

Three Newest Chapters

he 1988-89 academic year continued to be one of growth for Delta Sigma Pi. Following the reactivation of Gamma Chapter at Boston University in December, 1988, and the installation of Lambda Chi Chapter at the University of California at Riverside in January, 1989, the fraternity continued its growth with the installation of three new collegiate chapters. Lambda Psi Chapter became the first collegiate chapter of Delta Sigma Pi to be installed in Hawaii with its installation at the University of Hawaii at Hilo. The 13th collegiate chapter of the fraternity founded in the state of Illinois was installed as Lambda Omega Chapter at Quincy College in Quincy, Illinois. The second collegiate chapter founded in Nevada, and the fraternity's 223rd and newest chapter, was installed as Mu Nu Chapter at the University of Nevada at Las Vegas. These three collegiate chapter installations continue the growth Delta Sigma Pi has been experiencing in recent years. The hard work of the members of the colonies which were installed as the fraternity's newest chapters is a tribute to themselves and to Delta Sigma Pi.


Hawaii's First Chapter

On Saturday, April 22, 1989, the fraternity's 221st and first collegiate chapter in Hawaii was installed as Lambda Psi Chapter at the University of Hawaii at Hilo. On that date, collegiate and alumni Brothers from across the country flew to Hilo, Hawaii, to install Lambda Psi Chapter. Participating in the installation ceremonies were Grand President John V. Henik, Western Provincial Vice President William R. Kinsella, South Pacific Regional Director Paul J. P. Garcia, District Directors Clayton E.

Christopher H. and Chong Dunavent, Director of Chapter Services C. Dean Ferguson and members of the Hawaii Alumni Chapter of Delta Sigma Pi. Although Lambda Psi Chapter was installed on April 22, 1989, the groundwork for the installation was first laid four years ago alumni Brother Clayton E. Chong. Brother Chong, a resident of Hilo, Hawaii, is also an alumnus of Alpha Upsilon Chapter at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio. In the summer of 1985, Brother Chong returned to Oxford and briefly visited The Central Office. At that time he expressed a strong interest in establishing both collegiate and alumni chapters in the state of Hawaii. Brother Chong returned to Hawaii and was instrumental in forming the Hawaii Alumni Chapter. He immediately contacted Dr. Robert King, Chairman of the Business Administration and Economics Division at the University of Hawaii at Hilo. Approval was granted to begin recruiting efforts and to establish a Delta



Recruiting efforts were first conducted during the spring semester of 1987. The colony established on campus held its first meeting on June 11, 1987, and selected a colony name of Alpha Theta Kappa. A limited number of activities were conducted during the summer and fall of 1987.

Then South Pacific Regional Director William R. Kinsella visited Hilo, Hawaii, during the summer of 1987 to provide information and assistance to the Hawaii Alumni Chapter and the Alpha Theta Kappa Colony. Recruiting plans for the 1987–88 academic year were finalized during this time frame.



The colony published its first newsletter during July of 1988. A second issue was published in November. A broad calendar of activities was planned for the fall semester of 1988 and the spring semester of 1989.

Alpha Theta Kappa Colony continued to recruit additional members and conduct a broad spectrum of activities. In conjunction with a trip planned to the West Coast and Honolulu, Assistant Executive Director

Michael T. Walsh visited the colony in Hilo on February 4-6, 1989. After meeting with members of the colony and reviewing their programs, Assistant Executive Director Michael T. Walsh and Brother Clayton E. Chong pledged 46 members of Alpha Theta Kappa Colony in accordance with the fraternity's Ritual on February 6, 1989. Brother Chong was chosen to coordinate the colony members' pledge education program which continued until April.

On the morning of Saturday, April 22, 1989, representatives from the Hawaii Alumni Chapter gathered with national officers for the installation ceremonies which resulted in the initiation of 24 charter members who formed Lambda Psi Chapter. Grand President John V. Henik served as Headmaster for the Ritual Team. Other members of the Installation Team included Western Provincial Vice President William R. Kinsella, South Pacific Regional Director Paul J. P. Garcia, District Directors Clayton E. Chong and Christopher H. Dunavent, Director of Chapter Services C. Dean Ferguson and Hawaii Alumni Chapter members Randall Lee, Lori Ching and Lynn Imperial.

