n behalf of your board of directors, I am excited to share with you the Fraternity's Strategic Priorities. These are the culmination of two years of dialogue with current and past Fraternity and Foundation leaders and students and alumni at LEAD events and by reviewing examples from other national fraternities and sororities. We are tremendously appreciative of everyone who has contributed, both directly or indirectly, to informing the path forward.

This fall, we celebrate 109 years of Delta Sigma Pi, and the Fraternity has never been stronger. But if things are going so well, why do we need this list of priorities?

Delta Sigma Pi is full of students, alumni, and faculty who share tremendous passion for the Fraternity and demonstrate that enthusiasm in countless ways. But what if all that energy could be aimed toward the same shared goals? Imagine a Fraternity in which chapter initiatives are aligned with and supported by the collective power of our entire organization; where innovation bubbles up freely from individual members to national leaders. Think of the potential for

lasting, significant impact we can have on each other and on our communities when truly acting as a single unit, as opposed to as an association of chapters and individuals.

Our position of strength and stability allows us the luxury of considering how Delta Sigma Pi can best carry out its purpose in a rapidly changing world. What should we do to effectively equip our members for evolving campuses, communities, and workplaces? How do we positively stand out among fraternities and sororities and counter the negative perceptions of the Greek system? What meaningful brotherhood experiences can we support for Deltasigs across all life and career stages and who live in all corners of the earth? What type of organizational framework must we put in place so the Fraternity

remains on solid stable footing, yet is nimble and agile enough to adapt quickly, rather than get left behind?

This list is not a detailed strategic or operating plan. Instead, these priorities reflect the primary areas of focus for the Fraternity (from now through June 2021) and signal how each of us -- board members, staff, committees, alumni, and students -- can contribute our support to the Fraternity's purpose. In fact, the only way these priorities can be accomplished is if we all own them together.

What does that mean exactly? For one thing, each category is deliberately broad enough not to fall into the list of duties of an individual or a committee. Second, the targets are designed to be aggressive enough that we likely will not reach them by simply maintaining the status quo. But perhaps most importantly, each member of the Fraternity is encouraged to think of what you bring that can shape our future.

While there will be board-directed initiatives, our vision is that every one of you sees ways you can help

us reach these goals. Every input matters, whether you are a member of the Fraternity's leadership team, a new initiate full of ideas and excitement, or an alumnus with valuable life experiences and perspectives. Collective ownership will enable these priorities to be a living organism that evolves over time to meet our needs instead of merely a document gathering dust on a shelf in our Central Office.

Let's dive in. The first priority is about educating members to stand out on campus and beyond by developing them into effective leaders and team members. This starts with the recruitment and pledging processes, but also includes training for collegiate members, faculty and administration, alumni members, and volunteers. This education consists of our Ritual, core values, and Fraternity policies and procedures, but also includes those skills needed for success in academic, career, and volunteer pursuits.

At the board level, we will invest in enhancing leadership training of collegiate and alumni chapter officers and district directors. In addition to updating our existing manuals and educational platforms, we are exploring new volunteer and chapter officer training programs, including training focused on the unique challenges faced by collegiate and alumni chapter presidents.

Action is not limited to board initiatives, however. For example, Regional Vice Presidents, district directors, and chapter advisors can collaborate to execute regional conferences. Chapter leaders can partner with nearby Deltasigs, corporate allies, or other non-profit or student organizations to deepen and expand educational offerings for their members. Alumni can volunteer to share their knowledge at LEAD or local events and may choose to mentor students at their alma mater or a local chapter.

The second priority is all about growth, though not for the sake of growth. At the micro level, chapters need enough active members to spread the workload and to provide unique perspectives. Nationally, a highly visible collegiate and alumni chapter footprint helps lead to greater brand recognition, opening the door to more opportunity in our communities and in the corporate world. These two dimensions of growth happen best when the Deltasig experience is highly sought after by diverse business students and faculty members. As each of us is an ambassador for the Fraternity (both in our positive and negative conduct), we all have the ability to show those around us why it is not only desirable to be a Deltasig, but why it is also worthwhile to employ or collaborate with Deltasigs.

