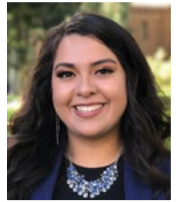
Epsilon. Brandon worked in college athletics for the past 16 years, focusing on marketing, communications and sales roles across various campuses.

MINUTES IN SECONDS FROM AUGUST 13, 2023 BOARD MEETING

- Accepted the following members into the Golden Council: Regional Vice Presidents **Kyle Bischoff, Sara Casey, CJ Cook, Danielle Gohman, Zachary Hanson, Angi Coston Jones, Laura Olivencia, Ma Melanie Parazo, Noel Miller, Ron Neto-Taylor, Grissel Rodriguez, Louise Santos, Rebecca Ruthrauff, Katie McGrath**, National Collegian of the Year **Brennen Feder**, and Central Office Staff **Sara Erl**.
- Proposal for new vision statement was not moved, with additional feedback being solicited during the Feedback Sessions during GCC.
- Updated policy to formalize current practice of delegating the authority of assistance and discipline actions to staff in consultation with Regional Vice Presidents.
- Changed responsibility of designating a GCC Host Committee and Chair to the Grand President, taking the Board out of the process.
- Updated policy so that Regional Vice Presidents have clear responsibility to take action on chapter issues, rather than just reporting issues to the Provincial Vice President.
- Clarified staff versus volunteer responsibilities and removed duplicative or assumed processes in regards to LEAD Provincial Conferences and LEAD Schools.
- Instructed staff to update all gendered language in policies to be gender neutral, while not changing the meaning or intent of any policy. Updated policy will not go into effect until March, after Board review of updates in January.
- Updated policy related to a Standards Hearing appeal process.
- The following policies were updated to support a more strategic Board:
 - o Removed Provincial Vice President approval of off-campus initiations, instead making staff responsible for approval.
 - o Changed approval of campus specific qualified programs from the Provincial Vice President to the Executive Director.
 - o Cleaned up policy to match previous changes related to the Executive Director handling offers of receivership.
 - o Granted authority to the Finance Committee to write off chapter debt up to an amount as restricted by the Board through the budgeting process.
- The following policy updates were approved to support cleaner governing documents:
 - o Aligned policy with practice related to the version of Robert's Rules of Order used.
 - o Removed specific requirements or policies related to outside education conference cancellations. In the event such program was restarted, appropriate program-specific policies would be implemented.
 - o Removed chapter Congress reporting, as it is not used.
 - o Adjusted policy to reflect current practice of allowing alumni chapter affiliation changes 12 months a year and simplify those requests to reflect the Central Office's handling IRS reporting.
 - o Removed specific reference to collegiate dues exception as relates to CMP, aligning with previous decisions to remove CMP requirements from policy.
 - o Removed additional reference to the Awards and Recognition Guide regarding alumni chapter awards.

- o Removed reference to outdated regalia ordering processed.
- o Removed outdated communication expense reimbursement for volunteers.
- The following policies were removed due to redundancy:
 - o Removed a declaration of responsibility that the Board of Directors will determine price of the official badge, listed elsewhere.
 - o Removed a statement that appointing committee members is a duty of the Grand President, addressed in Bylaws.
 - o Removed duties of the Vice President-Finance and additional duties of the Past Grand President, listed in Bylaws.
 - o Removed redundancy of Regional Vice President duties already assigned to District Directors, managed by the RVPs.
- The following unnecessary policies were removed:
 - o Removed a contradiction within policies as typically "Central Office" is used to refer to the staff, not the building. Clarifies the responsibilities of the Board of Directors to control purchase, rent, or lease of land or buildings, thus limiting a relocation of the headquarters building without needing to explicitly call out the Central Office location.
 - o Removed specific conference requirements for LEAD programming.
 - o Removed restrictions regarding overlapping Provincial Council Meetings.
- Discussed the Board's role in the approval process for chapter petitions.
- Discussed the Board's stance on legislative items that would be discussed on the Congress floor.

MINUTES IN SECONDS FROM AUGUST 18, 2023 BOARD MEETING:

- Appointed **Stephen Dominy** as National Standards Committee Chair; **Claire Roberts** as National Professional Development Committee Chair; and **Kayleigh Lot** as National Scholastic Development and Awards Chair.
- Noted vacancies in Central and Capital Regions and plans for holding those special elections.
- Board shared feedback on campaigning policies and business session delegate education, to be reviewed prior to the 2025 Grand Chapter Congress.
- Approved to move previous alumni chapter franchising and chartering fee bylaw amounts to policy, asked Finance Committee to review and submit a formal recommendation for 2023-24 fees.
- Board members were encouraged to think about how best to handle special meeting or mail vote from Resolution and to think about scope of what the Board wants to bring to the Grand Chapter before the September meeting.
- Board discussed printing of new Ritual Books. Staff will bring options to the September meeting.
- Vision Statement Task Force will be recreated with similar charge to review feedback from GCC and submit new recommendation in September.
- Membership Qualifications Task Force will be recreated with exact charge as before.