Following the installation of the chapter which took place on the 3rd Floor of the Campus Center at the University of Hawaii at Hilo, was the Installation Reception and Banquet. The Reception and Banquet took place in the Kupuna Room in John Michael's Restaurant in Hilo. South Pacific Regional Director Paul J. P. Garcia served as Toastmaster. The Invocation was given by Michael Ritual Thrower, Chairman Lambda Psi Chapter, Greetings were extended from the university by Dr. Paul J. Kopecky, Dean of the Office of Student Services. A History of the Business Administration and Economics Division was presented by Dr. Robert King, Associate Professor of Business Administration.

Charter members Alison Mukai and Reddy Kwan presented the History of Alpha Theta Kappa Fraternity, which became Lambda Psi Chapter. After this presentation, Remarks by Western Provincial Vice President William R. Kinsella were made followed by the presentation of the Lambda Psi Chapter Charge and Charter by Grand President John V. Henik. The Charge and Charter were accepted by William J. J. Vroom, President of Lambda Psi Chapter. Following the charter presentation, several other awards were presented by Susan Honda, Vice President for General Activities of Lambda Psi Chapter and Dr. Nancy G. Dodd, Assistant Professor of Business Administration. Director of Chapter Services C. Dean Ferguson then presented Fraternal Greetings from chapters and members from across the country welcoming Lambda Psi Chapter. Lambda Psi Chapter now represents Delta Sigma Pi at the University of Hawaii at Hilo.

In 1947, the University of Hawaii in Honolulu established an extension division in the city of Hilo. This extension division expanded rapidly and in 1955, a permanent campus was purchased to offer degrees in Education, Business Administration, Arts and Sciences, and Engineering. In 1969, the Board of Regents of the University of Hawaii authorized transformation of the satellite campus in Hilo into a four year college. Today, the college is designed to offer a residential undergraduate experience emphasizing small classes and excellence in teaching.

Degrees are offered through the College of Agriculture, College of Arts and Sciences, the Hawaii Community College and the Center for Continuing Education and Community Service. The university is situated on the island of Hawaii which is the largest island in the Hawaiian Archipelago. Many of the courses and programs of study at the university are devoted towards the island's economy. This economy is centered largely on agriculture and tourism.

The university is accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. Enrollment at the University of Hawaii at Hilo is presently 3,500 students. A majority of students who attend the university reside in university housing.

Courses in business were first offered at the University of Hawaii at Hilo in 1955. Initially, a two year program of study was available for business administration students. A four year degree in business administration was first offered in 1982 and, since that time, enrollment has grown steadily. Enrollment in the business administration and economics division is expected to exceed 900 students by the end of 1989.

Undergraduate majors are available in the areas of finance, management, quantitative business analysis, computer science, economics and business administration. Degrees granted include the Bachelor of Business Administration degree and the Bachelor of Science degree. Currently, the business division is con-

tained in the College of Arts and Sciences. Plans are for this division to become a separate school within five years. Degree programs are accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges.

Delta Sigma Pi welcomes the 24 new charter members of Lambda Psi Chapter and the first chapter in the state of Hawaii to its fraternal family. Located in the Western Province and South Pacific Region of the fraternity, Lambda Psi Chapter continues to proudly represent Delta Sigma Pi at the University of Hawaii at Hilo.

Illinois' Newest Chapter

On April 22, 1989, the same day Lambda Psi Chapter was being installed, over 4,000 miles away the newest chapter in Illinois was being installed as Lambda Omega Chapter at Quincy College in Quincy, Illinois. Quincy College is an independent, Roman Catholic, Liberal Arts College founded in 1860 by the Franciscan Friars. From its founding, the college worked to maintain the Franciscan spirit of influencing the world by caring about people and urging them to fulfill their individual potential. The Franciscan tradition contin-

ues at Quincy College even today as the academic program is designed to provide students with the fundamentals of a Liberal Arts education and at the same time prepare them for a rewarding professional and personal life. The curriculum is flexible in design by allowing for double majors or major-minor combinations, studentdesign majors, independent studies, special topics courses, independent research, practicums, and internships. Teaching is considered the primary focus of educational development at Quincy College, Quincy College offers Bachelors degrees in 31 areas of study. Minors are available in 23 additional areas. Certificate programs, as well as pre-professional programs, are also offered by the col-

The college is located in a residential section of Quincy, a city of 50,000 people, situated on the bluffs of the Mississippi River. The college is divided into a main campus and a North campus separated by 10 city blocks. Over 1,500 students attend Quincy College representing 25 states and eight foreign countries. A majority of students are from the Midwest with approximately 70 per cent of students residing in on-campus housing. The college is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary schools.

