



THE UNIVERSITY OF AKRON

Buchtel College was established by the Ohio Universalist Convention on May 31, 1870, on a hill overlooking Akron, a thriving industrial city of 10,000 situated at the summit of the Ohio Canal. The College was named in honor of John R. Buchtel, a farm machinery manufacturer, whose money (half a million dollars) and spirit sustained the enterprise. Support also came from local men who pioneered important inudstries cereals, clay products, matches, farm machinery, and rubber.

By 1913 it was apparent that Buchtel College was more closely oriented toward Akron than toward Universalism, and in that year its assets were transferred to the city as the nucleus of the Municipal University of Akron. The Buchtel name was perpetuated in the Buchtel College of Liberal Arts.

Between 1910 and 1920, Akron was the fastest growing city in America, its population increasing from 70,000 to 208,000 in that decade. A crisis resulted in city financing. The Municipal University found itself holding a low priority behind street paving, sewers, police and fire protection and a hundred other pressing civic needs. In 1920, public tax money supplied 88 percent of the operating costs of the University, but by 1929 it supplied only 50 percent. The difference was made up in student fees, of course, and when the public said that the student should bear the cost of his education since it was to his selfish advantage, President Zook replied that this argument failed to take into account the benefits to society of an educated citizenry. Support of the Municipal University was, in Zook's words, "an investment which the municipality may rightfully be expected to make."

To compound the difficulty, almost no capital funds were voted in the quarter-century following 1913, nor was the effort to interest private donors successful. But students poured in, and the frantic overcrowding that resulted forced the University to establish entrance requirements that severely limited the kind of student who could attend. Indeed, from 1923 until World War II, Akron had one of the most selective student bodies in the state, its requirements being above those of most private schools.

The 1920's are popularly regarded as prosperous years of America, but Akron failed to share fully in this abundance. Akron's war-time boom had been fueled by the tremendous expansion of the rubber industry. The sharp post-war depression of 1920-21 caught that industry in a severe state of overexpansion. Scores of small operators went under or were forced into consolidations, and several of the major producers came under the control of New York financial interests. Absentee ownership and control of any level tends to create an unhealthy environment where the money is made, and such was the case in Akron where private wealth suffered and retreated into a cautious conservatism. Just as the city was starting to regain economic health the Great Depression of the Thirties set it back hard. Clearly the University could expect no help from local government, but the public works projects of the federal government promised to provide much needed assistance. The Board of Directors was reluctant to use this source, however, for most of its members were political and economic conservatives who did not approve of Franklin Delano Roosevelt and his so called "give-away" programs. But the funds were there and they could be had.

The directors finally resolved their dilemma. They placed on the minutes a resolution condeming federal "make work" programs and then instructed President Simmons to apply for federal funds. Thus it has ever been when principal and interest clash.

In the depressed Thirties the student mood turned more serious and campus protests against compulsory R.O.T.C., American involvement with Europe's problems, and certain policies of the federal government merely reflected the concerns of the larger society. It is hard to believe, but baseball was discontinued because President Simmons could not find the \$100 required for necessary equipment.

Just as the University, the city, and the nation started to move again late in the decade, the Burke-Wadsworth Act of 1940 introduced a new song to campus, "Goodbye Dear I'll Be Back In A Year, 'Cause I'm In The Army Now."

The end of the war brought an end to a long period of relative neglect in campus development. New buildings displaced old landmarks; the pace intensified after 1951 when Norman Auburn brought his great talents and energies to bear on the effort. Whether fairly or not, students in the 1950's were labelled the "beat generation." As a group, they were accused of apathy and lack of involvement; pundits claimed this apathy mirrored the nation's pulse during the "Eisenhower years," but many students gave the lie to such labelling. Participation in seemingly endless series of tax-levy campaigns was one of the most conspicuous ways in which Akron students demonstrated their concern. "Keep the lamp of learning burning" was but one of a dozen campaign slogans that accompanied campus life, and a host of new words indicative of University growth - urban renewal, Ph.D., Firestone Conservatory, Memorial Hall, Kolbe Hall, and many others - became common currency on the Hilltop. Not least among the changes was the improved collegiate atmosphere which accompanied the building of the first domatory to grace the campus since 1913.

The pase of growth intensified in the Sixties fueled by money from the State of Ohio. The long struggle for financial security was resolved by the achievement of state status, and with it came a broadening of responsibilities as Akron increased its academic services with new programs extending from the doctoral level to the two-year Community and Technical College level. No longer did the corporation limits of Akron determine the University's vision: its long successful commitment to adult education and a host of other community services new extended to new geographic areas.

