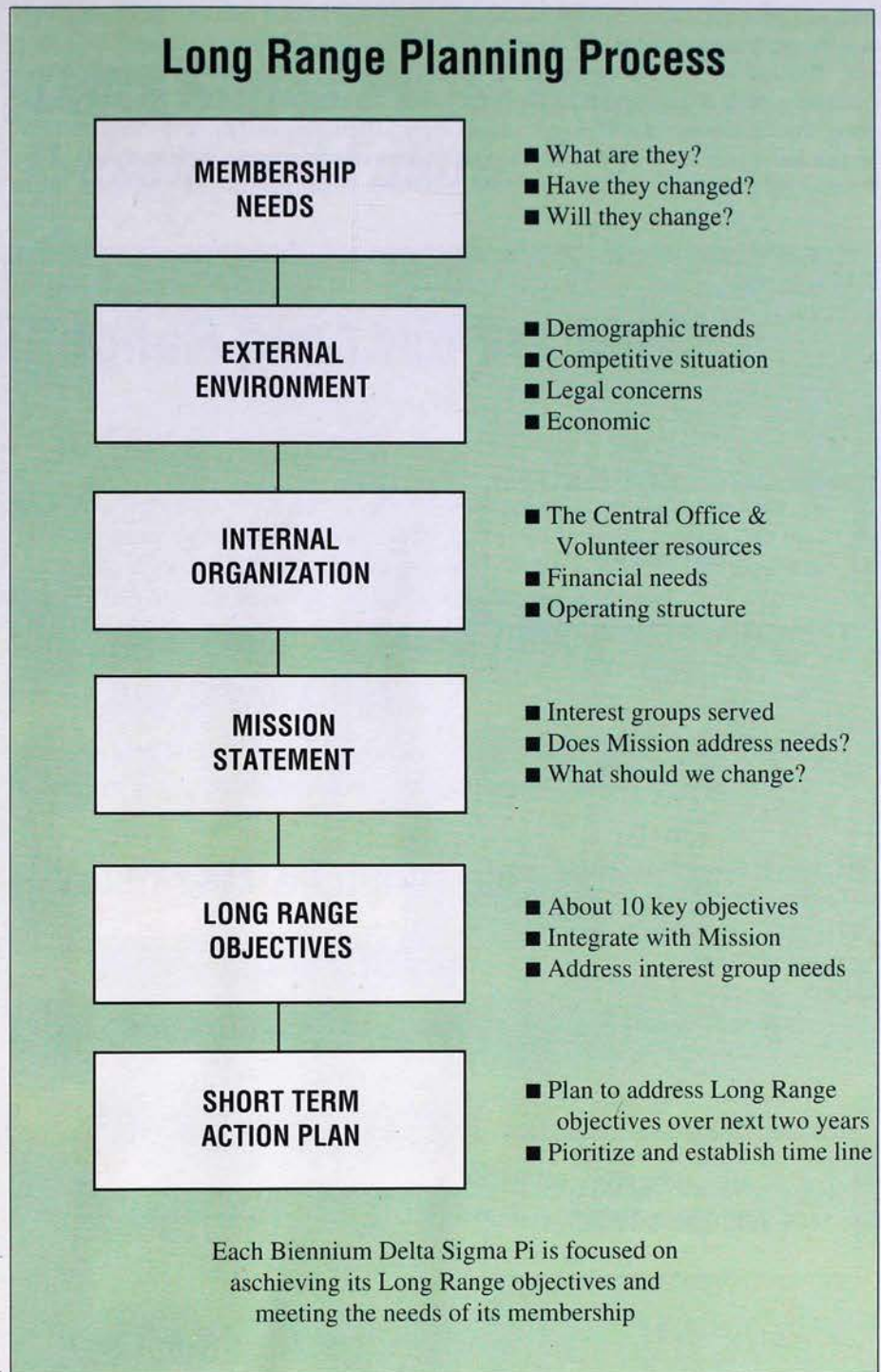

Over the past several months, Delta Sigma Pi has undertaken a process to evaluate all aspects of the environment in which our fraternity exists today and as best is possible for the next few years. This process has culminated in the development of a "mission" for the 1990s and beyond, along with an accompanying set of long range objectives.

