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HISTORY OF MONMOUTH COUNTY

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#### HISTORY OF MONMOUTH COUNTY

Monmouth College is located in Monmouth County, which is one of twenty-one counties that make up the state of New Jersey. For nearly three hundred years, Monmouth County has maintained its importance in New Jersey as a region of home owners, light industries and farms.

First settled in 1664 in the Middletown-Shrewsbury area, it was one of the four counties comprising the Province of East Jersey. One year later, the first courts were established. The name "Monmouth" originated in 1683, when a royal charter was granted, and was chosen by Colonel Lewis Morris, whose family originated in Monmouthshire, England.

East Jersey was given to Sir George Carteret by James, Duke of York and brother of Charles II. Later, Carteret's widow sold East Jersey to a group of twenty-four proprietors headed by William Penn. About 1690, under the reign of Queen Anne, the bickering proprietors decided to surrender their rights of government to the crown, but retain their interest in the soil. It was at this time, about 1693, that the County was divided into three townships--Middletown, Shrewsbury and Freehold.

It was from the proprietary form of government that New Jersey inherited the title of "Freeholder", and from this title Monmouth County took the name Freehold for its county seat. One of America's first heroines was Molly Pitcher, who picked up her husband's cannon ramrod after he was killed during the Revolutionary War. She carried on for him in the Battle of Monmouth, during the fighting which took place near Freehold.

Present-day Monmouth County covers 477 square miles. From rolling uplands in the west and north, which reach a height of 391 feet at Highlands, it sloops down to the flatness of the Atlantic Coastal Plain in the marshy pine barrens of the southeast. Among its many streams and rivers, the principal ones are the Navesink, Shrewsbury, Shark and Manasquan Rivers.

The County's seacoast, stretching for 21 miles, and the 12-mile expanse fronting on Raritan Bay comprise a resort area which includes some of the state's finest beaches. Vacationers have long been attracted to Asbury Park and Long Branch, the two cities among the County's 52 municipalities. Many have become permanent residents, settling in the two cities, the 35 boroughs and the 15 townships which comprise the County. Official recognition of this growth lies in population figures. The 1950 census estimated the number at 225,327, while the 1960 figure was 324,401. Vacationers and residents can enjoy fishing, swimming, boating, golf, thoroughbred racing at Monmouth Park, and harness racing at Freehold.

For the farmer, Monmouth County offers the fertile soil of the coastal plain belt, which is among the most productive in the nation. It enhances the name "Garden State" by its production of Jersey corn, potatoes, tomatoes and fruit. Monmouth ranks fifth among the counties in number of peach trees, and the Freehold area is one of the centers of apple growing and shipping. Blueberries, the state's first-ranking small fruit, are planted in important quantities.

Thoroughbred horse breeding is on the increase, along with the raising of cattle such as Black Angus and Whitefaced Herefords, while other farmers conduct poultry and dairy operations.

Industries are moving into the County with enthusiasm. Most of the County is within a fifty-mile radius of New York City. Two railroads and a network of major highways, including the New Jersey Turnpike and the Garden State Parkway, make it easy to reach the industrial areas of Newark and New York City.

Military installations important to the security and progress of the nation are a vital part of Monmouth County. These include Fort Monmouth, which is operated by the United States Signal Corps; Fort Hancock, part of the Eastern Antiaircraft Command; and the Navy Ammunition Depot at Earle.

Although many residents commute daily to the Newark-New York metropolitan area, it is evident that those who live here may also work here in industries, farming and government service. The major source of employment in the County includes 25,000 commuters; Federal Government, 8,140 people; agriculture, 6,000; manufacturing, 16,000; retail trades, 17,500; services, 15,000; construction, 5,200; transportation, 6,300 and other sources 6,700. During the summer, when the many beach resorts in Monmouth County are flourishing, the population increases by a daily total of more than 250,000 visitors and summer residents.

New industries settling in Monmouth County include the Bell Telephone Laboratories, Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing Co., Brockway Glass Co., Electronics Associates, Lily-Tulip Corp., Bendix Corp., Reeves Instruments, and Well Built. There are 408 manufacturing establishments in the County and 1,412 farms of over 10 acres each. The County is served by the Jersey Central and Pennsylvania Railroads, with 21 passenger stations on the lines. Normal travel time from Red Bank to New York via train is 71 minutes, and 65 minutes by car. Monmouth County Airport and the Red Bank Airport also provide air transportation.

There are 15 banks in the County, with 40 branches. There are 9 hospitals including Monmouth Medical Center, located in the County. There are also 115 elementary schools, 14 high schools, 4 regional schools, 4 secondary parochial schools, 16 elementary parochial schools, and 10 private schools.

