GENERAL INFORMATION

In 1871 Father Edward Sorin, Superior General of the Congregation of Holy Cross, chose Austin, Texas, as the site of a new college. To further this project, he purchased 120 acres of land south of Austin, which commanded a hilltop view over the city and of the countryside to the south. Three years later, a farm, consisting of 400 acres, was donated to the congregation.

St. Edward's College was formally organized and received a charter from the States legislature in 1885. In 1925 a new charter was drawn which changed the title of the college to St. Edward's University.

The years from 1946 to the present were years of growth and development in all areas of campus activity. A few of the significant changes which took place during these years include the accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools in 1958, the constant expansion and strengthening of the curriculum, increases in the number and quality of the faculty and staff, an arrangement with the Order of Preachers which brought the Dominican priests to the St. Edward's faculty, the construction of ten major buildings on the campus since 1950, the addition of a computer center in 1963, the arrangement with the congregation, Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, who established Maryhill College on the campus and made St. Edward's University a coordinate institution until the amalgamation as one coeducational university in February 1970.

CAMPUS LIFE

Academic Program

St. Edward's University provides an integrated program in liberal arts, along with training in Humanities, Social Sciences, Fine and Performing Arts, Behavioral Sciences, Physical and Biological Sciences, Business Administration, and Teacher Education. The faculty consists of Holy Cross Brothers, Immaculate Heart of Mary Sisters, Dominican Priests, laymen and women.

St. Edward's University is accredited by the Association of Texas Colleges and Universities, Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, and Texas Education Agency.

Library

The library, designed to support the University's program of teaching and scholarship, contains approximately 50,000

volumes. In addition to books allied to the various courses of study, the library contains a basic reference collection of bibliographies, encyclopedias, handbooks, and dictionaries, over 500 periodicals, and a selection of books for recreation and general intellectual stimulation. An open stack policy is designed to encourage students use of the resources.

Curriculum Materials Center

The Curriculum Materials Center, located in Moody Hall, is viewed as one of the most important elements in the preparation of elementary and secondary teachers. The Center houses a textbook collection, curriculum guides from representative school systems across the country and audiovisual machines and materials employed by the teacher education program. An adjoining workroom provides the facilities necessary for students to make their own instructional materials. Although open for the use of all students, the center is particularly well employed by students during their methods courses and student teaching experience.

Closed Circuit Television

Beginning with the Spring Semester, 1961, St. Edward's became one of 11 colleges and universities that participate in the Texas Educational Microwave Project, a closed circuit television system. The participating schools all within a 75-mile radius of Austin, share in the teaching experiences of one another. Outstanding professors from the various institutions conduct traditional and specialized cources previously agreed upon by the coordinators from each school.

Participation in this program enables St. Edward's to enhance its cirriculum in certain fields of study, otherwise impossible in a small university. Moody Hall classroom building houses a television studio, furnished with an Ampex Vr-660B Videorecorder and support equipment. The faculty use the studio for on-campus productions and distribution of educational programs, generally related to classroom instruction. In addition, the studio is used by the Center for Teaching and Learning because of its value in the preparation of secondary and elementary teachers.

Computer Center

The Computer Center, located in Moody Hall, provides modern facilities for high-speed data processing and computation. Freshmen in science and pre-engineering and Sophomores in business administration receive instruction in programming and operation of the equipment. Upperclassmen use the center for solution of problems in their advanced cources. Facilities include an IBM digital computer and associated equipment. St. Edward's is one of nine colleges and universities which participate in the Southwest Region Educational Computer Network. This experiment in educational computing makes it possible for St. Edward's to offer Computer Assisted Instruction as a supplement in a variety of courses.

Language Laboratory

One of the facilities which St. Edward's offers to language students is the modern electronic language laboratory. Fifty individual booths which may be grouped together to receive three or more languages at one time from a master broadcasting panel enable students to benefit from aural and oral training in the language they choose. Other than living in the country where a language is spoken, the student can find no better method for gaining oral and written proficiency.

