As our Purpose states, we will "further a higher standard." We will continue to educate our members about the effects of their behaviors, and how it impacts themselves, fellow brothers, our organization and their campus. We will continue evaluating our terminology to determine if the messages we are sending students are beneficial. And we will work with members quickly when issues arise, knowing the quicker they are addressed, the greater the possibility it will have a lasting positive experience for our members and those with which they interact.



# **Meet Brother Pelto at the Farmers**



"I loved the passion and energy of the authors and how each one wanted to tell the story of how they changed the world, how the world changed them, or how they invented their own world," says Pelto. or Lisa Pelto, *Lincoln/ Greater Nebraska*, books have always been a part of her life. From growing up with a book in her hands 24/7, to enjoying reading with her mother, to recently publishing her very own children's book, *Meet Me at the Farmers Market*, she has always had a passion for stories and imagination.

President of Concierge Marketing, Inc., Lisa knows a thing or two about publishing books. After spending 15 years in corporate and non-

profit publishing, she began freelance work on the side with clients who wanted to become independent publishers. And soon after... the world changed for Lisa too. "In 2004, one of my clients proposed I make a full-time go of it and said she would be my first official customer. I decided to do some research to see if it could be a reality," says Lisa. "Then I took the leap and opened my publishing business with the support of my husband and business partner, Eric. I thought most of my clients would probably come from


outside of my local area, but 70 percent are from Nebraska and 30 percent are from around the world."

Since then, life has remained busy for Lisa. Each day, it's her job to solve the following questions:

- ▲ Would private publishing be right for this client? Are the client or publisher equipped to handle national marketing and distributing and can they support it with time and money (in that order?)
- ▲ Is there a wide market (or tiny niche) for the book? Can the buyers in that niche be identified and marketed to?

She also provides a complete menu of services for authors, from coming up with a concept or book idea, to querying traditional publishers. She also helps clients set up and run their own publishing houses, if that's their goal. Lisa's clients consist of writers, editors, artists, illustrators, book designers, proofers, industry compliance specialists, distribution and sales experts, online marketing professionals and marketing publicity experts. author and a book – we do it," she says.

After many years helping others with their books, Pelto decided it was finally time to write one of her own. "In my case, I am around books and authors all of the time," she says. "I wrote this book in response to kids visiting my booth at the Farmers Markets where I sell other authors' books. I thought, 'Why don't I do this?' I decided to use the methods that I teach in my class at the local community college and sat down the day I thought of the premise." The rest, as they say, was history, and *Meet Me at the Farmers Market* was born. To really make sure she thought of everything, Lisa contacted teachers from all parts of the country to review the manuscript and make sure the words were appropriate for the three to seven year old range and nothing was too geographically specific. "While I wrote the book in three hours," she explains, "the editing process was three times that."

One of her favorite parts about the book writing process was working with an illustrator to bring the magic to life. "I love watercolor and the fluid-

ity it creates," she explains. "I had worked with Paula S. Wallace on many other books and found she was an absolute joy. She is very intuitive. My goal was to give her a loose idea of what I envisioned for each two-page spread and let her be an artist."



# Hawaii-Hilo Brother Sends 75,000 Children's Books

The Micronesian Island of Kosrae, affectionately known as "the island of the sleeping lady," was even more affectionately known as "home" to Elina Fred, *Hawaii-Hilo*. Kosrae is known for its steep mountains, picturesque beaches and plentiful diving opportunities, but for Elina, whose friends call her Fred, her love for the island goes far beyond its obvious beauty.

"Kosrae is home for me," she says. "It is where I was born and grew up until I left for University of Hawaii at age 17. My native tongue is Kosraean and English is my second language, which I




Brother Elina Fred stands next to a portion of the 75,000 books donated to her cause, abundantly filling the near empty Kosraean elementary schools book shelves.

learned from reading. I read anything I could get my hands on, which meant repeating materials due to lack of resources." Elina explains that the lack of educational resources is ever present within the Kosrae Department of Education, something that propelled her on the service opportunity of a lifetime. "My first-hand experience growing up with limited reading and other materials provided the insight and information as to the needs of these schools," she explains. "Upon my visit last summer, I was approached by several teachers who asked if I could send them books for their

classes. I then visited the seven elementary schools and their libraries and confirmed there is still a tremendous shortage."