The people of the area are kept well informed by the 20 local newspapers serving the County. Monmouth County families had a buying income average of \$6,500 per family last year. The families had 129,000 automobiles.

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This, of course, led to an immediate expansion of enrollment, and quite naturally, this regulted in a broadening of curriculum and faculty. It also created a wider interest in the community and attracted name of the leading civic and business leaders in the area to serve on the Board of Trustees.

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#### HISTORY OF MONMOUTH COLLEGE

One of the most important assets of any community is its educational facilities, particularly in these times when secondary and college education have taken on such added significance.

This challenge for educational and cultural advancement has been well met in the shore area through many media, but one of the most interesting has been the development and enlargement of Monmouth College.

Now a four-year college with almost 3,000 students, Monmouth College has an interesting history dating back to its founding in 1933 when it was operated with Federal funds as a junior college. In 1936 it started to operate without Federal funds and began charging tuition.

Since that time it has had an interesting rise, reaching its climax in the summer of 1956, when it became a four-year institution and moved to the spacious and attractive Shadow Lawn Estate in West Long Branch.

Here, the character of the college changed completely. It was then able to offer Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees for completion of four years of college work, as well as the Associate in Arts for two years of study. Moving from Long Branch High School, which it had shared for 23 years, meant that the College was now able to offer day courses as well as night courses.

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Although Monmouth College throughout its transition has remained primarily a commuter college, there are some boarding students from distant places who take up residence during the school year in facilities near the campus. Next year Monmouth College plans to build dormitory facilities for 600 students.

In addition to the Main Building, which is on the site occupied by the summer home of President Woodrow Wilson and where he accepted the nomination leading to his second term as President, there are a number of other buildings which house various departments of the College. In 1960, Monmouth College received from the Murry and Leonie Güggenheim Foundation a beautiful mansion on a nine-acre estate directly across the street from the main campus. This mansion, with certain alterations to adapt it to library purposes, contains 30,000 volumes and was opened in the Spring of 1961.

Monmouth College, now a full four-year institution accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, has served as the educational center for a number of New Jersey's leading companies.



## GENERAL INFORMATION

#### Student Activities

At Monmouth College, students are encouraged to participate in sports, social affairs, student government, and class and club organizations. These activities are fostered because of their influence in developing personalities, character, and sociability. In addition to promoting interests and skills, the activities emphasize leadership, cooperation, and initiative.

Each student in the College is a member of the Monmouth College Student Association. The function of the Association is to promote democratic student participation in the government of the College, to encourage cordial and responsible relations with the community, and to foster better understanding among all college individuals and groups.

The Student Council represents the Student Association, approves budgets of the student organizations, sends delegates to collegiate meetings, and promotes the interests of all students. Among the highest honors at Monmouth is selection for membership in Lambda Sigma Tau, an organization of students chosen by the faculty on the basis of their demonstrated leadership, scholarship and personality.

Students interested in writing have the opportunity to work on the Outlook, the College weekly newspaper; on the Shadows, the College yearbook; and on Monmouth Letters, a semi-annual literary magazine.

The athletic program includes varsity baseball, basketball, tennis, golf, and soccer for men; varsity basketball and baseball for women; and intramural athletics for men and women. Arrangements are made for such activities as skating, swimming, badminton, fencing, bowling, hanball, and tennis.

#### Placement Service

The purposes of the Office of Placement Service are (1) to assist students and graduates to find suitable permanent employment in the fields of their interests, (2) to assist students in obtaining part-time or temporary employment during the school year or the summer, and (3) to meet the needs of employers who are seeking mature, college-trained employees.

#### Alumni Association

The Monmouth College Alumni Association was incorporated as a non-profit organization in 1955, after several years of operation on a more informal basis. The purposes of the Association are (1) to perpetuate the friendships formed in college years, (2) to promote the welfare of Monmouth College, and (3) to promote the cause of education generally. In 1960, the American Alumni Council accepted Monmouth College's application for institutional membership.

#### STUDENT AID

#### The National Defense Student Loan Program

As authorized by the National Defense Education Act of 1958, superior students who can prove financial need may borrow up to \$1,000 a year. This amount is contingent upon the government allocations. No interest is charged until after one year from the date the borrower ceases to be a full-time student. The rate of interest is 3%.

#### State Aid

In 1959 the State created a loan program for New Jersey students to give them financial assistance in obtaining a college education. Students may borrow on the basis of their own signature at a reasonable rate of 5% interest. Borrowers pay only interest while they are in school. Payments on the principal begin at graduation and may extend as long as six years.

