


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HISTORY OF HILO, HAWAII

Hilo is located on the Big Island, and it is the second largest urban center in Hawaii.

If we stop for a moment, look back a little over a hundred years ago, we would see a huge steamship entering Hilo Bay. The ship is approached by numerous canoes, surfers, and swimmers to greet the passengers with flower leis, kisses, and hugs to show the Aloha spirit. As the steamship finally comes to a stop, passengers from all parts of the world are joined together. Chinese, Japanese, Portuguese, Filipinos, native Hawaiians, and Americans are carrying their belongings and culture.

Hilo is a beautiful place filled with the colors of the rainbow with its tropical flowers and plants. For example, roses, fuchias, begonias, lilies, plumeria, hibiscus, and orchids are some of the beautiful flowers that exist. Also, there are varieties of apples, mangoes, bananas, papayas, avocadoes, breadfruit, macadamia nuts, and eucalyptus.

Our small Pacific town retains its Aloha spirit and its relaxing atmosphere of one big ohana (family). Besides the scenic wonders and warmth Hilo has to offer, other important events took place that affected Hilo.


In 1859, Haili Church was built by the early missionaries. Also, sugar became the chief crop of Hilo as well as Hawaii itself. This event brought Chinese, Japanese, Filipinos, and Portuguese to Hawaii as well as Hilo to work on the sugar plantation mills and eventually settle down to raise a family.

Other events are the 1946 and 1960 tsunamis (tidal waves) that destroyed the coastline communities of Hilo Bay. The greatest event that constantly provides us with excitement and sense of destruction is our volcano eruption. Millions of cubic tons of lava are shot into the air, and gigantic flows of red hot lava light up the sky into a bright orange color.

The real Hilo is shown through its small shops and young artists who create Hawaiian bowls, lauhala hats, mats, and oil paintings. Also, Suisan Fish Market is a place where fishermen auction their ahi (tuna), mahimahi and other catch to restaurant owners, supermarkets, and local people. Nearby is Liliuokalani Park, named for Hawaii's last queen, and it consists of thirty acres of an authentic Japanese formal garden. Religious groups in Hilo express their spirit by festivals, prayer, song, and dance. The majority of religious organizations are Buddhist, Christian, and Catholics throughout Hilo.

Every April, a great dance is held in Hilo in honor of King David Kalakaua, who preserved the native hula. Dozens of Hawaiian dance schools (hula halaus) throughout the State, mainland U.S., and Pacific region (including Japan) compete with one another. This event is to preserve the ancient hula and revive the pride and respect of this native hula dance. The Merrie Monarch Festival has become the world's greatest hula dance competition.



THE BIG ISLAND OF HAWAII: A PARADISE IN THE PACIFIC


The Big Island is also a place of diverse cultures where a tourist feels right at home among Hawaii's friendly people and customs.




Lava from Kilauea Volcano meets the sea at Kupaahu, not far from Kalapana Black Sand Beach. Lava is still entering the sea today.






Rainbow Falls near Hilo, Hawaii is the home of the mythical goddess Hina. A rainbow is usually visible in the early morning.

Wild bamboo, ferns, and ginger blossoms are found along this stream in Akaka Falls State Park, about 12 miles from Hilo, Hawaii.






13,796 Foot, Snowcapped Mauna Kea, Hawaii

Mauna Kea, meaning "white mountain" in Hawaiian, is the tallest mountain peak from below sea level in the world. It is the site of University of Hawaii's Institute of Astronomy and the world's largest telescope. The mountaintop lies above 40% of the earth's atmosphere making it world recognized for astronomical observation. There is even skiing! Mauna Loa, an active volcano, is in the background.



Parker Ranch on the northern coast of the island of Hawaii is the largest ranch in the United States under single ownership. It covers approximately 200,000 acres.

Statue of King Kamehameha the Great at Kohala marks the birthplace of the King who united the Hawaiian islands.