The Long Range Plan evaluation process included all Regional Directors, a sampling of District Directors, and several Golden Council members. Further input from alumni and collegiate members will be obtained at Grand Chapter Congress. We started by asking three questions: What are our members' needs, what is going on in our external environment (e.g. universities, the corporate world, and local civic communities) and how are we organized to meet all these demands? In answering these questions, it became clear that we as a fraternity now serve several different constituencies, all of which have their own unique needs. We serve all students of business, not just our members; we serve all members, not just our collegiates; and we serve society in general, not just the local communities in which we operate.

Throughout this process, we were often asked about the relationship between the mission statement and our Purpose. The mission statement is not meant to replace the Purpose but rather supplement and enhance it. While the Purpose serves as an all encompassing document, the mission statement attempts to more explicitly identify who the fraternity impacts and in what way; both of which change over time. It provides the forum to directly link the long range objectives to which we serve. It also brings such constituencies as alumni, Central Office staff and volunteers more to the forefront of our thought. These are groups who involvement is critical to our success, but who seldom seem to get acknowledged on a more global basis.

As we thought about these various constituencies, they seemed to fall into five areas. The people outside the fraternity which directly benefit from our programs whether they be students, corporate executives, or the local community. These people are like customers, and who benefit from the services we provide. The general membership and the universities at which we have chapters. Society as a whole also cannot be overlooked. Lastly, our volunteers and the Central Office staff who make all our programs possible. Each of these constituencies has needs. As times change, so do their needs as does our "mission" in serving them. The accompanying "Mission Statement" (see page 7) attempts to address the current needs of all our constituencies.



The mission statement provides the necessary link between our constituencies' needs and the long range objectives we are striving to accomplish. Whatever our long range objectives are, they should always in some manner address the needs of our constituencies as expressed in the mission statement. The objectives should

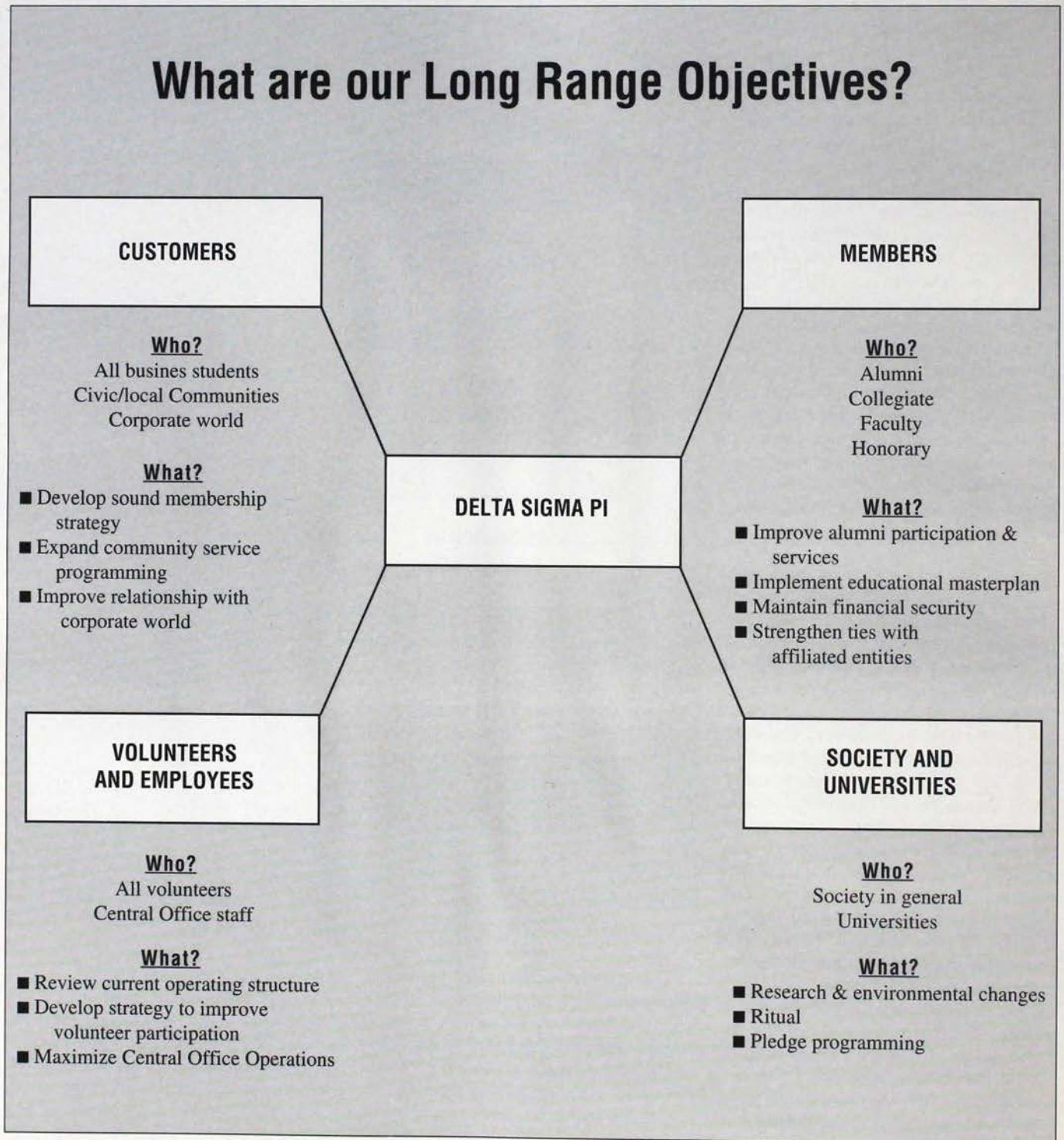
cover all constituencies else we are not living up to our stated mission.

