

THE HISTORY OF FAIRFAX CITY

The City of Fairfax was first settled in the mid-1700's by farmers pushing out from the Tidewater region of Virginia and by Marylanders crossing the Potomac into Virginia. Today, the City of Fairfax is an official Historic District named by the National Register of Historic Places. Visitors can step into the past by walking leisurely along the City's historic trails, exploring historic buildings and landmarks, or shopping and dining in the restored Historic District.

LOCATION

The City of Fairfax is located approximately twenty miles west of Washington, D.C., in the center of Northern Virginia. Since the early 1800's, the City's central location has contributed to its role as a desirable suburban community as well as a thriving governmental and business center.

GOVERNMENT

The City of Fairfax's government consists of a Mayor and a City Council. The current Mayor is John Mason, and six members sit on the City Council.

CHURCHES

Thirteen different churches are located in the City of Fairfax. The main denominations include Presbyterian, Lutheran, Catholic, Methodist, Episcopalian, and Baptist.

HEALTH FACILITIES


The City of Fairfax has an agreement with Fairfax County to use the Fairfax County health facilities. Three major health facilities are located in Fairfax City including an emergency hospital.


PARKS AND RECREATION

On-going community programs and special events throughout the year offer a rich diversity of cultural and recreational activities for residents and visitors. One can choose from fourteen different parks which all have a variety of activities to choose from, including (indoor and outdoor) basketball, tennis, and volleyball courts; picnic and playgrounds; football, baseball, softball, and soccer fields; and trails for biking, hiking, and jogging.

REVENUES

The City of Fairfax receives its main revenues through general property taxes, local taxes, licenses, permits, and fees.





The History of George Mason University

George Mason University's reputation as a competitive educational leader has emerged from a well established tradition of commitment and aspiration. The university had its origin as the Northern Virginia branch of the University of Virginia, named University College. The small institution opened in a renovated elementary school in 1957, with an enrollment of a meager 17 students. The following year, the enthusiastic town (now city) of Fairfax offered their support by purchasing 150 acres of land and donating it to the University of Virginia. As a result of this interest, the University of Virginia Board of Visitors renamed the institution George Mason College to confirm its identity and recognition to the college as a permanent establishment for higher learning.

These events set the stage for an ambitious climb toward continued growth and further interest in education. In 1964, the first campus buildings were constructed. Four unnamed buildings simply identified as the North, West, South and East buildings welcomed 356 students to the up and coming college. In March of 1966, the General Assembly authorized the expansion of George Mason College, allowing it to offer four year degrees as well as granting the college a long range mandate to expand into a regional university. Graduate programs were established by September of 1970, as George Mason expanded physically by acquiring an additional 422 acres and later reaching a total of 583 acres. This led to the construction of the arts and science building in 1971, later named Thompson Hall, and the ground-work for the first student union building in 1972.

With the college's rapid growth and the surrounding community's support and enthusiasm, the University of Virginia Board of Visitors recommended that the college separate from its parent institution. George Mason's goal was realized on April 7, 1972, when the Governor signed the General Assembly legislation that established George Mason University as a separate and independent entity.

Since 1972, the university has developed rapidly, increasing enrollment from 4,166 to 20,308. In 1974, the first tower of the library was opened for public use. In 1975, Robinson Hall was dedicated to Clarence Johnston Robinson. On July 1977, the School of Business Administration was created.

The change in presidency from Dr. Robert C. Krug to Dr. George W. Johnson, in 1978, marked further progression toward becoming a larger scale institution. In the year 1980, Robinson II was completed and the Departments of Economics, Sociology, Philosophy and Religion were established. August of 1980 marked the Accreditation of George Mason University School of Law. Also, the first doctoral programs were offered: a Doctor of Public Administration and a Doctor of Arts in Education. The following year brought the completion of Student Union II, including a dining hall to accommodate the growing number of on-campus students, which had steadily increased to a current 3,000 students. In addition, a George Mason Satellite Campus in Arlington provided off-campus graduate courses for the first time.