Unlike many Liberal Arts institutions, Ouincy College began a curriculum in business shortly after the college was founded. The first business curriculum was offered in 1867 and has evolved to its current state with majors offered in the areas of accounting, management and marketing. Outside the Division of Business are major programs in personnel administration and management information systems. Undergraduate business programs comprise the majority of students in the Division of Business. A Master of Business Administration degree was first offered at the college in 1985, and since then, has proven very popular among business men and women in the Quincy area.

Accreditation for both the Bachelors and Masters degree programs are through the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

The establishment of a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi on the campus of Quincy College began on September 16, 1988, when Mr. Richard Magliari,

Head of Quincy College's Division of Business, announced to his senior Labor Economics class that he was looking for volunteers to research and start up a business club. Seven students were chosen one week later to investigate the establishment of a business club or fraternity. This group of students quickly distributed a survey to all business students and learned that a professional business fraternity was preferred over a business club. Presentations were received from three professional business fraternities and Delta Sigma Pi was chosen in mid-November. Great Lakes Regional Director Joseph J. Dabrowski, District Director Mary L. Miracle, District Director Stephen L. Black and Chapter Consultant Robby L. Hultz made presentations to either Mr. Magliari or students at Quincy College throughout the fall semester of 1988.

An informational meeting was scheduled for the final weeks of the fall semester. Great Lakes Regional Director Dabrowski presented information about the fraternity to interested students. During the holiday break, officers were chosen and plans made for the spring semester. At this time, Brother Stephen Black, an alumnus of Epsilon Omega Chapter at Eastern Illinois University, was appointed as District Director to the colony which took the name Delta Beta Alpha Fraternity. Through weekly visits he was able to monitor the group's progress from the very beginning.

A letter of intent was received from Delta Beta Alpha Fraternity on November 21, 1988, indicating their desire to pursue the installation of a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi at Quincy College. The first calendar of activities submitted by the colony was received at The Central Office in January, 1989. Colony bylaws, a roster of members and officers, among other pieces of paperwork, were submitted during the first few weeks of the spring semester. Delta Beta Alpha Fraternity planned a wide range of activities ranging from professional, to community service to fund raising activities for its membership. As the number of activities increased so did membership during the spring semester.

On February 28, 1989, Director of Chapter Services C. Dean Ferguson visited Quincy College, along with District Director Stephen Black and St. Louis Alumni Chapter Vice President Frank Weber. A pledging ceremony was conducted for 35 students and one faculty member. Three days later, the members of Delta Beta Alpha Fraternity traveled to Chicago for two professional tours and the Great Lakes Region's Area Conference. The pledge education program for Delta Beta Alpha Fraternity was developed and implemented by District Director Stephen Black.

On Saturday, April 22, 1989, representatives from several collegiate chapters in the Great Lakes and Midwestern Regions met in Quincy along with national officers of the fraternity for the installation of Lambda Omega Chapter at Quincy College. Mid-American Provincial Vice President Marlow B. Kee served as Headmaster for the Ritual Team. Other members of the Installation Team included Collegian of the Year-1987 William E. Newburry, Great Lakes Regional Director Joseph J. Dabrowski, Midwestern Regional Director Karen A. Winter, District Directors Stephen L. Black and Mary L. Miracle, Assistant Executive Director Michael T. Walsh and members of Eta Nu Chapter at the University of Missouri at St. Louis, Iota Nu Chapter at Northeast Missouri State University, Iota Chi Chapter at Illinois State University, Lambda Omicron Chapter at Western Illinois University and the St. Louis Alumni Chapter.


