EASTMAN AND ANNEX--Located at the corner of South Plymouth and Broad streets, these buildings house the main administrative offices of the Institute. The buildings also house most of the Institute's classrooms. In addition, the buildings contain the cafeteria, snack bar, assembly hall, and the offices of the Chemistry, Electrical and Food Administration Departments, the Schools of Retailing and Business Administration, the Evening College and the College of General Studies.

## HISTORY OF

ROCHESTER INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY

The initial spark that started the educational institution that is now Rochester Institute of Technology, occurred in 1829. At that time, Rochester was a frontier town and the Rochester Athenaeum was organized to bolster an ebbing culture. The Athenaeum presented lectures and forums for Rochester's early residents.

During the period following the establishment of the Athenaeum, industrialization expanded in the area and industry needed workers trained in mechanics and technology. To meet this need, Captain Henry Lomb and his associates, Frank Ritter, E. R. Andrews, Max Lowenthal, Henry Michaels, and L. P. Ross, founded the Mechanics Institute in 1885.

For several years, both institutions operated separately. However, the leaders of the two schools realized that culture and technical proficiency cannot be separated in life and should not be in education. Both schools became more and more reliant on onother and, in 1891, they merged their facilities to provide an integrated program that has become a tradition of the Rochester Institute of Technology.

Under the name of the Rochester Athenaeum and Mechanics Institute, and on its present site, the school expanded in many ways. Several areas in the


Library- The Institute maintains a library of approximately 40,000 volumes and 500 current periodicals for use of the student and faculty.

Institute's older buildings still bear the RAMI insignia. It is interesting to note through the yearbook of the student body, the Ramikin, the changes that were taking place.

RAMI continued to expand with the community. In 1912, the Institute was one of the first to offer a co-operative education program. In this way, the student's classroom instruction was integrated with practical work experience through alternating periods of study and employment.

From 1895 until 1910, the affairs of the Institute were managed by the Board of Trustees instead of a president. Since then the presidents have been: Charleton B. Gibson (1910-1914), J. Ernest Woodland (1914-1916), James B. Barker (1916-1919), Royal B. Farnum (1919-1921), John A. Randall (1922-1936), and Mark Ellingson (1936- ).

The advancing times brought new technologies and the Institute expanded. In 1923, the Retailing Department was established. The year 1930 witnessed the founding of the Department of Photography, providing a school of technology located in the photographic center of the world.

In 1937, the Empire School of Printing, founded in 1922 under the leadership of Frank Gannett, was absorbed by the Institute and became the nucleus for an ever expanding program in the graphic arts.


RITTER-CLARK MEMORIAL- Built in 1955, this houses the gymnasium and ice arena. Also contained in this structure are locker rooms, a wrestling rooms, fencing rooms, and the coaches of athletics.

The years of 1942 through 1950 brought substantial expansion to the Institute. 1942 was the founding year of the Counseling Center; in 1944, the Institute's name was changed to the Rochester Institute of Technology. The George H. Clark building provided needed room for expansion in 1946, housing the printing, photography, and mechanical departments.

In 1950, RIT became the first institution in New York State to grant the Associate in Applied Science degree. 1950 also brought to the Institute the School of American Craftsmen and the Graphic Arts Research Department.

The McKechnie-Lunger School of Commerce was absorbed by RIT in 1952, expanding the Institute's program into the secretarial and business administration fields. In 1958, the department's name was changed from Commerce to Business Administration.

The New York State Board of Regents authorized RIT to grant the Bachelor of Science degree in 1953. Subsequent years brought authorization to issue the Bachelor of Fine Arts and recently, the Masters of Fine Arts degree.

The period of 1955 through 1959 brought many additions to the Institute's capital plant: the RitterClark Memorial housing the gymnasium and ice arena, the student union, acquisition of the Hotel Rochester


GEORGE H. CLARK--Located on the corner of Broad and South Washington streets, the Clark Building houses the Schools of Printing and Photography and the Mechanical Department. The major segment of the upper floors houses department laboratories, all of which are modern and well-equipped. The building also houses some laboratories of the Graphic Arts Research Department, including Web Offset Laboratory, located in the basement, where the Reporter is printed.