Upon returning to Salt Lake City, where Brother Fred currently resides and works as an accountant for a mortgage servicing company, she began spending her weekends collecting

books. "I specifically targeted children's books because I want to help foster a love for reading among the young students. By October 2017, I was able to collect/ purchase several thousand books that I sent directly to the teachers who asked for them." Shortly after her first shipment of books, a bookstore owner responded to her donation requests with more than 75,000 books, filling 20 pallet boxes, each taking up 64 cubic ft. With the help of her best friend in Hawaii, Elina was able to locate a freight forwarder to transport the books from Utah to Kosrae. Much to Fred's excitement the bookstore owner also offered to store the books before they made their journey. Brother Fred is currently operating a GoFundMe campaign to raise money for the large shipping expenses associated with sending 75,000 books overseas. If you are interested in donating to her cause, please visit: gofundme.com/Kosrae-projectlibrary. "My vision for this project is twofold," says Brother Fred. "For the students to enjoy these books and

gain a greater grasp of English as a result, and for others who learn about this project to be inspired to conduct their own projects, at whatever scale, to give back to their people or help others less fortunate." Shortly after the books are delivered toward the end of November, Fred plans to visit Kosrae and see firsthand the impact of the books.

An involved alumni member, attending many Deltasig events, Elina thinks fondly back on the years she's spent in Delta Sigma Pi. "Prior to becoming a brother in 2006, I had little to no experience of a professional nature, much less hold a position of leadership. Through the various social, professional, and community engagements the chapter conducted over the course of my studies, I gained a good deal of experience being a part of a unit of such caliber, upholding the highest standard of professional ethics and conduct, appreciating the distinctions of quality leadership, fostering relationships and building an image of trust and reliability. I am glad to have the support of my brothers on this journey."  $\blacktriangle$ 

## **Brother Brodie Wants** to Help You Get **Published!**

Have you ever wanted to write a book?

Here are a few simple steps to creating your book:

## Step 1: Define the book's purpose.

Think about what you want to write about and what you want to get out of the book. Are you writing the book to accomplish a life-long goal? (Admit it – if so, you already have a title picked out.) Or are you using the book as a foundation for a business platform?

## Step 2: Create an outline.

List ten talking points in your area of expertise. Each talking point will expand into a chapter of your book.

## Step 3: Create your content.

You will notice I mentioned create and not write. Instead of writing your content, you may choose to dictate it. There are mobile apps available (I recommend Rev Voice Recorder) that transcribe the audio for you. Plan on covering each talking point (chapter) per audio session, limiting each to about 10-12 minutes.


## Step 4: Repurpose content.

Repurposing content from seminars, coaching, online programs, blogs, and courses are all great additions to your book. Strive for your book to be at least eight thousand words. It doesn't have to be a long book - most people these days prefer a quick read they can complete in a couple hours.

## Step 5: Build your platform.

In the book, offer additional value like a free guide, checklist, or audiobook in return for the reader's email. You may also offer a free strategy session at the end of the book. This will build your readership and/or client base and is an ideal way to grow your business. Adding one new client alone can cover the investment of getting your book published.







the sight of camera flashes as people take photos and selfies, the smell of local cuisine ready for the tasting. Whether this describes a college football game or Grand Chapter Congress, either way we know the fun is about to begin!

Atlanta, host city for our 52<sup>nd</sup> Grand Chapter Congress, is home to the College Football Hall of Fame, which also happens to be the location of this GCC's Friday night outing! The Hall contains more than 50 interactive exhibits, including a 47-yard football field and a three-story wall displaying football helmets representing over 750 different colleges – how many will we light up with just our group?

The Hall of Fame is a short walk from our host hotel, the Atlanta Marriott Marquis, recently named America's Hotel of

the Year. It is also a football's throw from other Atlanta tourist stops including: Centennial Olympic Park, World of Coca-Cola, Georgia Aquarium, CNN Center, Mercedes-Benz Stadium and much more.

Prior to moving to this entertainment hub in Atlanta in 2014, the Hall was originally located in Kings Mills, Ohio—just 30 miles from Delta Sigma Pi's national headquarters, the Central Office. It stayed in Ohio from 1978 until 1992 when it moved to South Bend, Indiana, until 2012.

The College Football Hall of Fame only recognizes about 0.02% of all college football players and coaches. Of the less than 1,300 inductees in the Hall, we are proud to have at least one brother represented there since 1957!

## **KEN STRONG:** Delta Sigma Pi's Greatest Athlete

The February 1929 DELTASIG describes Ken Strong, *New York*, as "A triple threat player of brilliance, Ken could run the ends, crash off tackle, plunge through any point on the line, pass, receive passes, kick and in addition was an excellent defensive player. According to newspaper dispatches, he established the season's record with almost 2,000 yards gained, and he was the high point scorer with 160 points, no one being really a close second." These accomplishments earned him a spot at the National College Football Hall of Fame, but that was just the beginning of his professional sports career.