Following the installation of Lambda Omega Chapter which took place in the Administration Building on the campus of Quincy College, was the Reception and Installation Banquet. The Banquet and Reception were held at the Spring Lake Country Club outside of Quincy. The national officers arrived at the banquet, via a chauffeured limousine, courtesy of members of Lambda Omega Chapter. Great Lakes Regional Director Joseph J. Dabrowski served as Toastmaster. The invocation was given by Patricia Churchill-Loos, Vice President for Professional Activities of Lambda Omega Chapter. Greetings were extended by Dr. Ian Fyvie Keith, Faculty Advisor for Lambda Omega Chapter. A history of the Division of Business was then presented by Mr. Richard Magliari, the other Faculty Advisor for the chapter. Following this presentation, Todd Friye, Senior Vice President of Lambda Omega


HRIS E. ROBINETT, a graduate of the University of Nebraska at Lincoln and an alumnus of Alpha Delta Chapter, has been chosen Collegian of the Year for 1989. Chris maintained a 3.6 grade point average during his four years at Nebraska-Lincoln while carrying a double major in accounting and finance.

Initiated on November 17, 1985, by Alpha Delta Chapter, Chris is a Life Member. While a collegiate member of Alpha Delta Chapter, he served as President, Historian, Recruiting Chairman, Publicity Chairman, Regional Conference Co-Chairman, was on the Alumni/Faculty Relations Committee and implemented the chapter's Motivation Committee. He

was also Chairman of the Pledge Committee. In addition, he was voted Outstanding Member of his chapter. He also participated in the basket-ball/volleyball marathon sponsored by the chapter.

In addition to his work with Alpha Delta Chapter, Chris was a member of Beta Alpha Psi and served as Community Service Chairman. 





The Leadership Fund

Nineteen eighty-nine marks the inauguration of the Annual Campaign of the Delta Sigma Pi Leadership Fund. This new fund raising program represents one of the most important developments in the history of our Fraternity. The Leadership Fund, a separate legal entity, has built a special "partnership" with the Fraternity and the Educational Foundation in order to provide the "best of both worlds" to those who wish to support Delta Sigma Pi.

Through the Annual Campaign, the Leadership Fund will make resources available for expanded Scholarships and Fellowships to Deltasigs (so important in this day and age of rising college costs), and will support educational and leadership programming in the Fraternity. The Leadership Fund, with your help, will allow Delta Sigma Pi to keep pace with the changing needs of our Brotherhood.

Why the Leadership Fund?

It's really quite simple. Gifts made to the Leadership Fund are tax-deductible. Gifts to the Fraternity are not. Additionally, because of I.R.S. restrictions, raising money through the Fraternity has become increasingly difficult over the years. A single fund raising program of a charitable organization (such as the Annual Campaign of the Leadership Fund) eliminates confusion and meets all I.R.S. restrictions and guidelines.

Because the Leadership Fund is a public, charitable and educational corporation with an Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) standing, we not only can provide you with tax-deductibility, but can also fund a variety of important programs in the Fraternity. Your guide to understanding the Leadership Fund

What is the Delta Sigma Pi Leadership Fund?

The Leadership Fund is a tax-exempt, public, charitable and educational corporation with an Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) standing.

What does the Leadership Fund do?

The Mission Statement of the Leadership Fund provides a great deal of insight as to the purpose of this organization:

"The Delta Sigma Pi Leadership Fund exists to provide for the furtherance of business education through the extension of financial assistance and the support of worthy educational, scientific and charitable programs."

Where is it located?

The Leadership Fund shares office space with the International Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi at The Central Office in Oxford, Ohio. Its full mailing address and phone is:

Who runs the Leadership Fund?

The Leadership Fund is run through the volunteer efforts of Brothers in Delta Sigma Pi who comprise the Board of Trustees for the corporation. They, giving freely of their time and knowledge, guide the Fund and its programs. Additionally, the Fund is served by Michael J. Mazur who is Executive Director, and Daniel S. Doyle, who serves as the Director of Development and administers to its daily operation.

Why raise money through the Leadership Fund?