In 1914 a College of Engineering was established. Other professional colleges followed:

- 1915 Evening sessions were begun.
- 1921 The College of Education was established.
- 1935 The General College was established.
- 1953 The College of Business Administration was established.
- 1959 The Ph.D. was conferred for the first time.
- 1964 The Community and Technical College was established.
- 1967 The College of Fine and Applied Arts was established.

1967 The College of Nursing was established.

In undergraduate education, Akron was an early supportor of the Free Elective Idea (1880's) and General Education (1935), the latter program being developed into one of the most fully rationalized in the country. Graduate work evolved from the awarding of the first master's degree (1880) to the beginning of doctoral work in 1956. Currently, the doctorate is offered in twelve fields of study.

Since Buchtel College initiated college courses in Rubber Chemistry (1908) it is appropriate that Akron's first Ph.D. program was offered in Polymer Chemistry.

The University of Akron has set high standards for itself which result in its being accredited and approved by the following organizations and associations: The North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, Ohio College Association, American Medical Association, American Chemical Society, The Engineers' Council for Professional Development, National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education and State Board of Nursing Education and Nurse Registration. The University of Akron is a member of the following organizations: The American Council on Education, Association of American Colleges, Association of Urban Universities, American Society for Engineering Education, Ohio College Association, The American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, holds associate membership in the International Council on Education for Teaching and in The National League of Nursing, Department of Baccalaureate, and Higher Degree Programs.

The College of Law has membership in the League of Ohio Law Schools and is fully approved by the American Bar Association. The College of Business Administration is a member of the American Association of Collegiate Schools of Business. The University is also a member of the Association of University Evening Colleges. In addition to this, it is an accredited member of the North Central Conference of Summer Schools.

The eighty acre campus with more than fifty modern buildings is located at the hub of an industrial urban area of 700,000 persons. The University of Akron now enrolls 11,300 day and 5,383 evening students in credit courses and an additional 1,879 in "informal" non-credit adult education. Its students come from 36 states and 49 foreign countries. Alumni are concentrated in Ohio, but many represent the University in countries around the world. Akron's long time leadership in continuing adult education through its Institute of Civic Education and its Center for Urban Studies had been supplemented by the cultural leadership it has provided in the renaissance of artistic endeavor in Akron.

Akron State University's widened financial base enables it to extend its influence far beyond local boundries. Its first century of service has prepared it for a widening role in years to come. HISTORY OF THE SCHOOL OF BUSINESS

HISTORY OF

THE COLLEGE OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

In 1919, a Department of Commerce was established in the College of Engineering to offer courses in administration, marketing, sales administration, accounting and commercial law. A distinctive academic feature of the department was that it operated on a cooperative basis with commerce and industry in the Akron metropolitan area.

In 1938, the Department of Commerce was transferred from the College of Engineering to the Buchtel College of Liberal Arts. At the time of the transfer, the department offered undergraduate degree programs in two areas; general business and accounting. In order to broaden the offerings of the Department of Commerce, the Department of Industrial Management was transferred from the College of Engineering to Buchtel College and was absorbed by the Commerce Department in 1947. For a number of years thereafter, the department offered three undergraduate majors; general business, accounting and industrial management.

On February 18, 1953 the Trustees of the University of Akron, on the recommendation of President Norman P. Auburn, established the College of Business Administration. Dr. Warren W. Leigh was appointed Dean, and the College began to function September 1, 1953. The College of Business Administration, as organized, embraced the programs of the Department of Commerce and Secretarial Science which, until this time, were a part of the Buchtel College. The New College was organized into four departments as follows:

- 1. Accounting, with Associate Professor Dennis Gordon, C.P.A.
- 2. General Business, with Dean Warren W. Leigh in charge.
- 3. Industrial Management, with Associate Professor Frank L. Simonetti as head.
- 4. Secretarial Science, with Professor Howard M. Doutt.

In 1959, the Secretarial Science Department was eliminated and the secretarial science baccalaureate program was reduced to a two-year associate program and transferred to the General College. Subsequently, in 1964 the program was transferred from the General College to the newly-established Community and Technical College.

In 1963 significant changes took place. The first of these was a change in name of the Department of General Business to that of Department of Marketing and Finance. Charles F. Posion was designated as the new head.