September of 1982, brought three more doctoral programs and six graduate degrees, furthering George Mason University's broad ranged curriculum. George Mason took innovative steps in improving education by adopting the PAGE Program (Plan for Alternative General Education) in 1983. In 1984, five departments were established within the School of Business Administration. Also, in 1984, the Robinson Professors, a group of outstanding scholars distinguished by their commitment to undergraduate teaching, joined the faculty. One year later, the Board of Visitors approved the introduction of two new schools, the School of Nursing and the School of Information Technology and Engineering. In 1989, the American Assembly of Collegiate School of Business accredited the George Mason School of Business Administration.

As George Mason established itself in the academic community as a university with a variety of majors and an elite, prestigious faculty, the University achieved national distinction in many areas. On December 20, 1986, George Mason University professor James Buchanan received the Nobel Memorial Prize for Economic Science.

The Arts Center was established in the late 1980's and phase I of the project was completed in 1987. On October 6, 1990, the new Concert Hall was built, attracting orchestral dance and other forms of entertainment to the Fairfax community.




Fall 1991 Enrollment Statistics for George Mason University



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
Fenwick Library

Fenwick Library was named after Charles Rogers Fenwick, a delegate to the Virginia General Assembly from Arlington, on December 15, 1967. It contains over 400,000 volumes, subscribes to over 4000 periodicals and receives 14,000 new volumes each year. It is the tallest building on campus and serves for an excellent study lounge.




Humanities Complex

The Humanities Complex is the largest academic complex in Virginia consisting of Mason Hall, College Hall, Humanities I, Humanities II and the Performing Arts Center. Mason Hall accommodates the majority of our administration staff while College Hall includes offices for the fine arts faculty. Humanities I and Humanities II are mainly for art, music, theatre and dance classrooms. The most impressive of the buildings, the Center for Performing Arts, includes art galleries and courtyards for sculpture exhibits. The Concert Hall built, in early 1990, seats 2,000 and is equivalent to the Kennedy Center in quality of programs.



Krug Hall

Dedicated on November 11, 1964, Krug Hall is one of the four original buildings on George Mason's main campus. It is located in the center of campus and houses the offices of Student Records, Registrar, Cashier, and Extended Studies.



Patriot's Center

The Patriot's Center, a 16 million dollar investment, is the only sports and entertainment arena of its kind in Northern Virginia. It hosts the McDonald's World Cup Gymnastics Championships yearly and is the home court for George Mason's basketball team. The facility seats 10,000 people and the majority of the employees are George Mason University students.



Robinson Hall

Robinson Hall, dedicated on September 24, 1975, was named for Clarence Johnston Robinson, Chairman of George Mason College (now George Mason University) Advisory Board. The building houses the Schools of Business and Nursing, Graduate School of Education, the Economics Department, along with, classrooms, faculty offices and a tutorial center.



Science and Technology Building II

Science and Technology Building II, completed in the spring of 1991, offers many advantages to the students at George Mason University. Being our newest building, it has the highest technological computer systems and engineering equipment available on campus. This building features several computer science, physics and chemistry labs.




Student Union I

Student Union I was built in 1971. It serves as the center for student life and includes the George mason Bank, a game room, meeting rooms, the offices of Student Union Administration and the Dean of Student Services.



Student Union II

Student Union II, built in 1981, provides George Mason students with cozy study lounges and rooms for organizations to hold meetings. There is a spectacular dining hall to accomodate the residents as well as marketplace which features Pizza Hut pizza. Renovation of the building began in the spring of 1991 and was completed during the summer for the George Mason students to enjoy the expansion to the bookstore, the additional room in the dining hall and the newest place to eat on campus featuring Taco Bell.



The History of the School of Business Administration

The first undergraduate work in business administration was offered in the Department of Social Sciences in 1966. The school had recently established itself as a four year institution. In 1968, the first undergraduate degrees were conferred. The growing student interest in business justified creating the Department of Business Administration in 1971.


April 7, 1972 marked the expansion of George Mason College. Virginia General Assembly enacted legislation which separates George Mason from its parent institution, University of Virginia. The school was changed to George Mason University. Following George Mason's independence, the first M.B.A. program was started and degrees were rewarded in June 1974.