Business Machines Laboratory

Modern business machines, including an electronic calculator, are available to students in the Center for Business Administration for accounting projects and financial reporting.

Art Exhibits Program

The aim of the Art Exhibits Program is to present through painting, sculpture, and graphic art, the historical and cultural significance and aesthetic value of the arts. In order to foster intelligent comprehension of the visual arts, teaching exhibitions and art films as well as public and private collections, are brought to the campus. Students and faculty participate in a variety of programs including three major drama productions, concerts, Reader's Theater, The Campus Capers, and The Spring Festival of the Arts.

Internal Organizations

The St. Edward's University Students' Association, Inc., the Union Program Board, the clubs and various campus organizations-academic, service and social-give students an opportunity to participate in the many facets of campus life.

Athletic Program

St. Edward's University is a member of the Big State Conference and the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics. The University fields intercollegiate teams in basketball, baseball, tennis, golf, track, and cross country.

The intramural program includes tournaments in touch football, softball, basketball, volleyball, tennis, bowling, handball, ping pong, and track.

Publications

In addition to the official bulletins and brochures

published by the University, there are three student-edited publications on the campus.

(1) The Hilltopper: The student newspaper, a tabloid

type weekly, is distributed to students free of charge. A staff of about 20 students works on this publication. It is devoted to general news concerning campus life and provides excellent experience for students interested in journalism.

(2) <u>Writing</u>: A literary magazine published each spring,

<u>Writing</u> provides an outlook for the poetry, prose, and creative art work of the student body. Materials are accepted from all students in St. Edward's.

(3) <u>The Tower</u>: The yearbook presents a comprehensive coverage of campus life through the year. It is

published in late spring.

Counseling Program

The multiphase counseling program has been organized to stimulate and direct the student in his efforts to discover, release and develop talents to the fullest.

The Office of Counseling lists these particular objectives, (1) to help the student better understand and accept himself and others, (2) to aid the student in becoming more sensitive to present cultural changes and their implications, (3) to help the student make better informed and more realistic educational and vocational decisions, (4) to increase the student's freedom, spontaneity, and flesible strength, and (5) to accept and encourage diversity of talents at the University.

St. Edward's sees counseling as the work of all departments. The entire academic faculty, the psychiatrist, the residence hall staff, the Director of Placement, the Director of Counseling, Health Center Staff, and the University Chaplain all team together with this one objective: to be of service to all the students in their growth process.

Graduate Scholarship Committee

This committee identifies and assists qualified students applying for the Fulbright, Woodrow Wilson, N.D.E.A., N.S.F., Rhodes and similar graduate opportunities. Information and guidance is given to all students concerning the mechanics of application for graduate school assistance of any kind.

PURPOSES AND GOALS

During the four years that a student spends at St. Edward's University, he has the opportunity to pursue studies in one area of concentration. It is believed that one must know particular truths before he can love truth in the abstract. It is important to gain the self-confidence which results from competence gained by in-depth study of a particular area. Moreover, the real world is a doing world. Competence in a specific subject is a realistic preparation and safeguard for study in graduate school and/or future jobs.

The student is also encouraged to explore fields which interest him outside this area of concentration, but the responsibility is his. Other than the requirements imposed by his choice of concentration and the integrative requirements discussed below, there are no constraints on what he must or may study. The expectation is that he will take advantage of the opportunity to satisfy his curiosity about all manner of topics and mold his four years to meet his particular needs and aspirations.

An education which is geared to making the student more fully human adds up to different things. It is not necessarily achieved through the requirements of a prescribed series of courses in a prescribed sequence. Rather, meaningful education is essentially a point of view.

Initially, the student's exploration may be based upon some illusory concept of relevance or perhaps on personal whim. In ultimately accepting the responsibility for educating oneself, however, a student's four years should prepare him to asume his place in an increasingly complex world. The student will probably make some mistakes and errors of judgment. However, the process of making mistakes may ultimately be the best education of all.