## Federal Aid

The Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency recently approved a \$2.7 million appropriation to Monmouth College for the construction of three dormitories and a dining hall. The dormitories will house 400 students; 240 men and 160 women. Construction will begin this fall with completion scheduled for the following year.

#### SCHOLARSHIPS

Two scholarships for Monmouth County women students have been granted by the Northern Monmouth County Branch of the American Association of University Women.

A scholarship for a Monmouth County student has been granted by the Jersey Shore Branch of the American Association of University Women.

A scholarship for a man or woman who is a resident of Monmouth County is given by the Uncle Robert Foundation, Inc., of Long Branch, as a memorial to the Spero family of Long Branch.

Two scholarships for a man and woman who are residents of Monmouth County have been granted by the Zeta Epsilon Lambda Chapter of the Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc.

A scholarship for an engineering student has been granted by the Monmouth Society of Professional Engineers Auxiliary.

#### ENROLLMENT

Statistics for the fall of 1961 indicate a total undergraduate enrollment of 2884, with 1718 students on full-time schedules and 1166 attending part-time. Six hundred and seventy-two students are enrolled in the Business Administration Department, making this department one of the two largest at the College.

For the past several years total enrollment at the College has been rising rapidly. It has been estimated that within the next decade 10,000 students will be enrolled for courses at Monmouth College.

Many graduates of Monmouth College have completed their advanced studies at some of the finest universities in the country, such as Rutgers University, New York University, University of Delaware, Indiana University, University of Illinois, University of Arizona, and University of Maine. Those graduates who have chosen professional careers have been employed by some of the finest firms in New Jersey. Among the more prominent are: Western Electric, Bell Telephone, E. I. Dupont, Electronic Associates, and Standard Oil of New Jersey. Rarmon M. Bradpord

Prior to 1956 Monmouth Junior College shared the use of the Long Branch High School building. In June of that year the New Jersey Department of Education authorized the College to become a four-year institution. Thereafter the College facilities were moved to the Shadow Lawn campus.

By the fall of 1956, nine four-year major programs were developed. A Business Administration Department was established with Dr. Kenneth C. Streibig named as its chairman. Dr. Streibig also served as Dean of Administration during this period. Although only sixteen business courses were offered to students seeking degrees in Business Adminintration, the program was designed to meet the needs of the student by requiring studies in accounting, law, marketing, economics, and management. However, Dr. Streibig felt that a more adequate business program was necessary and believed that studies in liberal arts should be required of each student of business.

In 1959 Dr. Earl G. Nicks, who had been a member of the business faculty for one year, assumed control of the Department. Under Dr. Nicks course offerings in the business field were expanded. The following year each Business Administration major was required to complete four credits in either Art, Music, or Drama and six credits in Literature as part of the four-year program. It was hoped that such studies in the field of liberal arts would provide the student with a broader educational background.

On February 1, 1962 the resignation of Dr. Nicks (who accepted an important position in industry) became effective, and Mr. Robert J. Tompa, a member of the business faculty, was named as temporary chairman of the Business Administration Department. His philosophy with respect to the aims of the Department was essentially the same as that of his predecessors--to provide the student of Business Administration with a broad background through an extensive curriculum involving studies in the field of business and liberal arts. Mr. Tompa plans to divide the business program into four majors: accounting, marketing, economics and management. This program will be designed to dovetail with that of Rutgers University so that students will be able to proceed directly into graduate work.

The Business Administration Department now offers fifty business courses taught by twenty-five full-time instructors.

## "Duty and Service in Business"

On Friday, January 13, 1961, Delta Sigma Beta was officially approved as a student activity at Monmouth College. The original membership of the organization consisted of eleven Business Administration majors with the desire of becoming more well rounded in the field of business through fraternal association.

Although the problems of the Fraternity during its early stages were largely organizational, the members were confident that Delta Sigma Beta would one day become firmly established as a Professional Business Fraternity at Monmouth College.

On April 20, 1961, thirteen pledges were accepted as members of Delta Sigma Beta. The first official election of officers was held on May 4. Mr. Fred Porter, then acting as temporary President, was elected to the office on a permanent basis. Mr. Walter Church was selected for the office of Vice-president, Mr. Bruce Marsland was elected Secretary, and Mr. David S. Robinson chosen as Treasurer.

During the spring of 1961, Mr. Alfred K. Brown, a member of the business faculty at Monmouth College and a member of the International Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi, spoke to the members of Delta Sigma Beta concerning the national organization. He outlined the requirements and procedures that would be necessary in establishing a local chapter of Delta Sigma Pi at Monmouth College.

