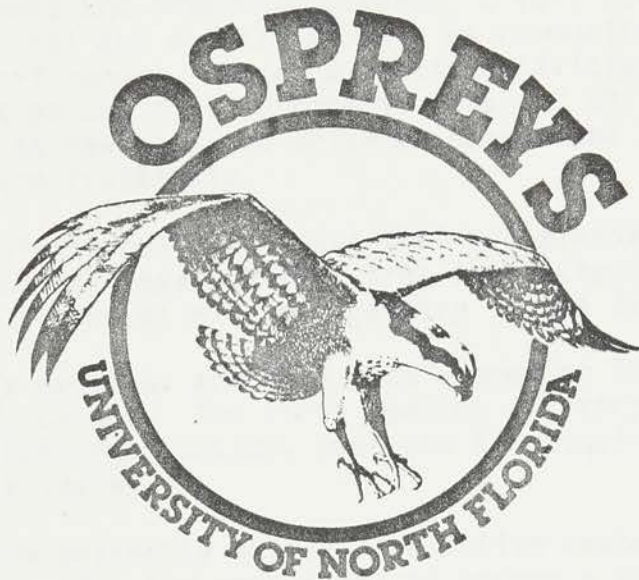

There are presently thirty-five active members in the Delta Pi Colony striving for the same goal, to become a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi. I hope that you will think so, too.




Dear Board of Directors:



The University of North Florida was established in 1965 as a public university. It is the largest university in the state of Florida and is a member of the State University System of Florida. The university was created by the Florida Legislature in 1965 and is the largest university in the state of Florida. 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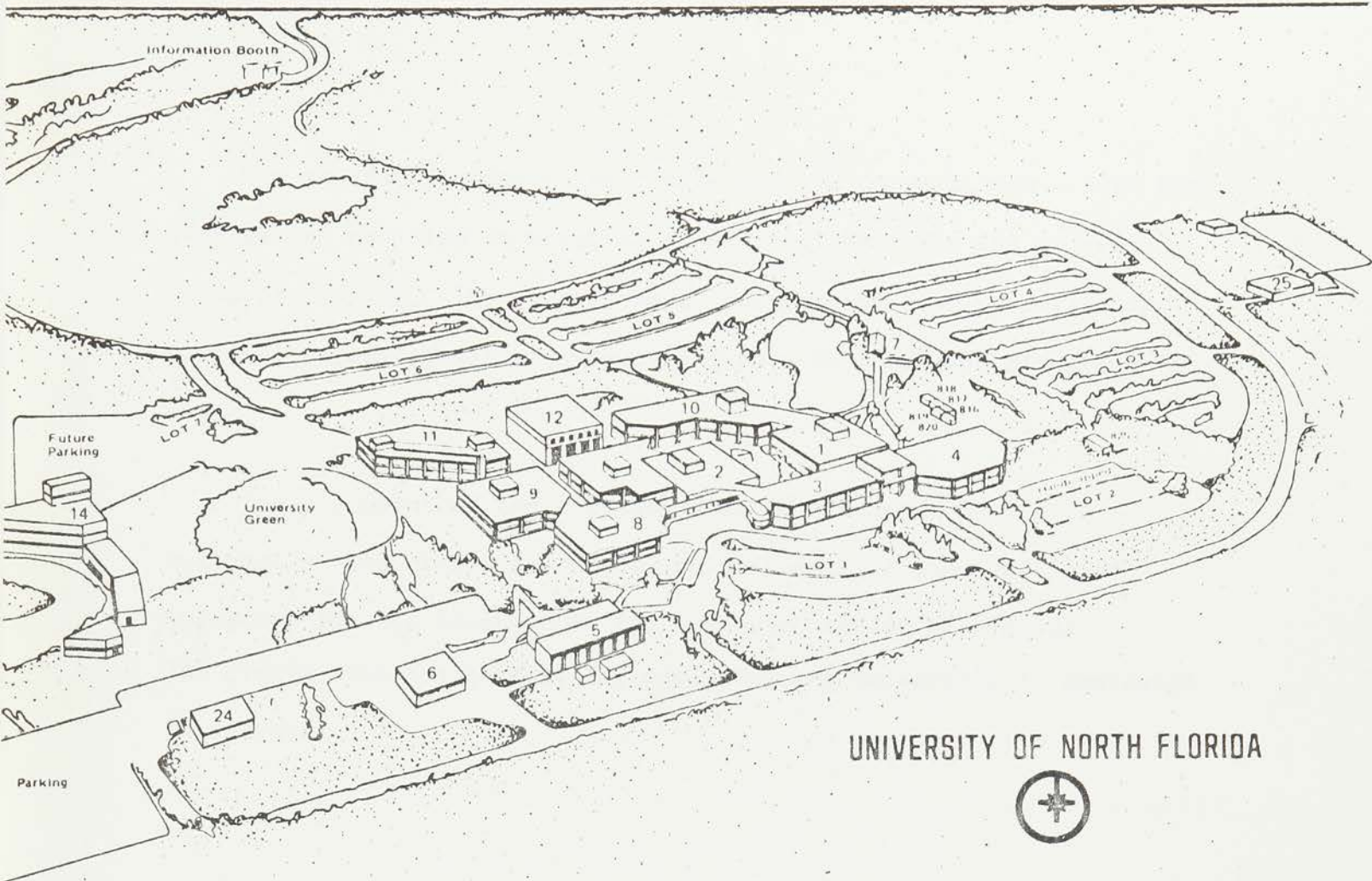
HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH FLORIDA