Learning the way things fall together, seeing the relationships among and between the various disciplines and being able to relate the various modes of knowing does not occur automatically. During the student's four years at St. Edward's University, he has at least four opportunities to experience this relationship in a variety of seminars designed for this purpose. Exploring the varieties of human experience without knowing their interrelations makes no sense.

It is also believed that the student should come to realize that his education is not for him alone. It is true that he must develop his capacity to earn a living and make wiser use of his leisure time, but he also should aim higher than a good job and a good life for himself alone. He is, therefore, aspired to accept one of the many critical missions facing our society.

This sense of vocation takes different forms for different students. Some will want to enter a program which prepares candidates for the service professions such as teaching and social work. Others may believe that the novelist working in his soundproof room or the biologist in his laboratory can do just as much to alleviate human problems. Through the interdisciplinary aspect, the student may want to select one or several specific seminars in his area of concentration. Some of these seminars are specifically geared to investigate these critical missions.

The distinguished American educator, Robert Hutchins, writes, "We believe that the most practical education is the most theoretical one. The mind is not a receptacle; information is not education. Education is what remains after the information that has been taught has been forgotten (or outmoded). Ideas, methods, habits of mind are the radioactive deposits left by education." An introduction to the modes of knowing, of ways to look at things, will equip the student with the most important skill of all: the ability to know the world and hence the ability to solve its problems and meet its challenges.

LOOK AT THE FUTURE

Since 1950, the growth of St. Edward's University has been concentrated on physical development. Construction has continued to the present new art and drama building. Striving to avail better education to the student, the curriculum of study holds the emphasis for the future. At present 50 per cent of the faculty hold doctorate degrees. The student - faculty ratio has been placed at 15 - 1. A master degree program in business administration has been initiated. Although the 1,200 students classify St. Edward's University as a small college, the determination to award the student sound education gives it country-wide recognition.



ADMINISTRATION BUILDING

The Administration Building, formally known as the Main Building, was constructed in 1888. It was destroyed by fire in 1903. During the reconstruction a water tower was added. Later the water tank was removed and the tower became the symbol of St. Edward's University.



CAMPUS CENTER

The Campus Center, formally known as Holy Cross Hall, was constructed in 1903. In 1922 it was destroyed by a tornado. It was the original student dormitory. Today, it serves as an activity and office building.



MOODY HALL

Built in 1966, the classroom building is dedicated to the memory of Libbie S. Moody. In addition to Humanities, Social Sciences, Behavioral Sciences, Teacher Education, and Fine and Performing Arts, it is the Center of Business Administration. It is also the home of the Computer Center, Business Machine Laboratory, and Academic Library.



FLECK HALL

The science building was in 1958 dedicated to Brother Raymond Fleck, then the President of St. Edward's University



THEATER

The art and drama building had its first stage production on December 6, 1971. Its permanent seating area accommodates 350 viewers.



LIBRARY

Built in 1954, the library contains approximately 50,000 volumes. Originally the second floor located administrative offices. Today, it houses the University archives.



ALUMNI MEMORIAL GYMNASIUM

Built in 1950, this gym, besides being the home of the St. Edward's University Hilltoppers, is the classroom for physical education.



PREMONT HALL

This 2,900 square feet three story men's residence has a 150-student capacity. It was built in 1964 in memory of Mrs. Mary Premont who was the benefactress of a South Texas ranch for Catholic education.



DOYLE HALL

In 1960 construction was completed on this 150 capacity men's residence. It is dedicated to Mrs. Mary Doyle who in 1872 donated her 400-acre farm which now comprises St. Edward's University Campus.



ANDRE HALL

Constructed in 1957, this dormitory houses 100 male students. It is dedicated to Brother Andre Besettee who brought the Congregation of Holy Cross to Montreal, Canada.



ALICE K. EAST HALL

Constructed in 1966, this women's dormitory is dedicated to Alice K. East, benefactress. It has a 150-student capacity.