The basement area contains the Institute Book Store, a lounge and meeting area, Techmila offices, mail room, central supply, and receiving.
for a men's dormitory, the purchase of land and buildings in the area such as Graflex, Hathaway, and private homes in the surrounding area.

Two years ago, RIT became accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

It is significant to note that the principal aims of the Institute have remained the same; to provide technical and liberal instruction to all those who are willing and able to profit thereby and also to provide guidance and assistance in maturing desirable personal characteristics. New equipment for study and recreation is constantly being added. The Institute's faculty is constantly being expanded to bolster areas of learning.

Today, the Institute seeks newer and finer means of learning and living through its policy of progress.

## HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE OF BUSINESS

Under the College of Business there are three areas of major study including the School of Business Administration, The Department of Food Administration, and The School of Retailing.

In 1952 Rochester Institute of Technology established a Department of Commerce by absorbing a near-by School of Commerce. This formed what is now a beneficial and increasingly powerful trio which includes three areas of the College of Business previously mentioned.

In 1958 the title of the Department of Commerce was changed to the Department of Business.

The year 1960 brought still another pronounced change when the Department of Business became the School of Business Administration.

The four programs offered in the School of Business Administration are in two fields. Business Administration and Secretarial Studies. The School of Business Administration program includes majors in Accounting and General Business. The program is cooperative in plan with cooperative employment commencing in the second year. Upon the successful completion of three years, students are granted the Associate in Applied Science Degree. These students who have the interest and aptitude for further study may continue their education for an additional year of four quarters of study. The work of this last year is built upon and carefully integrated with the corresponding
program of the first three years. Upon successful completion of the four year program, students are awarded the Bachelor of Science Degree.

The Secretarial Science programs include majors of Executive or Medical categories. The programs are two years in length, each year consisting of three consecutive quarters of study. Upon completion of either of these programs the Associate in Applied Science is awarded.

The Department of Food Administration evolved from a small nucleus of graduated Home Economics teachers from the Mechanics Institute in 1885.

By 1906 the need for scientifically trained food managers was realized and the major in Lunch Room Mgt. came about.

Eventually emerged the Department of Food Administration which became a part of the College of Business.

Two programs of study are offered in the Department of Food Administration, Food Management and Hospital Dietetics. The first year work is the same for all students, and selection of the major is made before the close of the freshman year before beginning the cooperative program of the second and third years. After completion of the third year of training the Associate in Applied Science Degree. Those that qualify upon completion of the fourth year are awarded the Bachelor of Science Degree.

Graduates who have earned the Bachelor of Science Degree are qualified to apply for American Dietetics Internships. The majors in the Department of Food Administration and courses of cooperative study are Food Management and Hospital Dietetics.

In 1923 the Department of Retailing was added to the Departments of Rochester Institute of Technology.

In 1960 the School of Retailing became a formal part of the College of Business changing from its ${ }^{\text {p }}$ category of a Division.

The School of Retailing offers three programs of study including Retail Management, Fashion Merchandise, and Interior Decoration. The programs are based upon a survey of the key positions in Retail Management resulting in courses of study which are practical in nature and designed to meet the needs of this field. Buying or department management becomes the goal of many students while others move into related fields of sales promotion ,personnel management or store management. Students studying Fashion Merchandising specialize in fabrics, women's apparel and accessories. These people have as their goal the merchandising area of Buyer, Fashion Coordinator, Bridal Consultant, Fashion Display Assistant, or other related fields. Those who elect to major in Interior Decoration have as their goal the merchandising
of home and institutional furnishings, coordinating home furnishings merchandise as well as consulting with customers concerning their decorating problems. Upon successful completion of three years of study, the Associate in Applied Science Degree is awarded. Those who qualify may continue and complete their fourth year and receive the Bachelor of Science Degree.

PUBLICATIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS
RIT REPORTER--The RIT Reporter is the official newspaper of the Student Assoication, the Institute, and the Alumni Association. Members of the Student Association, alumni, faculty and staff receive free copies. Editorial and business posts are filled by students who are chosen for competence in newspaper work. Students wishing to work on the paper should contact the editor in the Reporter Office, which is located in the Clark Building Tower.

TECHNILA--The school yearbook, which is published each spring, is called Techmila. In it are found photographic, artistic, and literary accounts of the events of the year, as well as the photographs of those students who are in the graduating class. Production of the book rests with a staff made up of all students interested in such activity. The book is given to all students who pay the student association fee.

