SUMMARY

It has been a busy semester in the Western Province! We left GCC excited and ready to get to work. We focused on Collegian of the Year applications and worked with 2014 National COY, Nick Rizzi, to create a promotional video for the COY program and increase chapter nominees. We also hosted a webinar with the National & Provincial Awards Chairs, PVP and staff members to answer questions and support the COY application process. We hosted Fall LEAD School in Sacramento, CA. While attendance was less than typical, the Western Province had the highest attendance for a 2017 Fall LEAD School. We had excellent engagement from all that attended and no risk management issues. The Provincial Leadership team continues to look for new ways to use social media, and we have reignited our Facebook page and groups. We have created a CMP Task Force, in which we have a weekly Game of Thrones themed CMP race, a monthly newsletter, and are looking for new ways to ensure that our chapters reach their maximum potential in CMP. In December, we elected a new Bay Area Regional Vice President, congratulations to Nyonohse Wreh!

- GOAL: Have all District Directors assigned to all collegiate chapters by 10/15/17
- Progress: NOT ACHIEVED. We have 47 of 49 chapters with assigned District Directors

Certified Deltasig Leaders (CDLs)

- GOAL: All District Directors achieve Tier One Certified
- In Progress: 56% of our current District Directors have completed the CDL Tier One trainings.

Chapter Management Program (CMP)

- GOAL:

- In Progress: We have 93% of our chapters still eligible for Accredited Chapter status.

EXPANSION (if applicable)

- Cal Poly Pomona Colony Reactivation is on progress and should happen in Spring of 2018. The Colony is targeting April 28th as their installation day. They are on track for events and starting their petition after the holiday break.
- We have received several inquiries from Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Utah that we are exploring for other options for colonies.

DISCIPLINE AND ASSISTANCE ACTIONS AND ISSUES (if applicable)

- Phi Deferred University Probation until 12/31/17. We have been notified by the school that this has been completed.
- Gamma Omega Warning Letter for Risk Management violations at Chapter retreat
- Epsilon Phi University & Fraternity Probation ending 12/31/17. The Chapter has worked with student life on campus to meet all requirements and were allowed to have pledges and should be removed from Probation this semester.
- Theta Chi University & Fraternity Probation ending 12/31/17. The Chapter is working with University officials and must still organize a Risk Management for Hosting Events Workshop. They have received a deadline extension from the school, but must plan this event. The chapter will remain on probation until they have completed all requirements with the school.
- Lambda Pi Warning Letter for Risk Management violations during Recruiting events.
- Pi Chi Under investigation for Risk Management and Hazing violations in regards to the Pledge Program.
- We have found several chapters have been "adding" unapproved requirements to their Pledge Programs and will be receiving warning letters as needed.

COMMITTEE'S

Professional Development Committee - vacant

- GOAL To help coordinate professional events at LEAD Schools such as programming, resume reviews, an Alumni Development Trainings
- Progress In progress as we find a chair for this committee.

Scholastic and Awards Chair - Patrick Lewis



- GOAL Increase Awards & Scholarships submissions throughout the Province. Have every chapter submit a COY nominee and have each Region submit a Regional COY to be presented at our Provincial Conference in San Diego.
- Progress Every chapter except 1 submitted a COY nominee. The Western Province coordinated a video of 2014 COY Nick Rizzi to promote COY applications and posted it on social media. We also coordinated with National Awards Chair and staff a webinar for all COY nominees to attend and ask questions. All Regions have submitted Regional nominees and they were submitted on time.

Community Service Chair - Patrick Bonfrisco

- GOAL Communicate National Community Service initiatives within the Province. Coordinate and execute Provincial Service Projects at LEAD Events
- Progress We held 3 separate Community Service events at Sacramento LEAD School:
 - Coin Drop Contest LEAD attendees donated their loose change in a battle between chapters. In total, the Western Province raised \$456 which was donated to the Leadership Foundation in the name of the winning chapter, Tau Omega! 29 chapters/colonies participated.
 - Pop Tab Contest Chapters collected soda pop tabs throughout the semester and dropped them off at the Community Service table at LEAD. The tabs were then donated to the Ronald McDonald House of Sacramento, who recycle the tabs and keep the proceeds. 20 chapters/colonies participated. The Sierra Nevada Region donated the most!
 - Cards For Humanity Chapters donated Target Gift Cards to benefit victims of hurricanes in Texas and Florida or fires in California. In total, the Western Province raised \$648 for disaster relief! 19 chapters/colonies participated.

Alumni Development Chair - Nick Rizzi

- GOAL Increase participation within our alumni members
- Progress We are conducting an Alumni Forum at the upcoming Provincial Conference in San Diego

Marketing & Communications Chair - Alex Warrick

- GOAL Create marketing materials for the Province as needed.
- Progress Our committee has created marketing materials for our upcoming LEAD Tours, Provincial Conference and is working on creating a Provincial Newsletter that will come out every other month.