The long range objectives outline the future direction of our fraternity. Historically, not too many members have seen or even known that these long range objectives exist. The objectives are something we can use to guide the fraternity, mea-

sure our progress, and describe to those outside the fraternity what our objectives are. This can also be of immense help to the fund raising efforts of our Leadership Fund, by succinctly identifying how additional funding would impact the fraternity's future.

As mentioned earlier, the current version of the mission statement and long range objectives embodies the comments and suggestions of many fraternity leaders. There will be a more in-depth presentation of this process and its results at the Grand Chapter Congress to gain more

wide spread input. The mission statement and long range objectives are evolving documents to be changed as need arises, but their existence ensures that our fraternity stays focused on meeting the needs of everybody it impacts.

1991 Sidney A. Sparks Collegian of the Year

Frederick Demopoulos, a graduate of California State University at Fullerton and an alumnus of Lambda Sigma Chapter has been chosen the 1991 Sidney A. Sparks Collegian of the Year. An International Marketing Major, Fritz maintained a 3.7 cumulative Grade Point Average during his four years at California State University - Fullerton and was honored on the Dean's List every semester during his studies. Initiated as a Founding Father of the Lambda Sigma Chapter on December 7, 1986, Fritz is a Life Member level supporter of the Delta Sigma Pi Leadership Fund. While a collegiate member of Lambda Sigma Chapter, he served as President, Senior Vice President, Vice President for Professional Activities, and Social Activities Chairman. Honored twice as the Most Outstanding Brother of Lambda Sigma Chapter, Fritz also served as Assistant Pledge Educator and Chairman of the Alumni Relations Committee. Further, he attended numerous Area and Regional Conferences, and the 36th Grand Chapter Congress in New Orleans, Louisiana.

Each chapter in the fraternity has the opportunity to nominate a member for this award. Established in 1971, this award recognizes the most outstanding collegiate member of the fraternity as evidenced by scholarship, extracurricular activities, fraternity services, demonstration of responsibility to self and others, and representation of conduct according to the highest standards of business ethics and integrities.

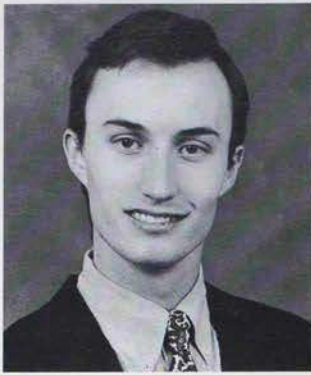

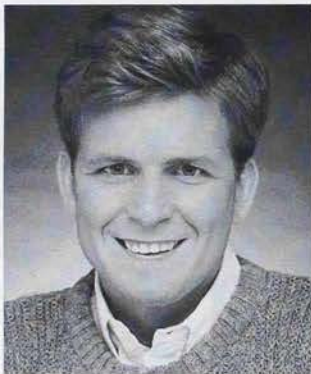

Going the Extra Mile

One of the most important principles of personal effectiveness is “going the extra mile”. Napoleon Hill, in his classic book *Think and Grow Rich*, pointed up the fact that employers really appreciate hard workers, people who dedication to excellence seems unquenchable. People who give 110% tend to get promoted and are given more responsibility; people who grouse, complain and hold back their effort don’t. It has always surprised me that employees who are chronic