The Master of Business Administration program was initiated in 1958 and in 1963 the Master of Science degree in Accounting was established. One year later, the Master of Science degree in Industrial Management was approved.

During the academic year 1966-1967 there was a fundamental change made in the Department of Marketing and Finance. The Department was split and two disciplines were placed under separate heads.

As of September, 1969 the College of Business Administration consists of four academic instructional units and offers three bachelors degrees and three masters degrees. More specific details with respect to academic degrees offered and the organization of the College are discussed on the followinglpages. The College of Business Administration offers three masters degrees. They are the:

> Master of Business Administration Master of Science in Accounting

Master of Science in Industrial Management

The Master of Business Administration degree is a graduate program designed to offer the student advanced work beyond the bachelor's degree in the broad concepts of business organization and management as partial preparation for an executive career in industry, commerce or government. Any approved baccalaureate degree may be accepted as the prerequisite for the program. In addition to serving as a broad graduate program to provide a capstone program for undergraduate majors in business and economics, the MBA program is well-suited to serve the academic needs of persons who hold undergraduate degrees in liberal arts, humanites, engineering, physical sciences and natural sciences who may wish to add a program of graduate study in administration in preparing for roles of executive leadership in their respective areas.

The Master of Science degrees in Accounting and in Industrial Management are specialized degrees in their respective areas.

The Master of Science degree in Accounting is designed to prepare graduate students for professional careers in public accounting or for executive positions in private accounting and finance. The program of study is designed to provide advanced specialized study in several of the following areas; C.P.A. problems, contemporary accounting theory and problems, advanced auditing, advanced income taxes and international accounting. In addition to allowing specialization in accounting, the student is required to complete graduate course work in administration, economics and marketing or finance.

The Master of Science degree in Industrial Management is a specialized program of study designed to prepare graduate students for executive careers in industrial management and industrial research. The program is a blend of three academic elements:

- 1. behaviorial science
- 2. quantitative methods, and
- 3. functional administration.

The three masters degrees offered by the College of Business Administration were established as follows:

Degree	Year Offered
Master of Business Administration	1958
Master of Science in Accounting	1963
Master of Science in Industrial Management	1964

The faculty of the College of Business Administration has conferred 126 graduate degrees during the past four years. The President is the chief executive of the University. The Vice President for Academic Affairs reports to the President and is responsible for the execution of academic policy and is responsible for the respective academic units of the University.

The Dean of the College of Business Administration reports directly to the Vice President for Academic Affairs on all matters pertaining to the College. The Dean is a member of the President's Executive Committee, the University Council, the Graduate Council, the University Research Committee and the Academic Policies and Curriculum Committee.

The College of Business Administration is organized on a departmental basis consisting of four academic departments plus a Bureau of Business and Economic Research and a Bureau of Executive Conferences and Seminars. The four academic departments are:

Department of Accounting Department of Finance Department of Management Department of Marketing

Each department is administered by a department head. The Bureau os Business and Economic Research and the Bureau of Executive Conferences and Seminars are headed by Directors.

The Dean of the College is appointed by the Board of Trustees upon recommendation of the President and is responsible to the President through the Vice President for Academic Affairs. He serves at the pleasures of the President. The Dean is the administrative head of the College and is charged with the general supervision of its interests, in accordance with policies and rules established by the Board of Directors, the President, the University Council, and the College faculty. The Department Heads are appointed by the Board of Trustees upon recommendation of the President and hold office at the pleasure of the President. They are responsible to the Dean of the College. They are the administrative heads of their respective departments and are charged with the general supervision of all departmental interests, in accordance with the administrative policies established by the President, the Dean, the College of Business Administration faculty, and the University Council.

Each Department Head is responsible for recommending changes of curricula in his department and for improving the quality of instruction in his department. He works with the Dean, the Vice President and Dean of Student Services, and the Dean of the General College concerning registration of students in his department and policies of admission to the Upper College. In conference with the Dean, he recommends reappointments, promotions, tenure, and salaries of the faculty of his department and, after consulting with other members of his department, recommends new appointments to the faculty of his department. With the Dean, also, he works out details of Department and College budget recommendations. He recommends to the Dean the dismissal of members who are not on indefinite tenure; and he follows the same procedure as in appointment and promotion in recommending dismissal, for cause, of members of his department who are on indefinite tenure. He is responsible for recommending the purchase of books, journals, and other library materials in his departmental field and for seeing that his department section of the University Library is kept up-to-date. He advises his departmental faculty concerning changes and trends in educational thought and practice, and meets regularly with them to shape the educational practices of his department.