Looking Forward

“When we accept tough jobs as a challenge and wade into them with joy and enthusiasm, miracles can happen.” – Arland Gilbert, author

I am excited for the future of Delta Sigma Pi. During Grand Chapter Congress, I was inspired by conversations with members, and as I continue discussions with Board members, staff and other stakeholders, I am eager to see what we can achieve together.

As we set our goals for the next biennium and review our long-term Strategic Priorities, we must acknowledge while there are trends in higher education (such as the enrollment cliff) and society as a whole (individuals wanting more from the organizations they are giving their time to), we can capitalize on our strengths and sometimes by bringing new tools to the table. And we will do that in a few ways...

Growing New Chapters and Improving Support for Existing Chapters: Many of us have seen recent shifts in college enrollment. Smaller institutions, especially those with fewer resources are shrinking or ceasing to exist, while larger institutions and those with more resources are continuing to grow. We are addressing this by maximizing our resources—focusing them on growing institutions and adding or helping grow existing chapters on those campuses. Our new Growth Consultant Team is actively working to determine the best path for chartering and reactivating chapters, while providing more hands-on support. Our Chapter Development Team is also focusing on supporting chapters in a way that efficiently uses all resources, including cost and time.

Improving Membership ROI with Education and Connection: The return on investment continues to come under higher scrutiny from tuition payers as costs rise. As a

result, institution offerings continue to shift focus, often devoting more resources to career prep and job placement. We are working to ensure our national membership benefits (especially educational) are focused on adding value, not duplicating campus offerings. Delta Sigma Pi is focusing our educational tools on leadership development. Local offerings (offered by the school and our chapters) will help members find and get jobs, while our national programs will help them stand out in those jobs. We are also working on improving accessibility of educational and training opportunities. We are increasing focus on asynchronous learning, accessible 24/7, and bringing in-person events closer to our members, reducing the time and financial commitment of our members.

Finding New Ways for Alumni to Help: Shifts in perceived value of time have led to changing motivations for volunteering and declines in overall volunteerism in the U.S. In response, we are looking to modernize volunteer opportunities. We must ensure available opportunities appeal to qualified potential volunteers and provide different ways for alumni to stay connected with Delta Sigma Pi. The Fraternity is also strengthening and empowering staff resources so that volunteer efforts can be targeted to where they are best suited.

For 116 years, we have taken steps to solve problems facing Delta Sigma Pi in the moment and in the future. We have celebrated wins, learned from our setbacks and formed great relationships. It takes all Deltasigs to get us to our fullest potential so please provide your feedback by emailing ideas@dsp.org or raising your hand to volunteer at dsp.org/get-involved. Our 55th Grand Chapter Congress was a Blast!

We blasted off to Houston for a successful Grand Chapter Congress for more than 800 brothers and guests. Beyond the warm temperatures in Texas, the event itself was hot! Main events, captured by Your Best Shot Photography and available on our Facebook page, included:



GRAND CHAPTER ACTIONS

The Grand Chapter passed the following legislation during the 55th Grand Chapter Congress. Updated bylaws are available online at dsp.org/bylaws.

- Article II, Section 7 was amended to remove the ability for a delegate at Grand Chapter Congress to proxy their vote to the Executive Director.
- Article II, Section 11 was amended to move the provincial boundary line between the North Central and Northeastern Provinces and to move the chapters of the East Central Region into the North Central Province, effective upon passage. During a special North Central Provincial Council meeting, the Province formalized this change, recreating the former East Central Region, now in the North Central Province.
- Article VII, Section 2 was amended to improve clarity around when and how a Provincial Council can meet, improving ability for chapters to be part of organizational change processes. The amendment adds language to allow the Provincial Vice President to call a special Provincial Council meeting and improves clarity around actions of the Provincial Council between meetings.
- Article XI, Section 1 and 2 were amended to remove the amounts of the alumni chapter charter and franchise renewal fees from Bylaws. It also allows the Board of Directors to adjust these fees, within limits, without a vote of the Grand Chapter.

- Numerous educational sessions and roundtable discussions on topics ranging from recruitment and member engagement to personal finance, getting a job, leadership skills and more.