CMP Task Force - Erica Kolsrud & David Pratt

- GOAL To create a system to improve our CMP Accredited, Chapter of Recognition and Chapter of Excellence status within the Province.
- Progress We have created a Game of Thrones CMP race within the Province where each Region is competing against each other to see who can have the highest percentage of Accredited Status items turned in within the Province. In addition, we send out a monthly newsletter to all Presidents, Vice President Chapter Operations and District Directors with upcoming deadlines, tips and other CMP related topics to help them during that month. The Chairs have created their committee and will be hosting conference calls soon.

Report of the Desert Mountain Regional Vice President

SUMMARY

The Desert Mountain Region experienced a successful Fall semester and is on track to accomplish many of its goals for the 2017-2018 year.

I was able to appoint District Directors at each of the six chapters early in the semester and have had the chance to personally meet with all of them (some multiple times). I'm also happy to report that I was able to visit all six chapters at least once in the Fall, which included two weekend trips to New Mexico and Texas.

Regional communication has increased significantly. Each month my "RVP Report" is sent to District Directors with important information and deadlines for the month ahead. Going forward, all chapter Presidents in the region will also receive the report. A monthly newsletter is also distributed via MailChimp to all collegiate and alumni brothers in the area, reaching over 1,500 people each month.

The region sent a total of 57 attendees to Sacramento Fall LEAD school and was recognized as the region traveling the most collective miles (over 110,000 round trip!). The Region has already outdone this by having 60 people registered for the Provincial Conference to date.

All six chapters remain eligible to be Accredited level or higher in CMP. It has been tough for some chapters with the addition of Ritual Memorization as an Accredited Level item without a change in the approval percentage. Nonetheless, it is a goal (and expectation) in the Desert Mountain Region that all chapters reach at least Accredited Level in the CMP.

I am proud to report that all six chapters nominated COY nominees this fall. All six nominees submitted applications on time, giving the Desert Mountain Region a 100% application rate.

A Regional Initiation will be held by Zeta Omega at Northern Arizona University in the Spring. This will allow the region a chance to network within itself outside of the Western Provincial Conference.

As we head into Spring, I hope to travel to all six chapters again. My goal is to help them accomplish their regional and chapter goals by having regular conversations with District Directors and Presidents. Additionally, a regional events calendar is available for all chapters to post their events on. A regional goal has been set by the chapters at the SouthPACCoast Conference on 12/2 to have the chapters plan brotherhood games together and build the event up into a larger event As of 1/2, Chapter delegates have been selected by all but 1 chapter to plan Brotherhood Games and a meeting has been set for the team for 1/5 to begin planning the event. A baseline for chapter attendance at regional events thus far

All chapters attended Regional Initiation, hosted at UC Riverside, including Xi Pi that could not participate in the initiation itself due to university restrictions. DDs were appointed for each chapter in the region immediately after returning home from GCC. At present, there is only one individual that is serving in the role for two chapters. A bi-weekly informal report has been requested of all DDs to ensure consistent and regular communication and to keep a record of the chapter's status and progress. The report is intended to capture relevant information for historical purposes and for the DDs to refer to when working with the chapters. I personally visited each chapter's GBM or EC meeting at the earliest meeting possible once returning from GCC, in some cases more than once.

- Regional DD meetings have been set throughout the Fall term to provide training as needed and touch base on current projects (e.g. regional initiation)
 - A training meeting was held on 9/30. The next meeting will be a weekend retreat and is currently scheduled for 1/27.
- Three DDs attended the Volunteer Leadership Training session in Sacramento on the Friday before LEAD.
- CDL Tier 2 for all DDs that have not yet completed the accreditation is in progress and expected completion is no later than the end of the year.

Plan for potential/future transitions or growth in the leadership team by building a "pipeline" of leaders for the region & promoting new leadership opportunities within the region and beyond.

- A more permanent replacement has not been found for Lambda Chi and Xi Pi DD slots yet, however the search is ongoing and I am hopeful that we will be able to transition someone into the roles by the end of the academic year.
- I am personally working with a group of local alumni in the San Diego area to refranchise the San Diego Alumni Chapter and am encouraging them to organize an alumni event the weekend of LEAD.
- Several individuals were approached about chairing their own committee at the regional level for community service and professional development which will create opportunities to serve on the committees for more brothers. So far, the individuals have not committed to this yet but I am hopeful that this will come to fruition in the spring term.
- A collegiate brother from Iota Pi was selected to chair the Brotherhood Games committee this year. I hope to continue this in future years as well, rotating through chapters.
- Opportunities to speak at the inter-regional conference and at LEADs were offered to the regional leadership team as well as the region's 2017 COY.