Seeking further information regarding the possibilities of affiliation with Delta Sigma Pi, the members contacted the Central Office. On October 10, Mr. Charles Farrar, Executive Secretary, visited the Monmouth campus. After hearing his discussion of the functions and goals of the International Fraternity, the members of Delta Sigma Beta agreed that their goals and aspirations were in accord with those of Delta Sigma Pi, and that work should begin toward the establishing of a local chapter at Monmouth College. During a general meeting of the Fraternity on November 2, the members, by a roll call vote, signified their unanimous desire to become members of Delta Sigma Pi, and to operate a local chapter of the International Fraternity. Delta Sigma Beta, during its fifteen-month existence, has been quite active in its professional program. The members have participated in field trips and have heard several guest speakers who spoke for the benefit of the entire student body. These speakers have been from a variety of fields in business and government. For example, speakers have been heard discussing such areas as automation, insurance, Peace Corps, real estate, economics (input-Output analysis), Social Security, Civil Service, and job application. Recent field trips have been to the Western Electric Plant at Kearny, New Jersey, employing 15,700 people, and to the General Motors Assembly Plant at Linden, New Jersey.

Two brothers of Delta Sigma Beta were particularly impressed with their visit to Western Electric and have been employed by the Company. They will start work there following graduation. With the assistance of the Placement Department of Monmouth College, Delta Sigma Beta is planning future professional activities for the Fall, 1962 session. Trips to Bell Laboratories in Holmdel, New Jersey, the Budweiser Plant in Newark, the New York Stock Exchange, Lily-Tulip Corporation in Holmdel, and to a local newspaper have been discussed.

Speakers lecturing on such fields as time and motion study, accounting, banking, and advertising are next in order. The members of Delta Sigma Beta feel that their professional program has met with success considering the relatively short time that the Fraternity has been in existence at Monmouth College. Follow-up interest has resulted in jobs for five brothers of Delta Sigma Beta. Two brothers have been employed by Western Electric, and three others are now working at Bamberger's Department Store, the establishment which provided the speaker on "Job Application". Such results have stimulated hope for even greater success in the future.

In order to fulfill its responsibility to Monmouth College, the Fraternity has embarked on a program of serving the school through various activities designed to promote the general welfare of the student body. During the first two weeks of April 1962, the members sold college yearbooks as a service to the institution. In an attempt to improve communications among the various Greek-letter organizations on campus, the members of Delta Sigma Beta provided funds for the construction of a glass-enclosed bulletin board. With space provided for each fraternity and sorority, it ishoped that the use of this board will result in closer relationships between the many Greek-letter groups at Monmouth College. Although the attention of the members of Delta Sigma Beta has often been focused on professional matters, social events have not been neglected. During the past year, several dinner-dances have been held. These affairs have been periodically arranged for the benefit of the newly accepted brothers of Delta Sigma Beta. During these events, a formal ritual ceremony is conducted and the new members are initiated into the organization.

During the past several years, a rivalry has developed between two of New Jersey's colleges: Monmouth and Glassboro State College. Each December the two schools clash in a basketball game held at Convention Hall in Asbury Park. Preceding the game floats designed and constructed by the various fraternities at Monmouth are displayed through the streets of Asbury Park. In December of last year, Delta Sigma Beta participated in the float parade for the first time. With a flair of creativity and timeliness, the Brothers of Delta Sigma Beta constructed a rocketship pointed toward the heavens. With a chimpanzee bride and groom mounted on the nose of the ship, and the playing of Abba-Dabba Honeymoon, there was an evident bid to rival the recent orbiting of a chimpanzee shot from Cape Canaveral.

The members of Delta Sigma Beta believe that this Fraternity has become firmly established at Monmouth College. This has resulted, in part, from their efforts in developing a well rounded program of professional and social activities. Although Delta Sigma Beta is comparatively young, the members feel that they have made considerable strides in developing a vigorous and efficiently run organization. Twenty-five members representing various interests within the field of business constitute the membership of the organization. Major interests of the members include: sales, marketing, economics, personnel, accounting, education. and management.

The members of Delta Sigma Beta are confident that through the continued efforts and guidance of Dr. William G. Van Note, President of Monmouth College; Dr. Kenneth C. Streibig, Dean of Administration; Dr. George W. Neel, Dean of Faculty; Mr. Irving J. Shapiro, Registrar; Mr. Robert Hogg, Director of Student Activities; Mr. Edward N. Emmons, Director of Placement; and Mr. Alfred K. Brown, Faculty Advisor and member of Delta Sigma Pi, that the organization will be able to operate in complete accord with the standards established by Delta Sigma Pi, and will maintain the fine reputation of the International Fraternity.