STUDENT DIRECTORY--This booklet is distributed to all members of the student body. It contains the name, Rochester address, department, year of graduation, and home address of every student as well as the names and addresses of the faculty.

STUDENT HANDBOOK--The student handbook is compiled annually and contains information pertaining to student life at RIT. In addition to listing campus organizations, it lists most of the regulations and other information of

interest to the student. It is a guide to upperclassmen as well as freshmen, for many changes occur over the summer months.

WRIT--WRIT is the radio station of the men's dormitory council in Nathaniel Rochester Hall. Programing is provided solely to the rooms in Nathaniel Rochester Hall. The station is run by a student board of directors who formulate policy and handle the affairs of broadcasting.

Studios are located in Rochester Hall on the eighth floor. In addition to relaying its own signal, WRIT also relays FM programs originating from New York City and two local AM stations. WRTI--One of the newest Student Association organizations on campus is Radio Station WRTI. Still in the construction stage, WRTI plans a complete and consistent program of entertaining, educational and informative features for entertaining, educational and informative features for campus-wide reception. In meeting these objectives, WRTI will provide collegiate programming for its listeners, experience and training for its members, and communications, media for students, faculty and administration. BUSINESS CLUB

SOCIETY FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF MANAGEMENT--The Society for Advancement of Management, organized in 1958, offers the students of the School of Business Administration the opportunity to gain an insight into practical business
through speakers, movies, and sponsorship of a business conference each year. S.A.M. meets once each month.
S.A.M.'s primary goals are: 1. the encouragement of study and research in the betterment of our standard of living by the application of scientific principles and methods of management to all fields of endeavor and 2. the creation and development of the highest ethical conception of individual and collective responsibility on the part of the students of management. The requirements for membership are a 2.00 grade point average and enrollment in the School of Business Administration above the freshman level. FRATERNITIES

INTERFRATERNITY COUNCIL--The Interfraternity Council is a body that exists to determine matters of policy relating to fraternities and the conduct of their activities.

The membership of the board consists of one advisor and two members from each fraternity. This board meets monthly during the school year.

The board operates under a written constitution and no fraternity will be recognized by the Student Council unless it abides by the constitution and the decisions of the Interfraternity Council.

SIGMA PI--Sigma Pi was officially recognized in October, 1950. The group was formed to provide a social organization which would increase friendship, understanding, and cooperation on campus, and would practice and encourage the ideals of freedom, democracy, and brotherhood.

A precedent started by this organization was that of having a conservative pledging and initiation program. Sigma Pi's social program includes the Harvest Moon Ball in the fall, and a closed dinner dance in the spring. KAPPA SIGMA KAPPA--The local chapter traces its beginning to the Delta Delta Society founded at RIT in 1914. The National Order had it origin at Virginia Military Institute in 1867, which places it among the oldest fraternities in the country. In keeping with its national policies, the local chapter of KSK supports special projects for the Institute, local, and national charities.

Included in the organization's social program are the annual Sweetheart Ball, and a closed dinner dance in the spring.

TAU EPSILON PHI--This is RIT's youngest fraternity. It was officially recognized by Student Council and the Institute in 1958 under its original name of Rho Tau. In 1959, the group became affiliated with Tau Epsilon Phi national fraternity as the Epsilon Nu Chapter.

TEP's program has broadened considerably in one year.

This year will mark the second official weekend of the fraternity.

With TEP, the feeling of "collective pride" has enabled the fraternity to accomplish many of its objectives. TEP has conducted an extensive civic, social, and cultural program in the past and will continue to maintain its standards.

PHI SIGMA KAPPA--RIT's first fraternity, the local chapter of Phi Sigma Kappa was organized in 1901 as Phi Sigma Phi. In the fall of 1952 the fraternity became the Sigma Chapter of Theta Gamma, a national fraternity founded in 1912. In 1960 this group became affiliated with Phi Sigma Kappa.
The stated purpose of the fraternity is "to foster and promote all those more kindly instincts of mankind, which lead to a wealth of kindred satisfaction." On campus Phi Sigma Kappa works to promote among all students a vigorous spirit scholastically, athletically, and socially.