Number three is about lifelong member **engagement.** This starts at our campus chapters, where we can reduce the number of expulsions and voluntary withdrawals by ensuring that our recruitment, member education, and conflict resolution processes are effective. But the alumni experience is at the core

of this priority. We must better understand the many ways in which alumni are and want to be involved, and better promote engagement opportunities aligned with your interests and experiences, which do not require daunting time, financial, or travel commitments. Doing so will enable collegiate members to have a better sense of how they can augment their collegiate experience by reaching out to alumni and how they can shape their own alumni experience as their family and career obligations change. We can also improve recognition of and encouragement to the countless alumni shaping the brotherhood experience beyond involvement in national programs.

The final category is about infrastructure. As you can imagine, some of the concepts listed here (or those that may arise as we proceed) will require organizational changes to maximize outcomes. Here is where we will consider how our laws, staffing structure, Fraternity/Foundation partnership, technology, and volunteer roles and responsibilities necessarily evolve so we can accomplish our goals. Each of you belongs to many groups and organizations, and may be using successful tools, methods, and approaches that can inform Fraternity-wide improvements to our chapter and national structure.

The list of priorities, along with supporting context, can be found on the Fraternity website at dsp.org/ strategic-priorities. As you embark on activities in support of them, we encourage you to share on social media. This will help your national leaders and staff get a start on seeing the creativity and sharing your great ideas with brothers everywhere.

I have never been more proud and excited to be a Deltasig, and I look forward to seeing what we can accomplish together over the coming years.



Summary of Ronald McDonald House Charities Events



Traternities and sororities have long heralded legacies as part of their continuity. A legacy brother is a member whose parent (grandparent or sibling) is also a brother. Although Delta Sigma Pi does not have an official legacy program, family members of brothers joining the Fraternity have existed since our Founders. Founder Alexander Frank Makay's brother, William, was initiated into Alpha Chapter years after our founding. Jim Jacobs, Albany, son of Founder Harold Valentine Jacobs, was initiated in 1971 and his wife Julia joined the brotherhood at Siena (NY) in 1998. Jim and Julia traveled around the country presenting interesting historical information about Delta Sigma Pi.

Out of our founders, though, Henry Albert Tienken created the largest legacy. Two out of four sons, Billy, Americas, and George, Kappa, were initiated. The legacy continued further when Roger, George's son, became the Fraternity's National Honorary Initiate in 2005.

When discussing this article with the families, the common theme was pride. They were proud to share this unique bond with their family members. Often times the younger members fell in love with the same organization because they knew how much it meant to their parent or family member.

Not surprisingly, many Past Grand Presidents have familial brothers. PGP Bob Busse and his daughter Laurie Busse Rosenblatt, Georgia College & State, are considered the Fraternity's first father-daughter pairing. PGP Dick Parnitzke and his daughter, Kathie, Miami-Ohio, are another brother duo. "Grand Chapter Congress was always a family affair for us." He adds that his late wife, Jackie, understood what he was committed to doing even if it meant bringing their two daughters along to Grand Chapter Congress and often celebrating their wedding anniversary there. Kathie attended Miami University and ultimately met her future husband, Mark Slusher, Ohio State, at a Fraternity function.

PGP Randy Hultz's biological brother, Robby initiated into the chapter just five years after Randy and their cousin Debra helped charter the chapter at Truman State. Robby, whose wife Beth is also a member from Gamma Zeta at Memphis, spent several years on staff at the Central Office.

PGP Bill Kinsella pledged with Michael Paletta at Loyola Marymount. Later, Michael married Bill's sister. Both Bill and Michael attended the initiation of Michael's son (Bill's nephew) when he was initiated at San Diego State during a multi-chapter initiation presided by then Grand President Mitch Simmons. And while we are talking about Mitch, we should mention that he is married to Brother Velvet, Louisiana-Monroe, and his niece Brittany Allen Mabile initiated into his chapter at Southern Mississippi.





Love Your Team Equally, Lead Them Differently

In a recent Google study, where teams of employees were surveyed as to what it took to successfully and productively work together, it was revealed the number one factor that predicted their success was... (drum roll) being nice to one another.

Our good friend and friend to the Fraternity, Mitch Matthews, would call it "loving each other well", as in practicing consideration, kindness, and empathy. Showing grace where it's needed and respectfully holding each other's feet to the fire in times of tension or conflict. But always doing so with a heart for the other person.