- **The Grand President's Reception and Game Night** featuring full-size arcade games, food, music, and more.

- Presentations of more than 50 alumni members with **Golden and Silver Helmets** (see page 44) and recognition of our Leadership Foundation donors (see page 24) during Thursday's Alumni Recognition Program. Nearly 90 different collegiate and alumni chapters were also presented with chapter awards on Thursday and during Friday's Awards Luncheon (see page 34).

- Article XVII. Section 12 will be removed from Bylaws, removing the Scholarship Key Program from Bylaws allowing the Board of Directors to review and adapt the program.
- Article XVIII. Section 2 and 3 and Article XIX. Section 3 and 4 were amended to confirm the ability for RVPs and PVPs to submit change amendments of Bylaws to their respective Provincial Councils. It also eliminates confusion on when proposals must be submitted for Provincial Council meetings.
- Ritual Article VIII. Amendments to the Ritual within the Regulations Governing the Ritual of the International Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi were amended to confirm the ability for RVPs and PVPs to submit Ritual amendments to their respective Provincial Councils. It also eliminates confusion on when proposals must be submitted for Provincial Council meetings.

The following Resolution was also approved:

- The Board of Directors/ Grand President shall bring legislation for delegates to vote on prior to fall 2024 that supports a Board of Directors (responsible for strategic advancement) separate from a management team (responsible for day-to-day activities).

Additional bylaws amendments regarding the membership of the Grand Chapter and allowing all members to submit bylaw amendments were not adopted. Ritual proposals regarding the meaning of the color red, use of the term "headmaster", the

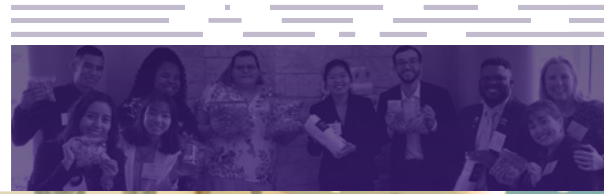

Much business was also conducted during this meeting of the Grand Chapter. Past Grand President Bill Kinsella served as Chancellor, and Jeff Neurauter, *DC Metro*, served as Parliamentarian. For results of the bylaws legislation and Ritual proposals voted on by the Grand Chapter, see "Grand Chapter Actions" starting on page 7.

Throughout the week, the Leadership Foundation raised nearly \$190,000 for future educational programming. Thank you to all of our donors!

