History of Tulane University

Tulane University was founded in 1834 as the Medical College of Louisiana. Then in 1837, the Medical College became part of the University of Louisiana, a public institution.

In 1884, The University of Louisiana became private institution Tulane University after Paul Tulane donated over one million dollars to the university. Then in 1886, the H. Sophie Newcomb Memorial College was established as a college for women in the university system. Today, Newcomb-Tulane College enrolls all undergraduate students.

In 2005, Hurricane Katrina hit New Orleans, which greatly impacted Tulane University. After the storm, the Tulane community worked hard to bring the university back and to make it stronger than it was before Katrina. Tulane's experience with Hurricane Katrina shaped many of Tulane's programs, such as the focus on community service in the undergraduate education.


Tulane University offers degrees in the schools of liberal arts, science and engineering, business, architecture, law, public health and tropical medicine, social work, and medicine.



Memberships and Accreditation

Tulane University is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges to award degrees at the associate, baccalaureate, masters, doctorate, and professional level. The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges is the recognized regional accrediting body in the eleven U.S. southern states. The State Department of Education of Louisiana approves Tulane's teacher preparation programs and graduate and professional schools throughout the country accept its degrees and credits. Tulane's accreditation was last reaffirmed by SACSCOC in 2011.

Tulane University holds membership in the Association of American Universities, and was elected in 1958. Additionally, the Carnegie Foundation designated Tulane as a research university with very high research activity. Tulane's A.B. Freeman School of Business was a founding member of the Association of Advance Collegiate Schools of Business, the premier accrediting body for collegiate schools of business.



History of A.B. Freeman School of Business

In 1914, Tulane University established its business school, originally called the College of Commerce and Business Administration. The school was established at the urging of the New Orleans Association of Commerce, an organization consisting of local business leaders who were dedicated to improving New Orleans civic, industrial and commercial welfare. Convinced that the future growth and success of the city depended on the establishment of a premier business institution, 200 members of the association contracted with Tulane to back the cost of establishing a new business school at the university. Following this, Morton A. Aldrich, a professor of economics and major contributor of this effort was chosen as the college's first dean.

Two years later in 1916, Tulane University became one of sixteen founding members of the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB), an association that serves as the nation's accrediting body of business schools. In 1940, the school began offering the Masters of Business Administration degree program, and two years later moved from Gibson Hall to its own dedicated building, Norman Mayer Memorial Hall. Reflecting a nationwide shift towards graduate education programs, the College of Commerce was temporarily discontinued in 1963, only to be reinstated in 1978. Reflecting this change, the college established a doctoral program in business beginning in 1966, eventually introducing an Executive MBA Program in 1983.

In 1984, the business school was named in honor of A.B. Freeman, a New Orleans businessman, philanthropist, and former chairman of the Louisiana Coca-Cola Bottling Co, in recognition of a gift from the Freeman family. Two years later, the Freeman Business School relocated from Norman Mayer Memorial Hall to Goldring/Woldenberg Hall, a newly built 83,000 square foot building located in the center of Tulane's campus.

In the early 1990's, the Freeman School began its global expansion, by introducing Executive MBA program in Chile, China, and Mexico as well as PhD programs in Colombia, Mexico and Venezuela. The Freeman School continued to expand its programs by introducing a Master of Accounting program in 1993, a Master of Finance program in 2003, and a Master of Management Energy program in 2011. Additionally, The Freeman School opened a satellite campus in Houston Texas, where they began offering additional MBA programs.

In November 2003, The Freeman School opened its second building, Goldring/Woldenberg II, featuring state-of-the-art classrooms and an electronic trading room. This building now serves as the home of Freeman School graduate and professional programs. Today the Freeman School is a leading, internationally recognized business school with more than 2,500 students in programs across the world.





Current Membership Statistics


Age Breakdown