The Snowball in January and a closed dinner dance in the spring highlight the social program of varied activities. HONORARY FRATERNITIES

DELTA LAMBDA EPSILON-DLE is the professional photographic fraternity of the school of Photographic Technology, representing both illustrative and technical interests.

Scholastic achievement, personal growth, and contribution to the field of photography are the central aims and goals of the fraternity.

Prospective members of the organization qualify to become pledges upon the attainment of a 2.800 or better grade point average. The pledge will then become a brother of DLE after successful completion of the 6 week pledge period.

Activities of pledging are confined to furthering the basic aims and goals of the organization and include such things as the writing of a technical research paper on a photographic topic and the participating in normal fraternity activities.

DLE provides not only academic and professional stimulation, but also stresses a well-rounded social program. Seminars, lectures, field trips, picnics, parties, and the maintenance of a complete and unique library typify the DLE program.

The group was formulated unofficially in the fall of 1946. In 1950 the fraternity received its papers of national incorporation and has since grown to prominence in the photographic field.

GAMMA EPSILON TAU--GET is the international collegiate honor fraternity for students preparing to enter the graphic arts industry. The purpose of Gamma Epsilon Tau is to encourage and recognize scholastic achievement
among college students in graphic arts programs. It further encourages them to contribute constructively to the growth and development of the industry. GET is also active in promoting the importance of professional education as preparation for a career in the graphic arts.

RIT's Zeta Chapter of Gamma Epsilon Tau was chartered in 1955 and is the third oldest chapter of the organization. The national group currently has seven active chapters, one of which is located in Canada. Among the foremost activities of the fraternity are its monthly educational meetings and various field trips. The group also holds two annual banquets. GET is a co-sponsor of the annual Printing Week Banquet. Publication of the Typographer, the School of Printing's graphic arts publication, is produced under the direction of the group.

Qualifications for membership are that the candidate be enrolled as a full-time student in the School of Printing for three quarters, and that he achieve and maintain a cumulative 3.000 grade average for all college courses during his membership.

SIGMA BETA RHO--Sigma Beta Rho is the honorary and professional fraternity of the College of Business. The aims and objectives of the fraternity emphasize the academic and personal development of its membership.

A prospective member must have a grade point average of 2.500 during his first year of study to warrant an invitation to pledge the fraternity.

The fraternity provides a complete program including field trips, guest speakers, academic stimulation, and varied social activities. Sigma Beta Rho was formed in May 1960 and it is the youngest honorary fraternity at RIT. TAU KAPPA ALPHA--TKA is a national forensic speech honorary fraternity. The Institute's chapter was accepted and initiated in 1959, at the National TKA Tournament. The TKA motto, "Responsible Speech in a Democratic Society," further the aims of the Institute Forensic Society. Each year, TKA cites outstanding speakers for recognition in the fields of politics, relition, business, the arts, and labor. There are also national and regional events for the charter colleges. SORORITIES

INTERSORORITY COUNCIL--This Council is composed of an advisor and three representatives from each sorority. It is the governing agent over individual sororities. The council advisor is not affiliated with any one of the organizations.
Social activities of the Council include:

1. The fall rush party for prospective members and 2. The Intersorority Ball which is held in the spring. The Intersorority Scholastic Trophy is presented, at the ball, to the sorority which has had the highest
average grade for the previous school year. The trophy, a gift from the Intersorority Council, promotes high scholastic standards in the sororities at RIT.

ALPHA PSI--Alpha Psi Sorority was organized in 1921 to establish a friendly spirit of sisterhood and good will among the girls of all departments. Many lasting friendships are formed through participation in the various activities of the group. Alpha Psi is the sister sorority of Phi Sigma Kappa.

DELTA OMICRON--Delta Omicron Sorority was founded in 1921 by eight members. Scholastic standards are emphasized. The aim of the sorority is to promote high ideals, establish firm friendships, and to extend friendship to all. Delta Omicron is the sister sorority of Sigma Pi.

DO has grown in its years at the Institute and has an active alumnae organization.

PHI UPSILON PHI--Phi Upsilon Phi Sorority was the first sorority organized at the Rochester Institute of Technology. It was organized in 1919. The aims of the sorority are to promote friendship, unity, fidelity, and scholarship. Friendship is gained through the many activities in which the girls participate, and the highest ideals and ambitions are promoted. Phi Upsilon Phi is the sister sorority of Kappa Sigma Kappa.