Kinsella Presented with Lifetime Achievement Award

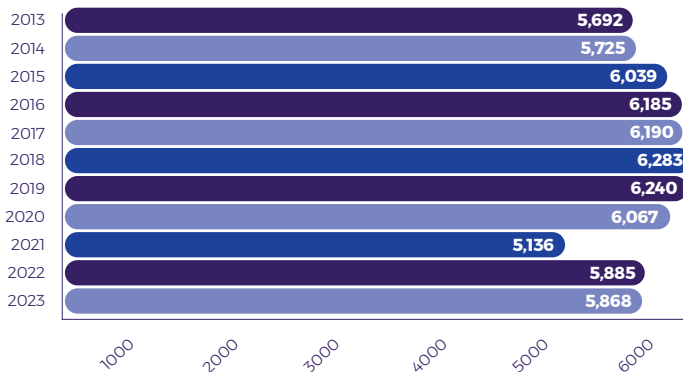

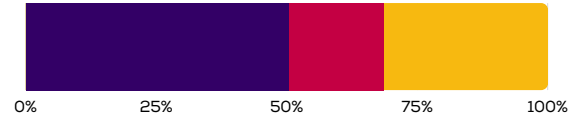

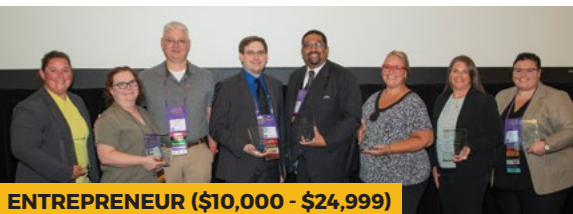

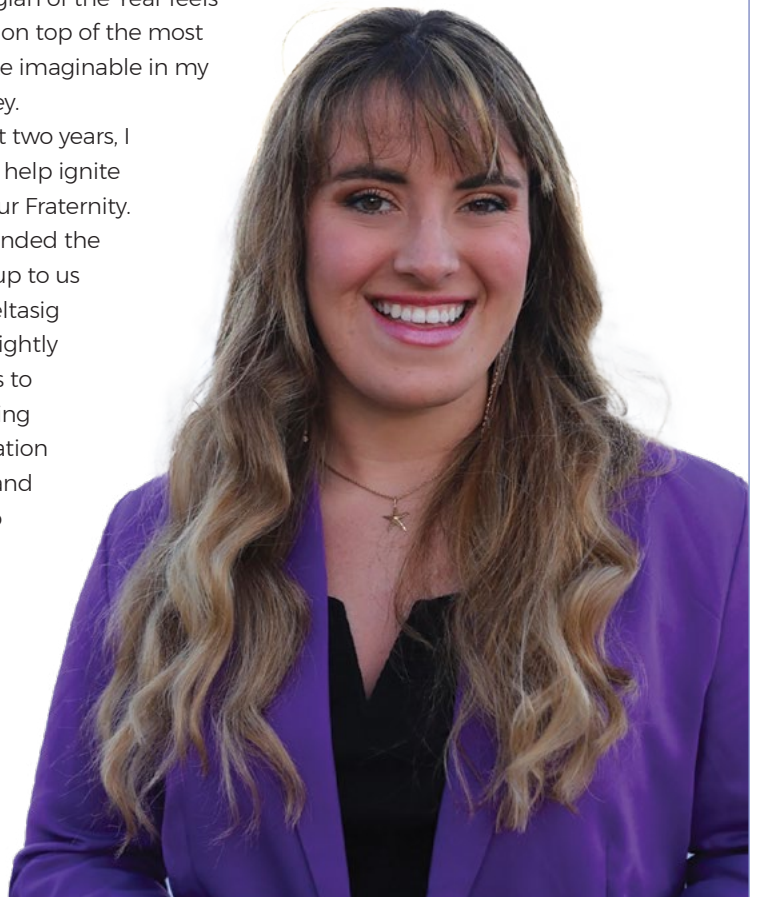
prove collaboration and communication and bring the collegiate voice to the forefront of strategic problem solving and decision making.

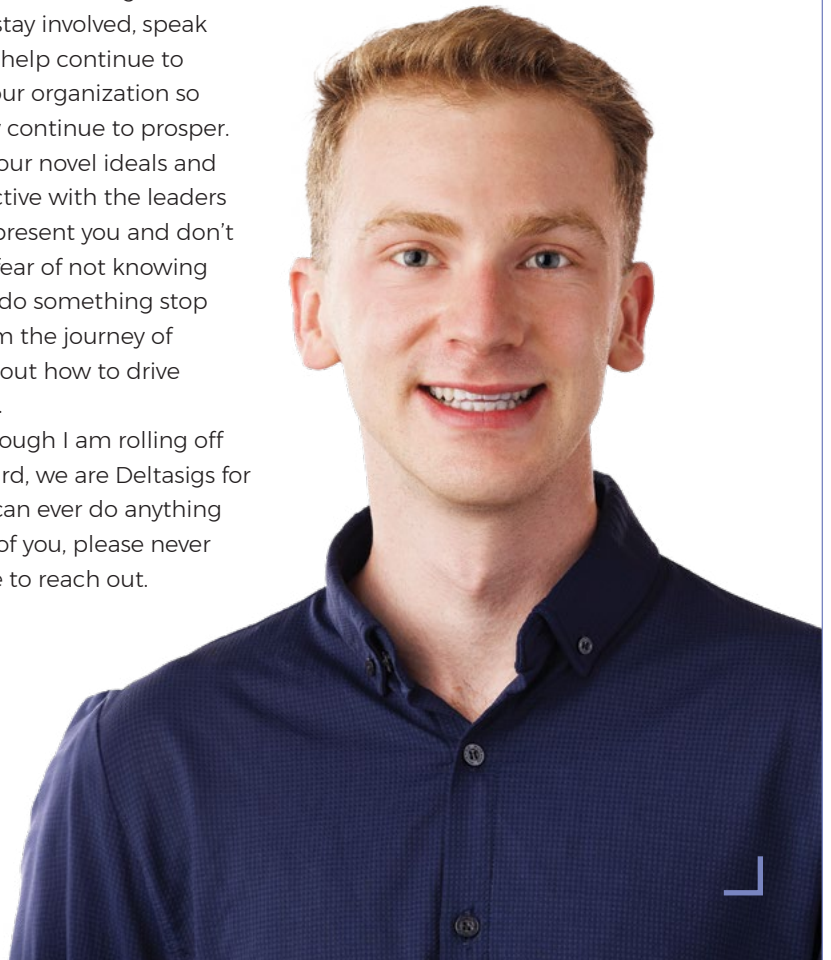
Although I am rolling off the Board, we are Deltasigs for life. If I can ever do anything for any of you, please never hesitate to reach out.