complainers, “victims” of so-called terrible bosses, and habitual shirkers are themselves surprised when they don’t get promoted and/or don’t receive raises and bonuses. Think about it; why would a boss promote someone who is dragging their feet and constantly complaining?? Through the organizational “grapevine” (or informal communications network) and through formal performance standards, bosses find out who is supportive and helpful, as well as who is dragging his or her feet.

“Victim” behavior tends to create the well-known phenomenon of psychology called the self-fulfilling prophecy. Let us review how this works. The “victim” complains about his/her terrible boss, awful co-workers, miserable job duties, etc., etc.; their attitude creates resentment and a lack of appreciation from their boss or co-workers. Feeling the resentment, the “victim” gets to feel justified and complains more. The cycle intensifies when the victim finds other victims (or “enablers”) who agree with them about how awful things are. And

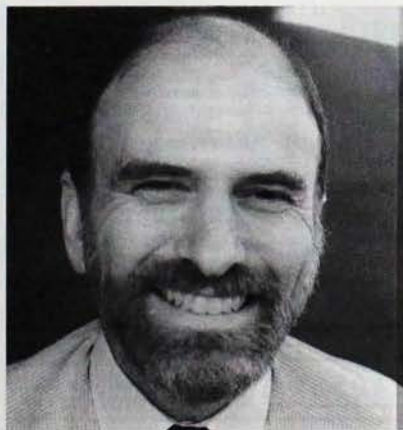
so it goes. The victims get the booby prize; they get to be “right” (according to their minds), perfectly justified in maintaining their rotten attitude, and they get to be miserable!

What is the way out of this negative spiral? The first step is to recognize a universal principle in the art of living effectively; whatever one pays attention to tend to expands in importance (to that person). If you concentrate on what appears to be wrong in a given situation, it will begin to feel more wrong. And, if you are able to establish a line of agreement with other victims and complainers, your collective energy will make it seem even more terrible. This principle works the other way, too, and is the basis of most “positive thinking” strategies. Pay attention to what is right in a situation and that will expand too!

If this is true, why do people seem to enjoy the victim stance so much? Perhaps it is because they have come to expect things not to work out and so, through the self-fulfilling prophecy they insure that they don’t! So, I challenge you to implement this personal strategy for success. Give more to your job than you are paid to do. Exercise initiative. Constantly look for ways you can be more useful to your boss. Purposefully emphasize what is right about your work situation.

Now, lest this sound too Pollyanna, I hasten to add that some people are working for difficult bosses or are in jobs for which they are not suited. If you offer yourself fully and willingly into your work situation and it still seems intolerable, you may need to switch jobs or companies. But, experience shows me that many people are having a terrible time at work simply because they are working at having a terrible time.

Lighten up on your negative attitude, emphasize what is right and see apparent miracles appear!