If there's one thing to use in the "real world" post-college, it's this—there will be people that you'll work with that don't communicate the same way you do. Some will appear disinterested in having a relationship with you, some will rush to judgment before asking for or considering your point of view, some will promise the world and not deliver, and some just want you to include them.

Love each of them equally, even when they don't deserve it. But *lead them differently*, because doing so will increase your (and their) personal effectiveness.

Here's why — research done by Tracom has shown that most of us have social tendencies or "styles" that can be broken into one of four categories: Drivers, Expressives, Amiables, and Analyticals. If you were to segment a room of 100 people, you'd have an almost even amount of each. If you communicate with and lead other people from your style alone, at best you're 25% effective in your interactions. Thus--75% ineffective!

At Deltasig's Volunteer Leadership Retreat in August, nearly 100 leaders learned about leading well, communicating from others' social styles, and thinking strategically about chapter development. The demographics spanned Baby Boomers, Gen Xers, and Millennials; and district directors to Past Grand Presidents.

Some of the greatest revelations came when we segmented into the social style we most closely aligned with. And, as you might have guessed, there was an almost even amount among the four groups. More surprising was that

nearly every volunteer leader position in the Fraternity was held by someone from various styles. Not one style dominated the category of district director or Board Member. It suggested ALL are important to the leadership of the Fraternity.

In fact, each of the three Past Grand Presidents present placed themselves in different social styles. One was a driver. One was an amiable. One was expressive. Interestingly, when you examined the progress, culture, or happenings in the Fraternity during each of their tenures as GP, their social style came through. Suggesting our leaders influence the Fraternity greatly, from those at the National level on through the chapter level.

To understand the difference between each of the styles, as well as to begin to identify who is who in your chapter, the following is a list of the styles and a brief description of their strengths, weaknesses, and core values:

DRIVERS tend to be fairly direct in communication, prefer facts over opinions and are very quick to make decisions. They tend to be in "get it done" mode quite often and their to-do list is what drives their day. Drivers can be seen as tough or aggressive, and sometimes that perception can be negative if, for example, they steamroll a committee working on a project. Their core value is completing the TASK at hand, so value their time and get right to the point.

EXPRESSIVES tend to be great idea people. They are excited about the big picture, love to brainstorm, and often get tripped up in the detail work. As a group, expressives tend to be in touch with the emotion of the group, though will overshare their ideas compared to the other styles sometimes offending those who didn't get to share. Expressives can be seen as loose cannons, over-committed, and lacking focus. Their core value is having FUN, so include them on the party or event planning, and allow time for socializing and digressions.

AMIABLES tend to desire harmony on teams. They are natural peace-keepers, tend to avoid conflict, and are more than willing to "go-along to get-along". Amiables have great ideas, but often keep them to themselves unless asked to share. As a result, they can be seen as passive, hesitating, and self-sacrificing. Just know they're doing it for the good of the team (or so they think). An amiable's core value is CONSENSUS and they will work with individuals to maintain group unity. Ask an amiable for their ideas; they have them and they're generally very good!

ANALYTICALS tend to research, plan, and execute based on the data they can find. They are generally slower to make decisions and may even limit the amount of direct eye contact with you. While some analyticals may seem distant or cold, they are probably just taking in all of the data in a situation and analyzing it in their own way. Because of the need to make decisions based on all of the available data, analyticals can be seen as slow, indecisive, nit-picky or rigid. However, their strengths lie in their ability to dissect a situation and find the most appropriate solution based on what they know going in.

An analytical's core value is DATA and they need time to digest what they've been given. If you ask an analytical a question, wait for the answer... it's coming, but they need to ponder it a bit

You're more than likely assigning various brothers into each of the style categories. As you do, keep in mind that each of them should be loved equally. Not one style is better or worse than another. Quite the opposite—each of them brings strengths to the table that allow a chapter to function quite well. We made the point at the Volunteer Leadership Retreat that even the weaknesses shown in each style are simply their strengths to an extreme. The same is true of those in your chapter.

So love them equally, but lead them differently. We would call it flexing to their style.

