We offer more than 120 undergraduate and graduate degree programs to approximately 17,000 students through values-centered programs that lead to development of the whole person. Our faculty, staff and administration are committed to an integrative liberal arts curriculum that focuses on the talents, interests and futures of our students. Lindenwood is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools.

Lindenwood University is known nationally and internationally for innovation, entrepreneurship and extraordinary dedication to students. We believe that education is the way to personal freedom and responsibility, which are the keystones of any democracy. We have a liberal arts heritage that goes back more than 185 years. - 1782 George Sibley born April 1.
- 1800 Mary Easton born on January 24
- 1814 George Sibley acquires 120 arpents of land at St. Charles, Missouri, which he named "Linden Wood"
- 1815 George C. Sibley and Mary Easton marry on August 19.
- 1827 George and Mary Sibley move to St. Charles, Missouri.
 Mary Sibley begins formally teaching local girls.
- 1829 George and Mary Sibley move to their new home at "Linden Wood."
- 1831 A Log cabin completed which accommodated twenty girls
- 1845 First Lindenwood student publication, "The Experiment"
- 1853 College deeded to the St. Louis Presbytery and incorporated by special act of the Missouri Legislature
- 1855 The Contract is let for the erection of Sibley Hall and excavation began June 3.
- 1856 Lindenwood receives its charter from the State of Missouri.
- 1863 George Sibley dies on January 31.
- 1867-1869 The Northern Presbyterian church sues French Strother for control of Lindenwood and wins.
- 1870 Control of Lindenwood moves from Presbyterian control to Synodical (Jan. 4).
- 1871 Recitation Hall is built.
- 1878 Mary Easton Sibley dies on June 20.
- 1908 Jubilee (Ayres) Hall is completed.
- 1910 Colonel James Gay Butler is elected a member of the Board of Directors of Lindenwood College.

- 1913 Lindenwood is recognized as an accredited Junior College by North Central Association.
- 1915 Butler Hall is dedicated, February 15
- 1916 Lindenwood purchases a campus cemetery from the First Presbyterian Church on 5th Street.
- 1917 Niccolls Hall is dedicated as a memorial to Dr. Samuel Jack Niccolls, February, 20.
 Jubilee Hall is renamed Ayres Hall.
- 1918 Margaret Leggat Butler dies on July 16. Combined estate of Col. James and Margaret Butler provides nearly \$4 million toward a permanent endowment for Lindenwood A four-year college curriculum is established by the Board of Directors, June 11.
- 1920 Ground broken for Roemer Hall on February 23.

 Lindenwood College is admitted to the Missouri College Union.

 Lindenwood students vote unanimously to abolish sororities; the school buys the sorority houses.
- 1921 Miss Pauline Weissgerber, of Lebanon, Missouri, becomes the first student to receive a Bachelor's degree at Lindenwood.
 - Lindenwood College granted full membership in the North Central Association of Colleges and Universities.
 - Roemer Hall is dedicated on October 21.
 - The Alumnae Gate is completed on Oct. 19.
- 1922 An extension is added to the Butler Hall Gymnasium (currently known as The Loft).
- 1924 Irwin Hall is dedicated on October 24.
- 1925 Sibley Hall is rededicated on October 29.
- The Centennial Celebration is held from May 27-31.Jubilee Hall is renamed Ayres Hall, October 21.
- 1928 Margaret Hall burns down on September 25Margaret Leggat Butler Library built

- 1929 Margaret Leggat Butler Library is dedicated
- 1937 The original greenhouse was constructed near Sibley Hall.
- 1938 Lillie Pickenpaugh Roemer Memorial Arts Building is dedicated.
- 1941 The President's Home is dedicated.
- 1948 KCLC begins broadcasting at 10 watts.
- 1950 Cobbs Hall is dedicated.
- 1954 Lindenwood College Chapel is dedicated. (Now St. Charles Presbyterian Church).
- 1961 McCluer Hall is dedicated.
- 1966 Young Science Hall is dedicated.
- 1967 Lindenwood offers J-Term classes for the first time.
- 1968 KCLC begins a sister AM station that reached all of St. Charles city.
- 1969 Harmon Fine Arts Building is dedicated.
 - Lindenwood officially admits men.
 - Lindenwood changes its name from "Lindenwood College" to "Lindenwood Colleges."