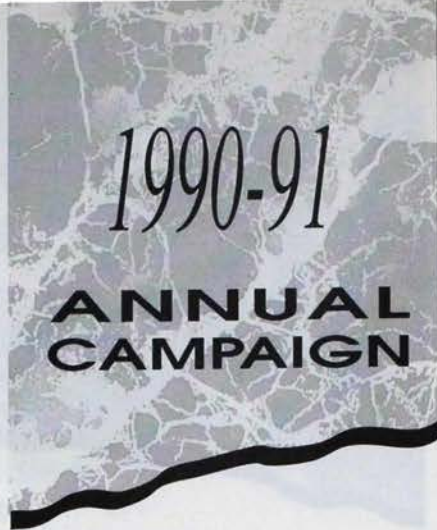

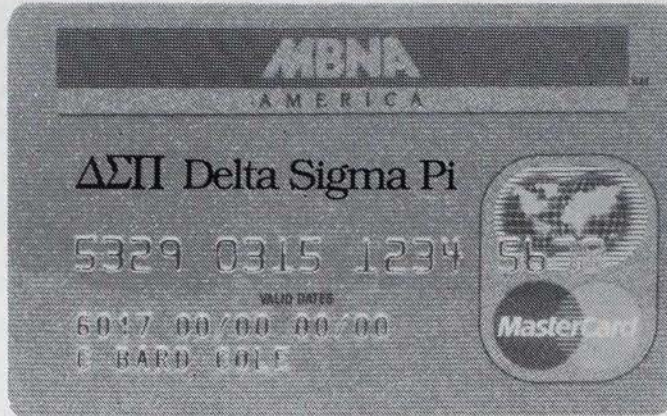

Headquarters Headlines

As I sit at my desk and overlook South Campus Avenue on this uncharacteristically overcast day, it strikes me that today is somewhat like that day ten years ago when I began my service as your Executive Director. Over these past ten years, there have been many changes, many accomplishments and many highlights for our fraternity as a whole and for me personally. Delta Sigma Pi, the Federal deficit and my waistline have all grown and changed. A ten year retrospective of changes in Delta Sigma Pi is not what I wanted to provide for you in this column. Those of you who have lived some or all of these years have been a part of them and have read about them in the pages of this publication. Those of you who were not a Deltasig until recently or who have been out of touch, need not worry much about the past as it is incumbent upon you and all of us who came before you to focus our efforts on the future. We need to concentrate our attention on what we as Brothers want Delta Sigma Pi to be in the 21st Century and at our centennial year of 2007.

In the interfraternal world of 1991, there are a wide variety of concerns and a host of problems that have captured the attention of the court and legal system and, of course, the media. Issues of alcohol and drug abuse, racism, criminal acts of hazing, sexism, coeducational membership, homophobia, "town and gown" relation-

ships and property damage by students and by student organizations are under discussion and study on campuses, in college communities and by the interfraternal system and its many umbrella organizations. Incidents of all of the previously stated issues have focused attention on the rights of others; the role of the university; the values of today's students and the future of the American college fraternity system. Problems with students and student organizations have gone beyond the traditional disciplinary systems of the universities and, for fraternal organizations, the "national". In today's world, matters of this nature are more likely to involve the legal and legislative systems instead.

The successful students organizations of the future will be those that provide their members with genuine opportunities for growth as a leader and as a person; that encourage respect for the rights and property of others; and that foster an environment that emulates the real world and real world situations and relationships.

Delta Sigma Pi has the tremendous opportunity to position itself, and already has to some degree, so that this type of environment can exist for its members. Many of the issues that concern fraternal leaders of today have already been faced, and have been positively overcome, by Delta Sigma Pi on the fraternity-wide or chapter level or both. The mere fact that over 41% of our total membership of 149,000 Brothers have joined our ranks since Delta Sigma Pi became a coeducational, professional business fraternity on November 7, 1975 is a shining example of how change in light of societal changes can be successful rather than detrimental.

Consider the following as some elements which I suggest for a continuing successful future for our great fraternity:

Recognize that Delta Sigma Pi represents a unique opportunity for students and strongly and boldly market it as such.

Encourage increased and enhanced participation and volunteerism by our alumni. Alumni, of course, must tell the leadership of the fraternity how they can help more alumni become "a point of light" for Delta Sigma Pi.

Chapter programming must offer unique opportunities for personal and professional growth for all members. Professional programming must be the centerpiece of the entire chapter experience.

Accentuate and build on positives. Negatives and mediocrity tend to generate more of the same faster and larger than positives.

Lastly, as a portion of our "Charge and Charter" ceremony for newly-installed chapters urges our members: "...to remember that you are also a citizen of the world---to remember that every human being has dignity and worth ---- and all the above will be for naught unless you do your part in making the world a better place in which to live".

My Dad often said, "Michael, never be satisfied; never be content". I am happy with where our fraternity is today but I am neither satisfied nor content with its current state. I do not plan to be either satisfied or content with where Delta Sigma Pi will be regardless of whether I get to write a twentieth anniversary article in 2001. I hope that you will be neither satisfied nor content in 2001 as well and that you will be there with me and many other Brothers to bring us closer to satisfaction and contentment - the goals which we should never ultimately reach!