When working with drivers, know that they'll make decisions quickly. Long, drawn-out emails won't even get read by a driver because you could've sent the same content as quick bullet points. Get right to the point, offer facts not opinions, and be ready for responses that may lack emotional empathy.

If you know that you're working with someone who's analytical, give them time to digest the information presented. They tend to like deadlines, prefer to be asked to help solve problems instead of given solutions, and they may take more time to make a decision than you'd like. Give them all the data they need, and time to assess it, and you'll be in good shape.

The amiable style is probably easiest to work with because, as a group, they're generally very agreeable. You'll know you have amiables around you if you get a warm and slow feeling from them. They're typically very friendly and will ask you about your day, family, vacation, etc. If you have an amiable that you're leading, just make sure to include them in any planning. Ask them specifically for their input. They'll appreciate it.

Flexing to an expressive is fairly simple—ask them for some ideas on a project you're working on. They love big picture work, just make sure you've put them with either a driver or analytical when it comes to the details. If the project you're working on has any element of fun involved, you'll have no trouble attracting an expressive to help.

In the decades of combined experience that we have in business, we can honestly say the Google team is on to something—being nice to one another makes business success much easier. Focus on what unique aspects of your team's social style makes you function well, celebrate the uniqueness of everyone on your team, and above all LOVE THEM EQUALLY. But LEAD THEM DIFFERENTLY.

These styles and many other topics were discussed during the Retreat. Having recently learned that you can make your own belt using high quality leather, the two investigated making it a profitable business. They spoke with the university's small business development center and decided to move forward. "We could spend \$900 each on an entrepreneurship class, or we could both invest \$500 and start a legitimate business." Gray Bull Leather Company is now up and running, selling leather belts, bracelets, wallets and document folios, which are all handmade in their apartment on a custom workbench that David built.

Brother Brown's journey through Deltasig has helped his journey in creating Gray Bull Leather. "I have learned to be persistent and never give up." Christopher became involved with the Fraternity at JSU when it was in the very early stages of being a colony. About a year later, Danny Gaines, Kennesaw State, was appointed to serve as District Director and helped plan events and offer recruitment ideas. "We had a really hard time recruiting and I didn't think we would have enough people to fulfill the petitioning requirements," Christopher said.

"I had put so much work into the colony for over a year and it didn't seem like we were going to make it." After some encouragement from Danny and then RVP Lee James, he refused to give up. "I had to fight to the very end. With business, and with life, success does not happen overnight. It takes a lot of hard work, dedication and passion to make something work." Soon after, the colony's petition was finally approved. "I will never forget the feeling I had when I finally received the email letting me know that our petition to become a chapter was approved. It was one of the most fulfilling moments of my life."

Christopher passed the chapter president torch but continues to stay busy. Along with five classes this semester, he is marching his final year for the university's Marching Southerners drumline and working part-time as an analyst for Newpoint Advisors Corporation, a small business consulting

firm. "Time management is absolutely key. I plan each and every day in advance, down to fifteen minute increments in some cases. My goal each day is to be as productive as possible."

And just like with Delta Sigma Pi, Christopher has learned the more you put into the business, the more successful it will be. "The most challenging thing for me is coming to terms with myself that the success or failure of the business is determined upon mine and David's input. If we are busy with the business, the business gets busy. If we don't do anything, we don't make any sales."

After graduating in April, Christopher hopes to continue working for Newpoint Advisors and relocate to Nashville. Later down the road, he would like to be a personal financial coach, work with developing company strategy or build his own business. Whatever he does and wherever he goes, he will continue to stay involved with the Fraternity.

"I love being a part of Delta Sigma Pi. I have gained so much from my brothers, and I know that I have now made friendships and memories that will last a lifetime."



- ► Endowment distribution percentages and calculation methods were discussed. The 2017-18 endowment distributions shall be 4.25% of the market value on June 30, 2017.
- Updated the Investment Policy to allow for closed end mutual funds, exchange of traded mutual funds and publicly traded REITs not to exceed 7% of total equity securities or 5% of the total portfolio. Additionally changed the expected rate of return to 6-8% (previously noted as 8-10%) and redefined cash equivalents as securities with a maturity of 12 months

To participate, chapters collect donations of at least \$1 per brother (or a minimum of \$50 total for an alumni chapter) before December 1 of each calendar year.