Lindenwood opens a black-and-white TV studio in the Memorial Arts Building.

- 1969-1973 Lindenwood joins the Seven College Consortium.
- 1970 Lindenwood begins offering evening classes (LC III).
- 1975 LCIE (LC IV) begins classes during 1975-1976 academic year
- 1976 Lindenwood begins offering masters degrees.
 - The football stadium is built and the St. Louis football Cardinals uses Lindenwood as summer training camp.
- 1977 Fire destroys the television studio.
- 1978 A student center is built, connecting "The Gables" and McCluer House.
- 1980 Lindenwood is accepted into the NAIA.
 Lindenwood begins offering weekend classes.
- 1981 St. Louis football Cardinals summer training camp moves elsewhere.

- 1983 Lindenwood changes its name from "Lindenwood Colleges" to "Lindenwood College"
- 1984 McCluer House is demolished.

A new television studio is opened in Young Hall.

- 1986 Lindenwood sells the college chapel to the St. Charles Presbyterian Church.
- 1988 Harlen C. Hunter Sports Complex is dedicated.
- 1989 Daniel Keck serves as interim President (January-May)
- 1994 Lindenwood Country Club is purchased.
 Studio East is purchased.
- 1996 Lindenwood University Cultural Center is purchased (previously it was First Baptist Church of St. Charles).

Robert Hyland Performance Arena built.

- 1997 Lindenwood College changes its name to "Lindenwood University."
 Nathan Boone Home is purchased.
- 2000 Lindenwood purchases the Commerce Bank building, transforming it into a Welcome Center.

Blanton Hall is dedicated.

Guffey Hall is dedicated.

- 2002 Spellmann Center is dedicated.
- 2003 Flowers Hall is dedicated.

Matthews Hall is dedicated.

Lindenwood takes ownership of the Belleville campus.

LUHE (TV) begins broadcasting out of Young Hall on Charter Communications Cable.

- 2004 Lindenwood purchases the ice arena in Wentzville, MO.
- 2005 Calvert Rogers Residence Hall is dedicated.

Rauch Memorial Hall is dedicated.

2007 Lindenwood begins offering Doctor of Education degrees.

Elm Street classrooms are opened.

"The Gables" is torn down.

2008 The J. Scheidegger Center for Fine and Performing Arts is opened.

Dorm G is opened.

Pfremmer Hall is opened

The President's Home is renamed Warner Hall and becomes home to the School of Education.

Harmon Hall expansion begins.

Growth and Development

Lindenwood University is in the midst of a bold campus expansion plan that blends the old with the new and provides facilities that will carry Lindenwood well into the future.

Recently, the University renovated a new building in Dardenne Prairie, adjacent to O'Fallon, Mo that houses its School of Nursing and Allied Health Sciences. The 69,000-square-foot building, purchased in fall 2012, is equipped with classrooms, labs, and office facilities for the new school, which in fall 2013 began offering a Bachelor's in Nursing degree completion program for Registered Nurses who already have two-year nursing degrees at the community college level. The facility also houses nursing and allied health courses offered by St. Charles Community College.

In fall 2012, the University opened a \$9 million Student-Athlete Center adjacent to Hunter Stadium. The signature element of the three-story, 43,000-square-foot building is an Academic Success Center to support athletes' academic endeavors. The building houses locker rooms for Hunter Stadium's NCAA sports, athletic training facilities, coaches' offices, and a new Champions' Room.