Born in West Haven, Connecticut, on August 6,

1906, Strong was an All-State halfback at West Haven High School in both 1923 and 1924 before entering New York University in the fall of 1925. Unusually big for a halfback (6' 1", 205 pounds) in his era, he was used primarily as a blocker for NYU during his sophomore season. The following year, he was the team's top runner, passer, punter and place kicker, while



also excelling on defense. As a baseball player, he started attracting scouts and belted a home run reported at 450 feet in length.

In his senior season of 1928, Strong was NYU team captain, earned All-American honors and led the nation in scoring with 160 points on 22 touchdowns and 28 extra points. In three varsity seasons, Strong scored a total of 285 points and rushed for over 2,000 yards. Founder Alexander Frank Makay provided protection for Ken Strong on the same championship football team.

After graduation, Strong tried professional

baseball first, signing a contract with the Yankees' Hartford Eastern League club and batting .285 with 21 homers. He turned down a pro football contract with the New York Giants, instead signing with the NFL Staten Island Stapletons for the next four seasons before the club folded. Despite playing for a team which won just ten games during his four years, he still





ranked among the NFL's leading scorers the first three seasons and earned AII-NFL first team selection in 1930-31.

Strong also continued his pro baseball career for several more summers, leading the New York-Penn League with 41 homers and hitting .373 in 1930. On June 8 of that year, he hit four consecutive home runs in a game with Wilkes-Barre. He advanced to Class AAA in 1931 but crashed into a fence while chasing a fly ball, causing a severe wrist injury to his throwing arm. A subsequent botched operation made it impossible for him to bend his throwing hand backwards, ending his dream of playing major league baseball.

After the Staten Island Stapletons dropped out of the NFL, Strong joined the New York Giants for the 1933 season, was an All-NFL first team selection again and tied for the league scoring lead with 64 points (six touchdowns, eight extra points and four field goals). He also earned All-NFL first team honors the next season as the Giants won the NFL championship, 30-13, over the previously unbeaten Chicago Bears in what was to become known as the "sneakers" game.

Playing on a frozen field in nine degree weather, the Giants were ineffective on the icy surface and tried to locate basketball sneakers to improve their footing. Down 10-3 at halftime, the Giants' sneakers arrived and Strong was able to engineer a stunning second half comeback, scoring two touchdowns, including a 41 yard run, and two extra points, to go along with a 38 yard first half field goal. His 17 total points established a new NFL playoff scoring record that stood for nearly 30 years.

Following the 1935 season, the Giants wanted Strong to take a pay cut despite his status as one of the NFL's top players. He refused and jumped to the New York Yanks of the new American Football League for the 1936 and 1937 seasons. When the AFL folded, he tried to rejoin the Giants but had to it out the 1938 season. Strong was back with the Giants for the 1939-40 seasons, primarily as a place kicker, then decided to retire. At that time, he had scored more career points (328) than any player in league history.

During World War II, the struggling NFL was trying to continue playing despite manpower problems. Looking for



name players, New York asked Strong to rejoin the club as pro football's first kicking specialist. Playing without shoulder pads, he led the NFL with six field goals in 1944 and spent three more seasons with the Giants as a kicker only, retiring for good at the age of 41. Strong concluded his 12 NFL seasons with 484 career points in 131 regular season contests. No yearly rushing statistics are available for his first three NFL seasons (1929-31) but he did run for 1,228 yards between 1932 and 1935 before going to the AFL.

After retiring from the game, Strong co-authored the 1950 book Football Kicking Techniques with Emil Brodbeck. The book was the first to show step-by-step photos relating to the kicking game. He later put his instructional talents to work for the Giants as a kicking coach from 1962 through 1965. Strong was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1957 and the Pro Hall of Fame in 1967. He passed away on October 5, 1979, but is still remembered today as the Fraternity's greatest athlete. ▲