On the Kohala coast is the Pu'ukohala Heiau (religious temple) built by King Kamehameha.




Hapuna Beach on the Kohala coast of the Big Island is the site of a beautiful and popular park run by the State of Hawaii.



HISTORY OF UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII AT HILO

The University of Hawaii at Hilo, organized in 1970, is a part of Hawaii's nine campus system of higher education. Located in Hilo, with a branch in Kailua-Kona, it uniquely incorporates the two-year Hawaii Community College with a four-year College of Arts and Sciences, a four-year College of Agriculture, and an expanding Center for Continuing Education and Community Service. In fall 1987 the University of Hawaii at Hilo enrolled 3,500 students.

The University of Hawaii at Hilo is situated on the island of Hawaii, the largest in the Hawaiian Archipelago. With an area of 4,060 square miles, it has more land than all the other Hawaiian islands combined. With its great variety of physical features, including peaks that are snowcapped in winter, pasture lands, canefields, active volcanoes, and rain-swept valleys, the "Big Island" of Hawaii has been described as a tropical mini-continent. Hawaii is an island surrounded by the Pacific ocean almost 2,500 miles from the mainland U.S.A. Its marine environment, geological diversity and cultural richness are considered educational resources by the faculty and administration.

UHH is located in the city of Hilo (pop. 44,000), on the "Big Island" of Hawaii. Hilo is 35 minutes by air from Honolulu, the state capitol. There is a UHH satellite facility in Kealakekua, Kona (West Hawaii).



THE BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION PROGRAM AT THE UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII AT HILO

Begun in 1982, the purpose of the Business Program at the University of Hawaii at Hilo (UHH) is to provide students with a basic educational background either for careers in business, government, or service organizations or for graduate study.

Before entering UHH, students are advised to complete two years of algebra, trigonometry, courses in speech/communication, and English courses emphasizing writing.

During the first two years at UHH, students are considered Pre-Business students. They complete General Education Requirements for a broad arts and sciences background and a core of classes to prepare them for the professional business program.

The upper division professional business program includes courses in functional areas of business such as accounting, finance, management, marketing, and quantitative methods.

In addition, students complete electives, both emphasizing the uniqueness of an island economy or one applicable to mainland or foreign business. Bachelor of Business Adminstration students may also pursue academic minors.

HISTORY OF ALPHA THETA KAPPA COLONY

On June 11, 1987, five business students from the University of Hawaii at Hilo met at the Waiakea McDonalds in Hilo, Hawaii to form a colony of Delta Sigma Pi. They met on King Kamehameha Day which is symbolic because King Kamehameha united the Hawaiian Islands. Similarly, the students met to unify themselves as a colony. These students were Jeffery Alleman, Mark Araujo, Harold Kamei, Pedro Lizardi, and Joy Suzuki. At their July 1, 1987 meeting, Mark Araujo suggested the name Alpha Theta Kappa (A0K) which was adopted to mean A O.K.!

The students met during the summer. They held their first professional tour at Snappy's Pizza in Hilo in November, 1987. In December, they helped with the Wishing Tree to provide Christmas presents for needy children. They held two car washes in January, 1988 and raised funds for the March of Dimes. On February 5 and 6, they held a two day food booth at the Hilo Mardis Gras.

The group was well on its way with speakers at their February and March meetings, a picnic, a softball game with the Lehua Jaycees in April, two car washes in May, and a weekend in Kailua-Kona on June 10, 1988 to celebrate the one year anniversary of the colony.

On July 27, 1988, the colony established its newsletter entitled Keiki O' Ka Aina meaning "Children of the Land."

In the Fall of 1988, the students held one of their most successful recruiting drives during class registration. The program of speakers was continued, the fifth car wash held, a \$500.00 scholarship awarded to a colony member, candy sales, and purchase of colony shirts. The membership grew to about forty members, who are excited and enthusiastic about becoming a Chapter of Delta Sigma Pi.