TERESA MCGIVNEY HALL


Teresa Hall, a 150-women's residence, was dedicated to Mother Teresa McGivney, the late Superior General of the Sister Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary Congregation.



DINING HALL

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Built in 1962, this dining hall serves 400 students at one time and feeds 600 per hour. Besides the student cafeteria, there are two guest dining rooms and two faculty dining rooms.



OUR LADY OF VICTORY CHAPEL

Constructed in 1920, this wooden building remains the seat of campus religious worship.

CENTER OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION ST. EDWARD'S UNIVERSITY AUSTIN, TEXAS

CENTER FOR BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

The courses of study at the Center for Business Administration are set up in keeping with the general aims and objectives of the University by primary devotion to the cultivation of moral and intellectual virtues indicative of an educated Christian gentleman. The program provides exploration and integration of disciplines within and outside the field of business. The Director of the Center. Dr. Leo B. Osterhaus, is currently assisted by seventeen instructors who providea concentration in business education in the specific areas of accounting, general business, finance, management, administrative services, and marketing. In addition to the full-time day schedules, the Center provides an evening program which provides a degree study plan especially foe part-time students in the Austin area and for persons who wish to enrich their knowledge in specific business disciplines.

Accounting Major

The Accounting Major provides courses to prepare students for careers in the field of public, private, and government accounting. Courses provide training for candidates toward a Certified Public Accountant Certificate. Degre requirements are twenty-one hours of advanced accounting.

Administrative Services Major

An Administrative Services Major prepares the student in competency and efficiency in modern office techniques and managerial training for executive positions. Twenty hours are required for this major.

Management Major

Management Major is designed to give a background of liberal arts and business courses with emphasis in organizational theory, personnel and industrial management, collective bargaining, and advanced problems in management. The student is required to take twelve hours of advanced management.

Marketing Major

The Marketing Major requires twelve hours of advanced marketing courses and provides a background of liberal art and business with concentration in promotional policies, marketing research, international marketing, Latin American trade policies, and advanced problems in marketing.

General Business Major

General Business Major provides a background of liberal arts and business without a major concentration field in business. Twelve hours in advanced business are required.

Finance Major

Finance Major requires twelve hours in advanced finance courses consisting of investment, insurance, real estate, money and banking, and advanced finance problems.

Pre-Law Program

A Pre-Law Program is also provided which allows the student to take courses which will be of special help in future law study while concentrating in business as a major.









On September 8, 1971, Dr. R. K. Khadhiri, Associate Professor of Business Administration, sought the interest of several students to form an organization whereby the academic and social environment at St. Edward's University would be more closely related to the business world to which they aspired. The idea of a business fraternity was discussed and it was realized that such an organization would not only bring the business students together but would be a practical experience for the years after graduation. Since Dr. Khadhiri is an active member of Delta Sigma Pi, he explained some of the features of such a fraternity.

A meeting was scheduled for September 10, 1971 for those interested. Dr. Khadhiri further explained and answered questions concerning Delta Sigma Pi. The nine business majors that met on that day decided to stimulate interest among their collegues in effort to establish a Delta Sigma Pi chapter on St. Edward's University Campus. Letters, announcing that four informative meetings would be held whereby Dr. Khadhiri would discuss and answer questions concerning Delta Sigma Pi, were sent to all business students.

Sixty-eight students met over the four days. Of fiftyeight along with five faculty and two student advisors formed a colony and decided to petition Delta Sigma Pi for a charter. The following week Sigma Eta Tau met. The following officers were appointed:

Since the formal meeting, the colony has sponsored a dance and a dinner at which State Representative Maurice Angly was the guest speaker. On another Occasion, Bill Griebel from the Mental Retardation Counseling Center in Austin, Texas was the speaker. In addition, By-Laws were drawn, and functional committees and their chairmen were selected. Also, a list of events and activities were scheduled and approved by the membership.


EDWIN O. RINEHART, JR. Advisor