The University of North Florida campus is located on one thousand acres of timberland in southeast Jacksonville. Being designated as a bird sanctuary and a wildlife preserve, the land provides a spacious site and an attractive setting for learning at the University level.

The University of North Florida was authorized to be established in Jacksonville by the 1965 Florida Legislature. Initially, the University was authorized to offer programs at the junior, senior, and beginning graduate levels. The school is presently trying to achieve lower division status.

U.N.F. opened its doors on October 2, 1972 with 2,000 students comprising its charter class. By October 1981 the school had grown to a size of 5,175 students. Of those students, 36.18 percent of undergraduates are full-time and 63.82 percent are part-time. Of the students enrolled in graduate programs, 17.51 percent are full-time and 82.49 percent are part-time.

Full accreditation was granted to the University of North Florida on December 11, 1974 at the graduate and undergraduate levels by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The accreditation took place just over two years after the opening of the University.



U.N.F. opened its doors with just four buildings and alot of hope. Today, major structures on the campus consist of ten buildings in which classrooms, laboratories, lectures halls, offices, food service, library, and student support facilities are located. Other buildings include maintenance and purchasing facilities.

The campus is compact, with most of the buildings being connected by a two-story, covered pedestrian walkway. The campus is declared to be an easily accessible to handicapped students, with ramps and elevators located at various strategic points on campus. The parking areas which surround the campus are also designed for the handicapped.

Two ancient devices - the circle and the compass rose - have been adopted and modified in creating an official seal for the University of North Florida. The compass rose, a direction-finding device for mariners, symbolizes the University's role in providing direction for lives.

The placement of the compass roses in the upper northeast quadrant of the circle describes the University's upper-division character and its location in the northeast region of Florida. The circle itself signifies the community the University is dedicated to serve.



The Osprey was adopted officially as the University of North Florida mascot in November 1979. The Osprey, a member of the hawk family, is routinely sighted on the U.N.F. campus, where it can nest unmolested.

The Osprey's most distinctive feature is a wide, dark irregular stripe extending from the base of its bill and merging with its dark neck feathers. The Osprey's wingspan spreads to some four-and-a-half to six feet. It is a "gentle" hawk, since it seldom, if ever, harms other birds or animals.

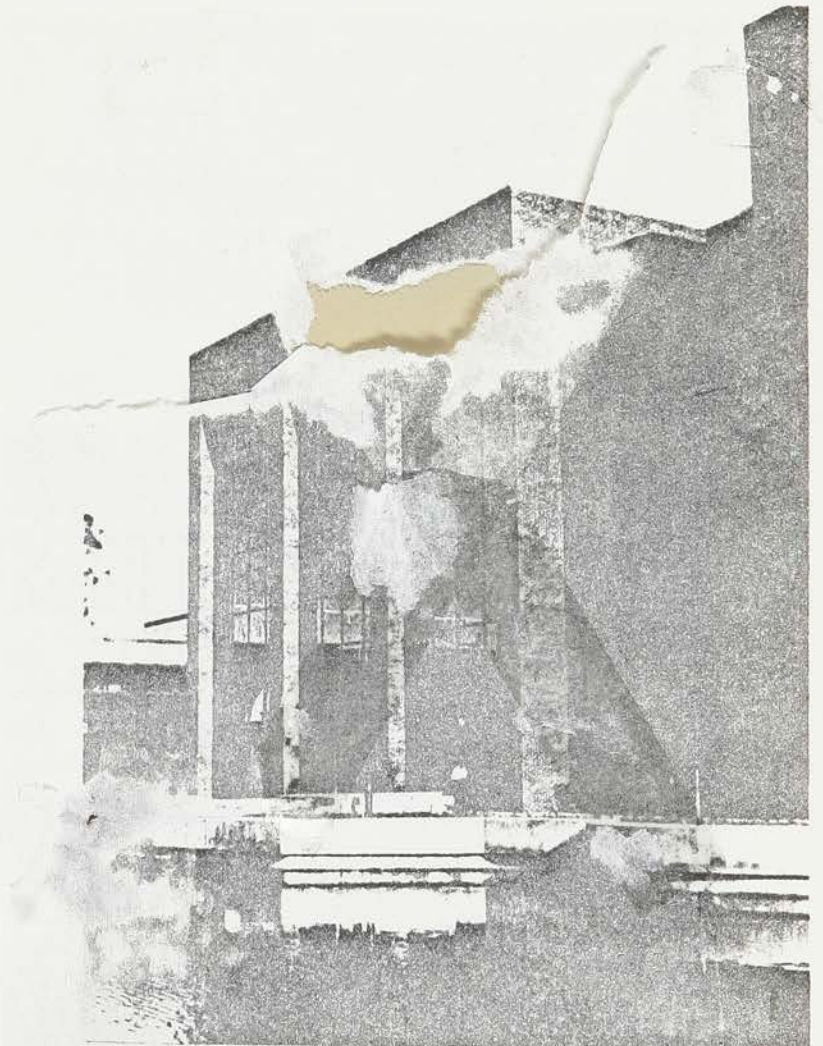
On the U.N.F. campus, there are presently no housing facilities available for students to utilize. There are plans to build apartments on campus within the next five years.