Other growth includes the renovation and expansion of Harmon Hall, which now houses the university's School of Business and Entrepreneurship. Nine classrooms and several seminar halls, breakout rooms, Dunseth Auditorium, and office space have been added. The existing interior has also been updated and remodeled and a new facade added to the entire building.

The Evans Commons opened in August 2011. The 119,000-square-foot structure includes a second dining hall, multipurpose courts, a suspended jogging track, a workout facility, recreation rooms and plenty of areas for student relaxation.

These projects are the result of dynamic growth on the campus going back to 1989. Currently, Lindenwood educates more than 16,000 students a year in all programs at two campuses, eight regional centers, and extension sites throughout the state.

School of Business and Entrepreneurship

In 1963, the Board of Directors of the College approved the creation of the Department of Economics and Business at Lindenwood College under the leadership of President Dr. Franc McCluer. The new department was seen as a way to give a better understanding of modern economic society in preparation for better citizenship, to provide a foundation for graduate or professional study. The department co-chairmen were Dr. John B. Moore, Miss Emma Purnell, and Mrs. Sue Brizius. The department offered degrees in Bachelors of Arts and Bachelor of Sciences in Economics and Office Management.

In 1972, Business Degrees were starting to be offered and in 1974, Dean Dr. Elwood Miller changed the name to the Business Department. He grew the amount of degrees that were offered in the department and formed the Evening College.

In the 1980s, Lindenwood College had a Department of Business. Bob King was the Dean of the department and Dr. James Spainhower, former Treasurer of the State of Missouri, was the President of the College. The Business Department had six full-time faculty and the student body was considerably smaller than today. Lindenwood College was small. Throughout the 80s and 90s, the Business Department was served by seven different deans and was later renamed the Division of Management in the mid-90s.

In 1989, the Board of Directors hired Dennis Spellmann as Interim President and later

President to assist the College in making revisions. He made sweeping changes in several areas.

Among those changes, departments were moved from one physical location on campus to
another as he saw a vision for the College. The Department of Business moved from Cobbs Hall
which had offices on the first floor and dormitory rooms on the upper floors to the Memorial

Arts Building in the late 80s, early 90s. The Memorial Arts Building had office space and eventually two classrooms to better meet the needs of what would soon become a growing faculty and student population.

In the 1990s, Lindenwood saw increased numbers of students on campus. Class sizes started to grow. More diversity in the types of classes expanded. Computers were added to the campus for classroom labs. In addition, a networked system of computers was installed in administrative and faculty offices. A Performance Arena and Student Center, as well as residence halls were built.

In 2000, Jay Hardman came to Lindenwood and later become Dean of the Division of Management. More faculty members were hired to meet the needs of the increasing student population. During his tenure, Lindenwood College became Lindenwood University. The ISEE, the Institute for the Study of Economics and the Environment, a center of research and education was founded in 2002 with a focus on applying economic principles to environmental challenges. Dr. Ed Morris, became the Dean of the Division of Management in 2007. Under his direction, the Division continued to grow. The Division was renamed the School of Business and Entrepreneurship in 2009 to better reflect the work that was taking place in the School. The Duree Center for Entrepreneurship at Lindenwood University was established to inspire and support the entrepreneurial spirit in Lindenwood students and the larger community. Dr. Morris spearheaded the move to seek specialized accreditation for the School. In 2011, the School of Business became accredited by the ACBSP – Accreditation Council for Business Schools and Programs.

Under the guidance of the current Dean, Roger Ellis, who became Dean in 2011, Harmon Hall was entirely renovated and additional space was added to the existing structure. There are

state of the art classrooms and computer labs, two auditoriums, breakout rooms to be used for small group meetings and tutoring, faculty offices, a kitchen, and a boardroom. Currently, the School of Business has 1550 undergraduate students majoring in 14 areas as well as 550 graduate students with 10 areas of emphasis. Bachelor of Art and Bachelor of Science degrees are conferred in major areas of study within the School of Business and Entrepreneurship.

Several clubs provide opportunities for students in the School of Business and Entrepreneurship.