The Fund asks for contributions in order to make resources available primarily for scholarships, grants, and educational/leadership programming in the Fraternity. Gifts to the Leadership Fund are tax-deductible. Gifts made to the Fraternity are not. We have found that Brothers respond favorably to this tax advantage.

What types of programs will my contribution support?

Through your generous support, the Leadership Fund will be able to provide needed resources to those areas of greatest importance to our Fraternity. Currently, arrangements have been made

for the Leadership Fund to support:

YES! If you work for a company which participates in a matching gift program,

your Annual Campaign contribution may be doubled or even tripled by your employer. The staff of the Leadership Fund will be more than happy to assist you in providing your employer with the information they need to match your gift.

Generally, in order to have your gift matched by your employer, you must first obtain a matching gift form, and then send it in with your contribution to the Leadership Fund. Two improvements could be seen as being part of the overall improvement of the chapter. The first was an increase in Chapter Efficiency Index points submitted during 1988-89 with over 50,000. The second improvement was the stronger bond and increased participation among the Brothers.

Six new Brothers were initiated during the fall, 1988, semester and eight were initiated during the spring, 1989, semester.

The chapter had several professional and community service activities. Such professional activities included: tours of the city newspaper, The Austin American Statesman, and the North Carolina National Bank of Texas (NCNB Texas National Bank). A community service activity included: a project to enrich youngsters with business aspects from Junior Achievement. This was proposed to the chapter by its District Director Randal Mays. the second chapter established in the state of Nevada. On April 29, collegiate and alumni Brothers from across the country gathered in Las Vegas for the installation of the chapter. Presiding over the installation of the chapter was Grand President John V. Henik. He was joined by Past Grand President William W. Tatum, Jr., Western Provincial Vice President William R. Kinsella, South Pacific Regional Director Paul J. P. Garcia, Intermountain Regional Director Charles E. Farrow and Western Regional Director William F. Stebelski. Joining them were Executive Director Michael J. Mazur, Jr., Director of Chapter Services C. Dean Ferguson, District Directors Christopher A. Rondini and Helen M. Paustian and members of Iota Upsilon Chapter at California State Univer-

sity at Northridge and Lambda Chi Chapter at the University of California at Riverside.

Initial interest in establishing a chapter at the University of Nevada at Las Vegas was generated by South Pacific Regional Director Paul J. P. Garcia. On December 14, 1987, Regional Director Garcia and District Director Adrian Avalos met with Dr. Ann Mayo of the College of Business and Economics at UNLV. These three individuals discussed how Delta Sigma Pi could benefit the university and the college. Approval to establish a chapter was provided by Dr. Mayo and immediate plans were made to contact students in the university.

In March of 1988, Regional Director Garcia returned to the university to participate in the college's first "Business Night." this event was designed for students to meet representatives from several student organizations so that these students might select an appropriate organiza-

tion to join. It was during this evening that five students expressed their sincere interest in forming a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi. An added benefit was that Brother Chris Prohaska, an initiate of Delta Pi Chapter at the University of Nevada at Reno, was attending the Las Vegas campus and would provide information and assistance in forming a new chapter.

During the summer of 1988, Regional Director Garcia met with these students three times to establish plans

for the fall semester. Mr. Arlan Holman, one of the interested students, attended the Western Provincial Leadership School in Las Vegas during July of 1988. Plans were solidified during the summer so that a strong effort could occur during the fall semester.

Recruiting activities were conducted in earnest during the fall semester. A complete set of officers was elected at the start of the semester. The name of Beta Theta Delta was chosen as the name of the colony. In October of 1988, Director of Chapter Services C. Dean Ferguson visited Beta Theta Delta Fraternity to discuss colony operations and the needed steps to charter a collegiate chapter. Members of Beta Theta Delta attended the South Pacific Regional Conference that same month.

Professional activities, community service events and social activities were conducted throughout the fall semester of 1988. After the fall recruiting effort had concluded, 20 students composed Beta Theta Delta Colony, but several other students in the College of Hotel Administration had expressed an interest. Throughout the academic year, Beta Theta Delta Fraternity has been assisted by Brother Skip Swerdlow, an initiate of Gamma Omega Chapter at Arizona State University, who is currently an Assistant Professor in the College of Hotel Administration.