The average age of students attending U.N.F. is thirty-two. The campus is geared toward both the younger students as well as the older students. There are presently 206 full-time instructors at the University of North Florida. The number of students to teachers is 25.1 to 1, with an average class size of 30. The average age of instructors at U.N.F. is thirty-six.

HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

The major objective of the College of Business Administration is to educate men and women for positions of responsibility in private and public business and professions and to enable them to advance rapidly both in their careers and in their appreciation of the values and obligations of life in a free society.

James M. Parrish, Ph.D. (University of North Carolina - Chapel Hill), is the Dean of the College of Business Administration at the University of North Florida. Dr. Parrish joined the U.N.F. staff in 1970, two years before the school opened, with the goal of building a career-oriented business education program. Under the guidance of Dr. Parrish, the College of Business Administration was accredited in May 1976 by the American Association of Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB).

U.N.F. became the first school to achieve accreditation in less than the usual minimum time of five years. It also became the first upper division school to be approved by the association.

In May 1981, U.N.F.'s graduate programs in business administration received accreditation from the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business, therefore having both graduate and undergraduate programs accredited.

The College of Business awards about 100 to 115 Master's degrees in Business Administration and another 20 to 25 Master's degrees in Accountancy each year. U.N.F.'s graduate business programs are one of the largest in the state.

Among the University of North Florida's business faculty of 42, 38 hold a doctorate. They represent more than twenty-five doctoral degree-granting institutions. The library of U.N.F. holds more than 200,000 business 'units', including books, microfilm, and magazines. The library cost per student-year amounts to \$212 against a national average of \$48.

HISTORY OF THE DELTA PI COLONY

The Delta Pi Business Fraternity was formed at the University of Florida in February 1981. The first exposure that U.N.F. had with Delta Sigma Pi Fraternity was with the Jacksonville Alumni Club. The extensive efforts of the Jacksonville Alumni Club helped the Delta Pi Fraternity to form and become a recognized Colony of Delta Sigma Pi.

The first professional speaker sponsored by Delta Pi was Jacksonville Councilwoman Nancy Crabb. Another activity, which helped Delta Pi become more visible on campus as well as providing a service to the students of the University, was their sponsoring a political forum for those students running for office in the Spring Student Government Association Elections. This forum was designed to allow the candidates to speak to students about those issues which could affect them.

In April 1981, Delta Pi and the Jacksonville Alumni Club held a beach party near the house of one of the Alumni. This was a tremendous success in that it enabled the Colony members to learn more about Delta Sigma Pi and to also allow both parties to get to know each other on a more personal, 'brotherly' basis.

On May 8, 1981, the Delta Pi Colony had its first formal pledging ceremony, with the District Director and the Jacksonville Alumni Club officiating. Even with only twenty pledges, the Colony still had high hopes and worked hard toward achieving their goal of becoming an official chapter of Delta Sigma Pi.

During the month of May the University traditionally celebrates the coming of Spring on campus through what the University terms as 'Mayfest'. Mayfest is a time for clubs to compete with each other by playing either team or individual games. This practice of Mayfest allows students in different areas to get to know one another. In Mayfest, Delta Pi won first place in the No-Hands Tennis Relay, the Men's Tug-of-War, and the Egg Toss. Delta Pi also won third place in the Pie Eating Contest. This allowed Delta Pi to win overall Second Place for the Mayfest games.