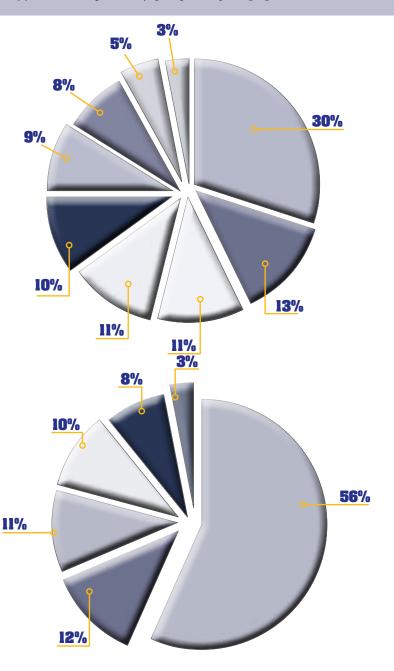

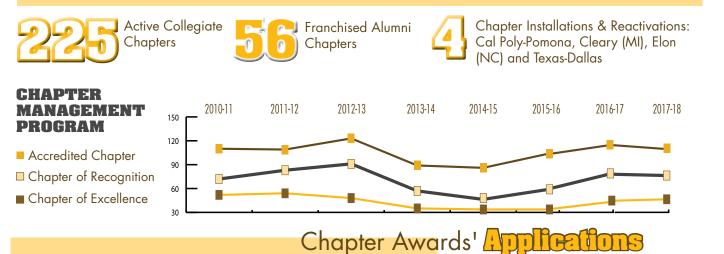



(occurred on 4/27/2018, after many new initiates were reported, but before summer graduates were reported)



## **IRA Charitable Rollover**

The recent tax reform bill is a complex law with many implications. There are some notable tax changes regarding charitable donations that you should be aware of as you make your giving plans. As such, you should visit with your own trusted advisor to determine how your finances or estate plans may be impacted.

In particular, the amount of the standard deduction has increased dramatically, and this will lead some taxpayers to forego itemizing. Whether that's your approach or not, there are some strategies to consider what will help donors make tax-efficient charitable contributions.

Perhaps the best approach for donors 70½ and older is a direct transfer of funds from an IRA commonly called a qualified charitable distribution (QCD) or IRA charitable rollover—to a charity like the Delta Sigma Pi Leadership Foundation. Doing so can lower taxable income by as much as \$100,000 because the QCD will satisfy the required minimum distribution. If you are interested in this approach, consult your advisor and consider these rules:

- You must be 70<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> or older at the time the gift is made.
- The maximum donation in any one year is \$100,000.
- The gift must be made directly from the IRA administrator to the charity.
- You can receive no benefit in exchange for the gift.

## Minutes in Seconds from August 2-3, 2018 Board Meeting

## Interim Mail Votes not previously reported:

Added to Chapter President's duties to attend and actively participate in Presidents' Academy unless unable to attend. In such case, the president will find a substitute from the chapter's executive committee based on the line of succession of officers.

## At Meeting:

- Revoked charters of lota Psi (Texas A&M-Corpus Christi) and Gamma Omicron (San Francisco) for hazing allegations.
- Elected 2016 ČOY Jen Huynh and current and recent Central Office staffers Kristin Marks, Joe Shaver, and Jeff Winther to Golden Council.
- Installed 2018 COY Travis Brodbeck as a grand officer.
- Approved funding for a hands-on community service event at the 2019 GCC.
- Noted that although Make a Difference Day lost its primary sponsor, the Fraternity will continue the program. References to the sponsor will be removed from the website.
- Eliminated the National Marketing and Communication Committee as a standing committee. Approved Volunteer Online Leadership Training (VOLT) to provide training to connect DDs and RVPs across the country and to also provide personal growth opportunities. Clarified Provincial and Regional Awards Committee organization and added instructions for
- dealing with failure of committees to select winners.
- Removed "national" from eligibility requirements on all chapter award applications. Chapters will need to meet all requirements to reach any award level.
- Approved addition of more detailed criteria used to evaluate Helmet candidates.
  - Approved recommendation to have costs of all helmet awards (and frames) paid for by the Fraternity (50%) and Foundation (50%).
- Approved renewal of the operating agreement between Leadership Foundation and Fraternity with minor changes. (The Foundation Trustees had previously approved.)
- Approved Leadership Foundation grant request funding prioritization for 2019-20. The Foundation Trustees later approved.
- Failed recommendation from Beta Epsilon Chapter/South Central Province to change the chapter fundraising chair to a vice president position.
- Approved recommendation to require colonies to attend national events (LEAD School, LEAD Provincial Conference, or Grand Chapter Congress) in order to officially petition the National Fraternity for a charter.
- Provided feedback on possible changes/improvements to structure and content of LEAD events including changing CMP requirements, offering more local "geographically-based" events and more. Concerns about standardization of programming were noted.
- Approved renaming the Manual for Pledge Education to The Crown and Delta. The 2018 edition, in addition to the new name, is also being improved with full-color and having it perfect bound versus saddle-stitched (stapled).
- Approved draft agenda for the 2019 GCC educational programming.
- Approved 2019 GCC Budget, which includes registration fee rates. Registration will be made available in the coming months.
- Approved providing ribbons at GCC to collegiate brothers representing chapters reaching Chapter of Excellence or Chapter of Recognition during the fiscal year preceding Congress.