The members of Beta Theta Delta Fraternity were pledged in late February by Regional Director Paul J. P. Garcia and District Director Chris Rondini. All of the remaining petitioning requirements were met and the installation date of April 29, 1989, was set.

On the morning of Saturday, April 29, 1989, collegiate and alumni members of the fraternity gathered along with national officers for the installation ceremonies which resulted in the installation of 23 charter members as the Mu Nu Chapter.

Following the installation of the chapter, which took place in Beam Hall on the campus of the University of Nevada at Las Vegas, was the reception and installation banquet. The installation banquet and reception took place in the Cordoba Rooms of the Hacienda Hotel. South Pacific Regional Director Paul J. P. Garcia served as Toastmaster and the invocation was given by District Director

Helen M. Paustian. Greetings were extended from the university by Dr. Robert Maxson, President of the University of Nevada at Las Vegas. A history of the College of Business and Economics and the College of Hotel Administration was presented by Dr. Ann M. Mayo, Coordinator of Undergraduate Advising at the university.

Delta Pi Chapter initiate Chris J. Prohaska, who had attended the University of Nevada at Reno and transferred to the University of Nevada at Las Vegas, presented the history of Beta Theta Delta Fraternity. Remarks from Western Provincial Vice President William R. Kinsella were made and then Grand President John V. Henik presented the Mu Nu Chapter Charge and Charter to chapter President Bret W. Runion. Following this presentation. Executive Director Michael J. Mazur, Jr., presented Fraternal Greetings from different chapters and members from across the country.

Delta Sigma Pi is now represented by Mu Nu Chapter at the University of Nevada at Las Vegas. In 1951, college level courses were first offered in the Las Vegas area through an extension program with the University of Nevada at Reno. One full time faculty member taught classes to a student body of 12 students in a spare room at Las Vegas high school. From these humble beginnings, the university grew rapidly and was formally established by the State Legislature as a regional division of the state university in 1957. The first degrees were granted in 1964. The campus was renamed to the Nevada Southern University in 1965 and in 1968, was given full autonomy and equality with the older Reno campus of the University of Nevada. Another name change occurred in 1969 when the campus was renamed the University of Nevada at Las Vegas.

The university is located on a 335 acre campus convenient to both the downtown Las Vegas area and the city airport. The university is organized into the College of Arts and Letters; Business and Economics; Education; Health Services; Hotel Administration; Science and Mathematics; The Graduate College; and the Howard R. Hughes College of Engineering. The university offers 64 undergraduate degree programs, 45 Masters degree programs and eight

Doctoral degree programs through these various colleges.

The university is accredited by the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges. Currently, over 13,000 students attend the University of Nevada at Las Vegas. The university is well known in many areas through its strong athletic programs.

Business courses were offered at the University of Nevada at Las Vegas since its founding. Today, the College of Business and Economics is housed in Beam Hall along with the College of Hotel Administration. Undergraduate business programs are available in accounting, business administration, economics, finance, management, marketing and public administration. Graduate degree programs are also available through the Master of Business Administration and Master of Professional Accountancy programs. A majority of students at the University of Nevada at Las Vegas commute to school from area homes. Classes are available throughout the day including a large number of evening classes. Currently, 70 full time faculty members provide instruction to almost 3,000 business majors. An additional 225 students are enrolled in the Masters degree programs.

The University of Nevada at Las Vegas offers a wide range of courses in the hospitality industry. The College of Hotel Administration offers one general program. Although there are no specific majors, the large number of electives permit a concentration in any of several areas using hotel and non-hotel courses: accounting, culinary, food and beverage, management, foreign languages, gaming, marketing, personnel, and tourism, among others. The College of Hotel Administration is located in Beam Hall adjacent to the College of Business and Economics. Students are required to take numerous business courses in addition to courses in the College of Hotel Administration. Over 900 students are currently enrolled in the College of Hotel Administration.

The fraternity welcomes the 223rd and newest chapter of Delta Sigma Pi. This second chapter in the state of Nevada, Mu Nu Chapter, is located in the Western Province and South Pacific Region and proudly represents Deltasigs everywhere at the University of Nevada at Las Vegas.