Research is being conducted by various faculty members within the School. Students are taking advantage of many internship opportunities. The Sport Management Program is a recognized program by the North American Society for Sport Management (NASSM) and the Accounting program is seeking specialized accreditation in the spring 2013. In addition to the Dean, there is an Associate Dean, Division and Department Chairs, a Division Coordinator, thirty-four full-time faculty as well as adjunct faculty, Graduate Assistants, and work and learn students who support the operation of the School of Business and Entrepreneurship

Colony History

In October of 2011, Angela Kearbey, a brother from the Kappa Omicron chapter of Delta Sigma Pi, decided to see what she needed to do to start a colony at Lindenwood University. After a couple of emails, she got in contact with Kevin Weber, and the wheels were put into motion.

After posting flyers and sending out emails, on October 25, 2011, an informational meeting led by Lou Maul V was held in Harmon Hall, and a petition was signed to start a colony. The name Kappa Delta Iota was chosen by the members who attended. Meetings were held during November, but after a break for finals and winter break, member interest was lacking. On February 7th, the 6 remaining members met with Lou Maull and Will Conner, and officers were elected.

On February 8th the members of the colony met with Kyle from Central Office. The colony had a movie night social on February 16th, then weekly meetings were held on Tuesday nights. On February 21st, bylaws and policies were drafted. On February 28th we had our first professional speaker.

March started off with the colony bylaws, policies and procedures being voted on and adopted on the 6th. The first community service project was on March 8th. The colony participated in Swab for Sean, which was a campus event to help find bone marrow donors. March 13th had a visit from Kimberly Brickler-Ulrich, the chapter advisor, and she was introduced to the two district directors, Will Conner and Jordan Terefencko. March 17th, we participated in a community service event, volunteering at a pancake breakfast fundraiser for the campus YMCA. After coming back from spring break the colony had their first recruitment

week in Apirl. The colony set up a table in the front of the business building and tried to spread the word about Delta Sigma Pi.

The colony continued to grow on campus. In 2012, we set up our first bank account. During the next few semesters we experienced several fluxuations in our membership. During this time we joined the Greek Council thinking it would gain us some recognition. Sometime after we joined, we found that Greek Council had different priorities than our organization and we retracted our membership. Despite this setback, through the efforts of the members of the colony, in the spring of 2013, we had officially raised enough money to cover our petition fee.

In August of 2013, colony members planned a few weeks of recruitment to start the semester off. At this time we were introduced to Wendy Eilers. She met with members of the executive board in order to get an idea of where we were at in the colonization process.

Afterwards, she provided suggestions for advancement. In these few weeks of recruitment we had recruited several individuals that helped with recruitment over the next few months. During the Alumni Panel recruitment event, we met Matt Hudson, who has provided support and guidance throughout his involvment. In December of 2013, Krystal Carpenter stepped down as President, during the election in the fall semester of 2013, and Rebecca Peil was elected to be President. In the spring of 2014, Matt Hudson became a District Director of the colony. Over the next few months before the spring semester the new executive board put together an intense recruitment strategy. Within the first few weeks of the semester the executive board led a recruitment camaign that brought in enough new members for us to petiton.







Professional Activities

On March 19, 2012 the colony brought in a speaker, form a non-profit organization in St. Louis, Better Family Life, Inc. Their mission is to plan and establish cultural, artistic, workforce, youth, economic, housing and educational programs that help promote positive changes within families and communities. She spoke to us about the goals of the organization and what she does to move toward that goal.





On April 17, 2012, the colony listened to a speaker, Dr. Witherspoon from the university, discuss the issue of hazing. He explained what it is and his experiences while being involved in an organization as a student. Also, Dr. Witherspoon stressed how important it is that no one takes part in hazing and if it happens to report it and prevent it.




On February 14th, 2014 the colony helped make Parachord bracelets as part of the National Community service project. We split first place recognition with the help of SLAC and Eta Nu.