The School of Business Administration was officially established on July 1, 1977. By the fall of 1980, undergraduate degrees with five new undergraduate majors were offered. The majors included Accounting, Decision Sciences, Finance, Management and Marketing, each of them establishing their own department by 1984. In 1989, the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business accredited the George Mason School of Business Administration.

Currently, the George Mason School of Business Administration, has maintained a strong precedent for high Academic standards. It has established the highest undergraduate admission requirements of any business school in Virginia and has expanded the faculty to seventy three outstanding professors. Further growth and achievements of the School of Business Administration contribute to George Mason's reputation as a competitive and respected institution.

Description of Majors Offered in the School of Business Administration of George Mason University

I. <u>Accounting</u>:

teaches the student the theories of managing and organizing the financial records of public, private and governmental institutions.

II. Business Administration/General Business:

provides an opportunity to acquire skills in all areas of business. The curriculum involves exposure to concepts in accounting, decision sciences/management information systems, finance, management and marketing.

III. Decision Sciences/Management Information Systems:

offers the student various courses that focus on the concepts of mathematical modeling, computer-based information systems and statistical analysis.

IV. <u>Finance</u>:


offers courses designed to teach students the different strategies used in money management and their current applications in a business environment.

V. <u>Management</u>:

attempts to teach the skills involved in controlling and directing the various operations of an institution.

VI. <u>Marketing</u>:

offers courses that teach the student the processes involved in the buying and selling of goods and services.



The History of Gamma Mu Upsilon

Kathy Carlstrom, a student at George Mason University, introduced us to Delta Sigma Pi at informational meetings called on October 2 and 3, 1991. Brothers of the Iota Kappa chapter at James Madison University explained how we, as a group, and as individuals, could benefit from being affiliated with Delta Sigma Pi.

Our first business meeting was held on October 10, for all interested business majors. Twenty seven people were in attendance along with Carl Quitmeyer (our colony advisor). During the meeting, officers were formally elected with help from an Iota Kappa chapter representative, Todd Perry. The name Gamma Mu Upsilon was chosen as our colony name for Delta Sigma Pi at George Mason University.

Business meetings were held in the weeks that followed where any interested business students could join. Throughout the semester, Gamma Mu Upsilon held various professional and social activities, fund raisers and community services.

Our first social activity, a bar-b-que, was held on October 11, to recruit new members for the colony and get to know one another. We spent the next weekend at James Madison University establishing new friendships with the brothers of the Iota Kappa chapter through fun-filled activities.

Halloween night brought out the ghosts and goblins. Gamma Mu Upsilon colony along with forty other George Mason University organizations participated in our first community service project: Witch Watch. We patrolled the streets in a Fairfax neighborhood making sure all the children were safe from witches on broomsticks.

On November 11, we celebrated Founder's Day from sumup to sundown, dressed in professional attire. The true beauty of the colony shinned forth on this day.

We had our first speaker, Tim Stone, from the Ronkin Educational Group on November 12. He administered practice GMAT exams to prepare us for graduate school. We plan to continue this event in years to come to benefit the upcoming seniors.

Our second community service project was held November 16, at the ACCESS Retirement Home. We helped run a bazaar to raise money for the home. That evening we held a Founder's Day Celebration in order to get to know one another on a personal basis. We went to the Capital Center on November 22, to watch the Washington Capitals crush the Boston Bruins.

A panel discussion was held in early December with four Delta Sigma Pi alumni from James Madison University. They shared what this business fraternity had done for them throughout their college career and what it has offered them since graduation.

A week later, we concluded with our last business meeting of the semester. Secret Santa's were finally revealed after a month of anticipation. Gamma Mu Upsilon members got into the holiday spirit by bringing non-perishable items for the needy.

After a week of torturous exams we attended a holiday banquet to celebrate months of hard work and to enjoy the newly found friendships through Delta Sigma Pi. Carl Quitmeyer enhanced our evening with a valuable speech.

The social activities continued throughout winter break as members met to go bowling and ice skating. We were all eagerly awaiting our pledging activities for the forthcoming semester.