The Dean recommends the appointment, salary, tenure, promotion and dismissal of faculty members after consultation with the appropriate heads of departments; promotes the general welfare of the faculty and students; supervises the curricula, courses and methods of instruction, and works to improve them. He directs the attention of the faculty to trends and changes in educational thought and practice; develops and formulates policies for the improvement of the College for consideration of the University Council. He counsels with students; acts upon student promotions of the College; supervises the registration of the College of Business Administration students; administers the rules and regulations established for the academic progress, promotion, and discipline of the College of Business Administration students. He coordinates with the Dean of the Graduate School work on the graduate level in the College; approves the schedule of courses and examinations as prepared by the Registrar and the Dean of the Evening College. He transmits to the President the budgetary recommendations of the College as developed in conference with the needs of the departments; takes reasonable precautions for the safekeeping of all instructional supplies and equipment of the College. He calls meetings of the College of Business Administration faculty as needed to transact College business; appoints members of such standing and special committees of the faculty as may be established or as instructed by the faculty. The Dean submits to the President in advance of each meeting of the Board of Trustees such recommendations concerning the College as he may desire for Board action; submits an annual report to the President concerning the activities, problems, and needs of the College; and performs such other duties and may be assigned to him by the President.

The Bureau of Business and Economic Research began operation in September, 1969. The Bureau will serve the faculty, the College of Business Administration students, the University, and the business community by observing three broad objectives. One is to serve the neighboring business community and government by: a) originating and administering area research projects which may be published at the discretion of the Bureau, b) distributing Bureau research publications, and c) channeling research proposals from business firms to students and faculty members.

A second objective of the Bureau is to encourage and facilitate faculty-initiated research projects. Research time grants are to be made to faculty members and assistance is to be given for routine research editing and typing. The Bureau will also publish and distribute monographs of faculty research projects.

The third objective of the Bureau is to cooperate with like bureaus of other universities. This includes the interchange of information and publications and attendance at the national meetings of the Association of University Bureaus of Business and Economic Research. We hope to become accredited by AUBBER.

The Bureau of Executives Conferences and Seminars began operation in September, 1969. The primary objective of the Division is to promote the continuing education of men and women at all levels of management. It sponsors seminars, conferences, institutes, workshops, and short non-credit courses which serve the needs and interests of industry, commerce, government and professional groups. Programs may cover many subject areas. The Division cooperates with business associations and with Federal agencies in designing and coordinating specific programs to meet the needs of managers. Instruction is provided by members of the faculty and others who are recognized leaders in business, government and education.



HISTORY OF PETITION GROUP

History Of The Beta Alpha Fraternity

Colony of Delta Sigma Pi

On Thursday, February 20, 1969, nineteen students of the College of Business Administration and Dr. Stephen S. Castle of the Department of Marketing, met with Mr. Charles L. Farrar, Executive Director of the International Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi. The purpose of the meeting was to organize a colony of Delta Sigma Pi on the campus of The University of Akron.

A week after this initial meeting, the new colony met to begin the groundwork for establishing a chapter of the fraternity. A steering committee of seven volunteer members was formed to set the objectives, policies, and procedures of the colony, and sub-committees were organized for the purpose of petitioning new members and publicity. The major objective of the colony was also established. This was .. "to establish a chartered capter of the International Fraternity of Delta Sigma Pi on the campus of The University of Akron, during the institution's 1969-70 centennial year."

With a definite goal in mind, the activity of the colony swung into high gear. In order to sustain the existing enthusiasm a program of visiting speakers from surrounding industries was set up. To date the colony has been graced with the presence of five outstanding representatives of varied fields of commerce at its meetings.

In May of 1969, the colony became BETA ALPHA FRATERNITY and local bylaws were drawn up and approved by the quorum of members. After minor lags, the membership drive received an added boost when publicity stations were set up in the student union and forms circulated to obligate men to Delta Sigma Pi. The 1968-69 school year closed on an optimistic note.

The Fall of 1969 was a period of renewed effort by the men of BETA ALPHA, and during this time great progress was being made towards it goal. There were now twenty-six (26) paid members, including a board of four temporary officers, and the membership program was again underway. However, the momentum was slowed down as problems of scheduling meetings were encountered.

In January of 1970, the colony was honored by the visit of Mr. Charles Farrar who provided new inspiration and renewed the enthusiasm of the colony. The purpose of the visit was to schedule a date for formal pledging of BETA ALPHA members into Delta Sigma Pi. The ceremonies were set for Sunday, February 1, 1970. Nominations were then made for the permanent officers, who would be voted on after the pledging ceremonies.