Encourage the region to represent itself proudly at the Provincial and National levels of our Fraternity

- Fall LEAD School and Spring LEAD Conference attendance was and is encouraged of all chapters.
 Fall:
 - All chapters attended Fall LEAD School in Sacramento.
 The region had a combined total collegiate attendance of approx. 40.
 - Iota Pi was awarded the travel award for most number of brothers in attendance

Spring:

- As of 1/2 the region has a combined collegiate registration totaling 140 brothers.
- Chapter Collegian of the Year nominations were received from all chapters across the region and applications were received from all nominees. I look forward to announcing our Regional COY at LEAD Conference in San Diego.



Promote operational excellence across the region

- All chapters except one are currently on track to achieve Chapter of Excellence
- This year's theme for CMP Race is Pokémon and has been dubbed "Pac Coast GO!". It is published weekly on Mondays.
 - The completion percentage is based on Chapter of Excellence
 - o Lambda Sigma has been in the lead thus far this year.
- A spring officer training "meeting" has been set for Sat, 4/7 for both outgoing spring officers and incoming fall officers.

EXPANSION (if applicable)

The Pacific Coast Region currently has no expansion plans in progress.

DISCIPLINE AND ASSISTANCE ACTIONS AND ISSUES (if applicable)

LAMBDA CHI

During the fall term, the chapter's entire pledge class decided not to continue with the pledging process and as such the chapter did not have any collegiate initiates in fall. Due to this circumstance, CMP submission credit or approval was not awarded for any associated items thus rendering the chapter unable to achieve Accredited Chapter.

As a direct result of a 0% retention rate, recruiting practices have been scrutinized and revamped to ensure that recruits and prospective members are aware of the requirements of pledging and the time commitments. The specific changes made were based on the feedback provided to the chapter from the pledges that chose to leave the progress. The chapter's DD and I will both be significantly more involved in the recruiting process for the coming two terms for the chapter to observe and suggest additional changes as needed.

As this will be the second year in a row that the chapter has missed Accredited Chapter, but for different reasons, further discussion between myself, their current DD, and PVP will be necessary to discuss if any additional actions will be necessary. Aside from this situation, the chapter's CMP performance has been a great improvement from the year prior.

Report of the Pacific Northwest Regional Vice President

SUMMARY

Omicron Psi: Omicron Psi is still trying to overcome the challenges of being in such a remote area (challenges relate to lack of alumni participation and fundraising opportunities) while continuing to establish best practices to attendance policies, committee structures, establish good chapter culture, etc. Mainly dealing with typical chapter problems of lack of fundraising and lack of participation, especially among seniors.

Sigma Upsilon: Sigma Upsilon has established a great chapter culture and appears to have minimal membership issues. We are working on establishing a good working relationship and a foundation of trust between myself, the DD (Sam), the Chapter Advisor (Rick), and the chapter. Need to focus on a greater understanding of the importance of viewing the chapter as a part of the whole national fraternity rather than their own silo.

Upsilon Psi: Upsilon Psi is a very new chapter that is working to establish their chapter culture and navigate their way to becoming a true "Chapter of Excellence" without the structure and given goal they had as a colony. They need to work on finding a big goal to work towards each year (Chapter of Excellence, some big fundraiser, awards banquet?) that each member can buy into and motivate them to remain active and participate even when it is inconvenient.

Overall: The Pacific Northwest (PNW) region is still dealing with being a young, sparse region. I'm trying to establish a true culture among our three, young chapters and re-engage the alumni throughout our region. Distance between Omicron Psi and Sigma Upsilon/Upsilon Psi continues to be an issue and prevents any regional events. Omicron Psi are by themselves in Eastern WA with very few alumni as resources; whereas the two University of Washington chapters are in the thick of the Seattle area with a number of alumni and they have each other, but they are both very young and seem to have a hard time taking the initiative to reach out and start the cooperation efforts. I'm still hopeful that we will be able to have a joint initiation between Sigma Upsilon and Upsilon Psi in the Spring and I hope this helps the two chapters work together more in the future.

DISCIPLINE AND ASSISTANCE ACTIONS AND ISSUES (if applicable)

One issue multiple chapters are facing is the categorization of Delta Sigma Pi within Student Organizations. One school within the Cal – State family had the chapter join an Independent Greek Council. This move is currently being reviewed by Central Office staff and Leadership. Other universities are pushing chapters to move away from "greek" terms. This is being worked out with the universities on a case-by-case basis but may turn into a larger conversation.

Another area we saw a rise in was deviating from the approved Pledge Program. In 99% of those instances, it was a chapter adding more than the three options. In two cases, the deviations were on the line of what would be considered hazing and were dealt with.

Alumni chapters, as they become more active, are having trouble with operations. Areas of concerns: Who approves Alumni Chapter financial spending, what does Alumni Chapters do if no quorum at elections, fully reading qualifications for forms: Awards, Delegates, etc.

No discipline actions are needed at this time for the South Pacific Region chapters.