On May 15, 1981, Delta Pi held a drawing for a dinner for two at Darryls Restaurant in Jacksonville. Prior to the drawing, the members of the Colony sold 238 tickets to students, faculty, family, and whomever else they ran into. The drawing drew alot of attention toward the Delta Pi Colony.

Delta Pi went on a tour of a local business on May 22nd, to the local Anheusier Busch Brewery plant in Jacksonville. Members learned about the production and operation processes that are typical for large scale manufacturers.

During the entire Spring Quarter Delta Pi held regular meetings once a week to plan their upcoming activities for the Summer Quarter. The summer term for the Colony was less active due to the number of students on vacation. On July 7th, Delta Pi sponsored a speaker, Phil Coleman, from Blinder Robinson, who spoke to about investing in Penny Stock. The Colony still held regular meetings once a week to start planning

for the Fall Semester Activities.

During the month of August, two members of the Delta Pi Colony attended the Grand Chapter Congress in Mackinac Island Michigan. The members brought back valuable information for the Colony to help us operate like a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi. A calendar of activities has been developed for the Fall Semester, explaining the activities planned for the Colony.

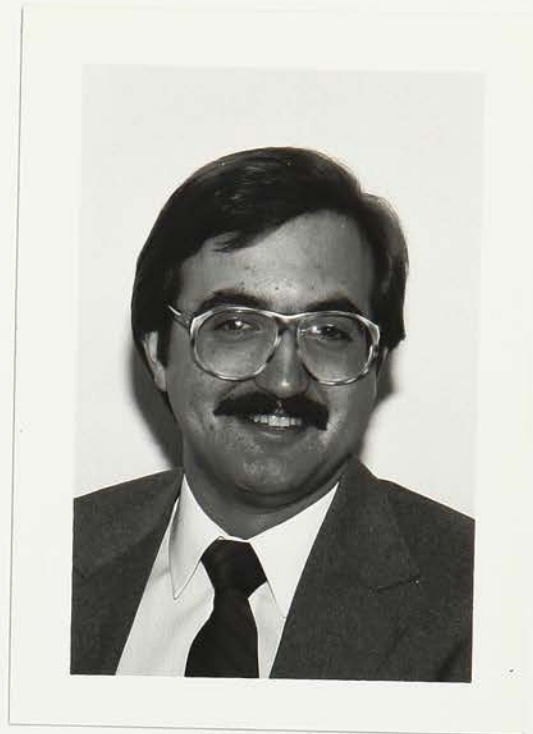

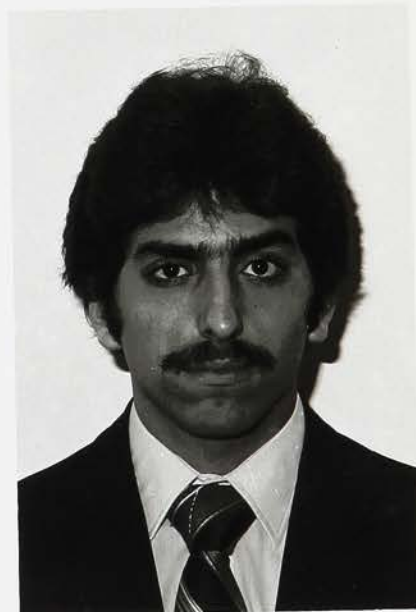

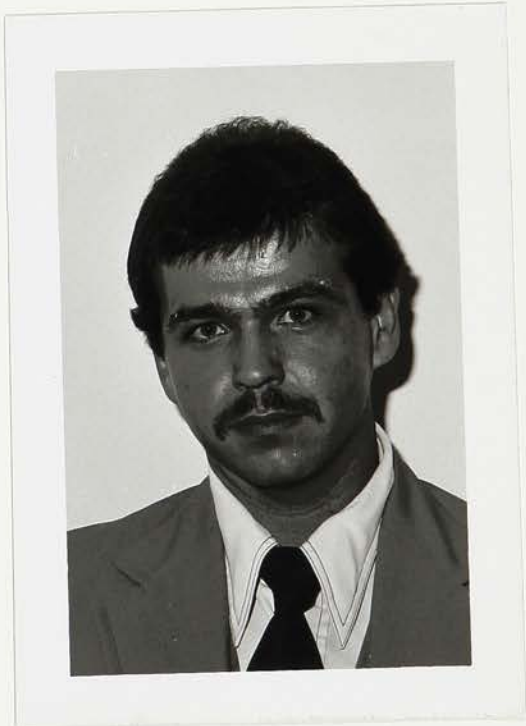