On February 1, the meeting was called to order and Dr. Stephen S. Castle was nominated as faculty advisor. The motion was voted upon and carried unanimously. Mr. Charles Farrar was then introduced, and proceeded to carry out the pledging ceremony during which, thirty-nine (39) members formally pledged. The election of officers was then held and the following members voted into office:




THE UNIVERSITY LIBRARY

The University Library contains 285,000 volumes.

In the Main Library are the circulating, reference and periodical collections in the Social Sciences and humanities and a government documents collection for social sciences. Unique features of the Main Library are the Herman Muehlstein Rare Book Room and the Charles E. and Mabel M. Ritchie Memorial Room that now houses the University Archives.

On the ground floor of the Main Library is Audio Visual Services with a collection of records and films for student use.



BUCHTEL HALL

Buchtel Hall, in the center of the main campus, is the Administration Center of the University. It contains offices of the President, the Vice President for Academic Affairs, the Vice President for Planning, the Vice President for Business and Finance, the Dean of Student Services, the Auditor, the Controller and Treasurer, University Relations, University News Service, Publications, Institutional Research, Admissions Office, and the Center of Information Systems. It is named for the institution's first benefactor, John R. Buchtel.




SPICER HALL

Spicer Hall is the major student contact building, housing the offices of the Registrar, Student Services, Cashier, Evening College, Institute for Civic Education, and the Deans of the Summer Sessions and of the General College.




RESIDENCE HALLS

The University's Residence Halls complex is located on the North Campus adjacent to the Main Campus and within easy walking distance of downtown Akron, The complex contains five dormitory buildings capable of housing 1,000 students. The complex consists of Orr, Ritchie, and Sisler-McFawn Halls for women and Residence Towers I and II for men. The complex offers an array of facilities for dining, recreation, relaxation and study.



BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION AND LAW BUILDING

This structure houses the College of Business Administration and Law classrooms and offices, plus the John S. Knight Auditorium and C. Blake McDowell Law Library in addition to lecture, laboratory and seminar rooms, and a practice courtroom.



PERFORMING ARTS CULTURAL CENTER

The Performing Arts building is presently under construction. However, the architectural sketch of the finished structure will add to the culture and beauty of the campus. The structure will be used for all cultural activities of the city and The University of Akron.



AUBURN SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING CENTER

The building houses the four departments of the College of Engineering and the department of mathmatics and biology, the Institute of Polymer Science, also houses the Science and Engineering library. The ground floors of the new structure are devoted to vehicular parking for faculty and students.



GARDNER CENTER

Gardner Center houses bowling alleys, music rooms, TV lounge, student activity offices and work rooms, game and billiard room, bookstore. Alumni Office, Senior Placement Bureau, and cafeteria and dining facilities.




KNIGHT HALL

Knight Hall provides classrooms, laboratories and office space for the chemistry department. It is named for C. M. Knight, head of the first Science Department and developer of the world's first rubber chemistry course.



AYER HALL

Located on the northwest side of the campus, provides classrooms and office space for the history, physics, political science and socialogy departments. It is named for the first Dean of the College of Engineering, Frederick E. Ayer, the developer of The University of Akron cooperative work study plan.



PARKE R. KOLBE HALL

Kolbe Hall includes classrooms and offices of the Buchtel College of Liberal Arts, the University Theatre, WAUP-FM radio station, and instructional television studios, as well as the English, speech and geography-geology departments. It is named for the first president of the municipal University.



SCHRANK HALL

Schrank Hall is the newest structure on campus and is headquarters for the Community and Technical College, the ROTC and AFROTC units and the departments of Art and Home Economics.



SIMMONS HALL

This structure contains offices and classrooms of the department of Psychology plus the University's Computer Center. It is named for the former University President, Hezzleton E. Simmons.



MEMORIAL HALL

Memorial Hall is the center of men's and women's physical education activities. It contains two large gymnasiums, a swimming pool, classrooms and offices of the Athletic Department faculty. It is dedicated to the memory of Summit County men and women who died in World War II.



EDUCATION BUILDING

The structure provides a lecture room that seats 260, 19 general classrooms, a handicrafts room, an auxiliary closed circut television studio, a complete language laboratory, a teaching demonstration classroom and is headquarters for the Dean of the College of Education.
